Candidates For Honorary Degrees

ELLIS M. IVEY. Jr. Doctor of Laws

Ellis M. Ivey, Jr., of Saginaw, general manager of the Saginaw Steering Gear Division of General Motors Corporation since March, 1970, joined the division in January, 1941, as a college graduate in training.

A native of Atlanta, Georgia, Ivey was born February 5, 1917. He graduated from Clemson University in South Carolina with a degree in industrial engineering. He served in the South Pacific theater from 1942-1945 before returning to Steering Gear as a foreman. He was named time study engineer in 1948, tool supervisor in 1953; was promoted to supervisor of work standards in 1956, plant manager in 1957, and divisional works manager in 1964.

Ivey is a member of the Society of Automotive Engineers, the Greater Saginaw Chamber of Commerce, the Industrial Management Club, the Saginaw Manufacturers Association, the Saginaw Country Club, the Torch Club, and the Saginaw Club. He is president of the Board of Trustees of Saginaw General Hospital. He serves on the board of directors of the United Way of Saginaw County, is vice-president of the Saginaw Symphony Association, and he won The Saginaw Chamber of Commerce Robert Alhert award in 1976.

Ivey served as the first president of the Lake Huron Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, and now is vice-president. He also is vice-president of the Michigan United Fund. Ivey is Saginaw County Chairman for the Savings Bond Division of the U.S. Treasury, a member of the Advisory Board of the College of Engineering at Clemson University, a member of the Board of Regents of General Motors Institute, and serves on the Board of Fellows of Saginaw Valley State College.

OTTO C. PRESSPRICH **Doctor of Letters**

Otto C. Pressprich, of Saginaw, is universally credited as being the person most directly responsible for the development of higher education in the tri-county area. As the first permanent chairman of the Valley College Association, he spurred the formation of the 'Committee of 300,' which resulted in the creation of Delta College.

A native of New Hamburg, Ontario, Pressprich was born December 13, 1897. He attended Colgate University in New York for one year, and served with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces in Canada and England.

Pressprich came to The Saginaw News in 1923. He was appointed editor in 1941. In 1949 he began writing editorials urging construction of a junior college for Saginaw. In 1955, he chaired the committee which recommended the formation of a tri-county college.

Pressprich won the Boutell Award in 1959 for his work in helping form Delta College. After retirement from *The News*, he became Director of Public Relations and Assistant to the President of Saginaw Valley College in 1964. He served a six-month term on the Delta College Board of Trustees in 1965.

Pressprich became a member of the Saginaw Club, the Torch Club, the American Legion, Kiwanis, and Masons. He was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by Central Michigan University, and was named an honorary alumnus of the University of Michigan. He is a member of Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalistic fraternity.

LOUIS A. VAUPRE Doctor of Laws

Louis A. Vaupre, of Bay City, was appointed to the Saginaw Valley State College Board of Control in September, 1968, following his retirement as division manager from Consumers

Power Company in Bay City.

Vaupre was born on January 1, 1903, in Kalamazoo. He graduated from the University of Michigan with a degree in electrical engineering. He was a member of the first U-M swimming team, and earned a varsity letter in that sport. Vaupre attended the Air Force Flying Cadet School, and entered the U.S. Air Force in 1927, serving for eight years as a flying officer, tester, and teacher in the Air Force.

Vaupre began his career at Consumers Power Company as a lighting sales engineer in 1935. He came to Bay City as assistant to the division manager in 1947. He did postgraduate work at the University of Pittsburgh, Carnegie Technological Institute, and Westinghouse Technical and Design School.

Vaupre became a trustee for Bay City Mercy Hospital; and a member of the Michigan Society of Professional Engineers, the Saginaw Valley Chapter of Professional Engineers, the Elks Club, and the "M" Club. He has been active in Kiwanis and the Eastern Michigan Tourist Association.

Vaupre served as vice-chairman of the Saginaw Valley State College Board of Fellows, and as a member of the college's Board of Control. He was very active in the development of the Observatory.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic gowns, hoods, and caps worn always at graduations and other formal affairs at colleges and universities date back several centuries and recall the colorful times of knighthood.

Academic regalia in the United States is inherited from Great Britain. In the earliest times, academic dress was the costume of the times. During the 13th and 14th Centuries, monks and students, as well as the general population, wore long robes and hoods to protect themselves from the cold in drafty rooms and corridors. In due course, academic costumes became a survivor of an earlier form of dress.

As academic dress became a specialized costume, it also became a means of identifying the honors and other distinctions existing in the scholarly world. Thus, recipients of doctorates began to wear particularly full gowns, which later became scarlet for most British degrees. The fields in which the degrees were granted became identifiable by the color of the sleeve facings and of the other facings or panels.

When American institutions were founded, they followed the British pattern, and each adopted its own version of academic dress. Independence from Great Britain and the growth of new institutions, which were wholly American, caused interest in academic costume to wane. In 1895 an intercollegiate commission formally adopted a code of academic costume for the United States. Adherence was voluntary, but the majority of schools in the U.S., a few in Canada, and a number of American-supported overseas institutions did adhere to the code. The code has remained the same since its adoption except for minor variations, such as the placement of slots on sleeves of the master's gown.

CAP. It is the Oxford mortarboard shape, consisting of a head-hugging cap topped by a square flat surface, one corner of which faces the front of the wearer. The cap is of black cloth, but a doctor may elect to wear one made of velvet. A tassel is attached to a button at the center of the square surface. Each tassel is of the color assigned to the particular faculty; for example, the color of science is golden yellow. Doctors in all fields have an option to wear a tassel of metallic gold. Most choose the metallic.

GOWN. Under the code, the gown tells whether the wearer holds a bachelor's, master's or doctor's degree. As befits his relatively low status, the bachelor wears a severe, unornamented robe with long pointed sleeves. The master wears a more elaborate gown, and a doctor's gown is even more ornamental. A doctor can wear a velvet gown instead of a cotten one, and can elect to wear the faculty color on three bars on each sleeve and on panels in front of the gown. The results add much color to academic processions in universities and colleges where professors represent different faculties.

HOOD. Hoods represent not only the degree of the wearer but also the institution that awarded it. Hoods are worn in three different lengths: 3 feet for bachelors, $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet for masters, and 4 feet for doctors. They are bordered with the faculty color in widths of 2 inches for bachelors, 3 inches for masters, and 5 inches for doctors.

Indication of the institution which awards the degree is a desirable feature of the costume, but there are so many schools and so few colors it became impossible to have a distinctive color. A solution was to borrow the chevron from ancient heraldry. In academic use the chevron, an inverted V-shaped figure, occupies the middle third of the hood lining. When its color contrasts with that of the lining it makes an attractive pattern and increases the number of possible distinctive hoods. This need for distinction was so great that other figures—the double chevron and the chevron reversed—were borrowed from heraldry. There still are duplications. The light blue with white chevron orginally adopted by Columbia University, now is used by at least nine other institutions.

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The inability to have a distinctive hood caused some schools to turn to different colors for gowns. Harvard took the lead in this by establishing a crimson gown for its doctor's degree. Soon, Yale adopted blue gowns for both masters and doctors. Other schools, such as the University of Michigan, joined the parade. It didn't change anything, but it did make graduation ceremonies colorful.

THE INSIGNIA OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE COLLEGE

The triangle within the seal represents the geographical area formed by Bay City, Midland, and Saginaw, popularly known as "The Golden Triangle." Here, three separate urban communities are merging into a metropolitan community with a population of more than 400,000. The college has been placed midway between the three cities to serve the need for a baccalaureate institution.

Within the seal are symbols of Egyptian origin. The figure at the top stands for truth, and is associated with the teachings of lkhnaton, who has been called "the first individual in history" and "the first monotheist." His search for truth led him to enunciate elements of the scientific method and a belief in the brotherhood of man.

The symbol at the lower left represents light — perhaps the inner light. It recognizes that "our knowledge is a torch of smokey pine that lights the pathway but one step ahead." We may wish, in the words of Santayana, to:

> "Bid, then, the tender light of faith to shine By which alone the mortal heart is led Unto the thinking of the thought divine."

The symbol in the lower right is a staff which stands for strength. This may be regarded as an appeal for the endurance necessary to search and find the truth, and the strength to speak and live it.

The college has but a single color—cardinal—chosen, not because of its ornithological or its ecclesiastical significance, but simply because it is a beautiful color.
