CANDIDATES FOR HONORARY DEGREES

LORENE R. FISCHER DOCTOR OF LAWS



Lorene R. Fischer has been Dean of the College of Nursing at Wayne State University since 1977. She will return to a faculty appointment at WSU beginning with the 1987-1988 academic year.

Dean Fischer joined WSU's College of Nursing faculty in 1955 as an assistant professor in the Department of Psychiatric-Mental Health Nursing. She initiated the University's first graduate program in nursing dealing with care of children with psychiatric disorders. The innovative program was the only one of its kind in the state.

Prior to becoming Dean, Fischer served as chairperson of the Department of Psychiatric Nursing at WSU from 1957-1975. She was appointed director of WSU's Undergraduate Program in Nursing in 1976.

A nationally recognized leader in the areas of psychiatric-mental health nursing and nursing education, Dean Fischer has published numerous articles that reflect her several areas of expertise – emotionally disturbed children, issues impacting the nursing profession and marketing for nursing education. She is a popular speaker and frequently travels throughout the nation.

In 1961 she won membership as a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing. She also is a member of Sigma Theta Tau, the national nursing society. She has served in various capacities for professional organizations, including service as a member of the board of directors of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, president of the Michigan Association of Colleges of Nursing, chair of the membership committee of the American Academy of Nursing, and secretary on the board of directors of the Michigan Nurses Association.

In addition to her work with professional associations, Dean Fischer serves on the board of directors for the Greater Detroit Council for the Blind and the Visiting Nurses Association of Metropolitan Detroit. She also is on the Board of Governors of the Comprehensive Cancer Institute of Metropolitan Detroit.

Consulting has taken her to Nigeria, Australia, the Netherlands, throughout the United States and to the World Health Organization.

Dean Fischer holds a baccalaureate degree and a Master's degree from Teachers College, Columbia University. Her master's program of study focused on curriculum and teaching of nursing. She specialized in the study of child psychiatric nursing and pioneered in the study of child psychology, a field not recognized for study at the time. From 1968-1974 she studied in the University of Michigan's doctoral program in higher education administration.

Dean Fischer and her husband Hans live in Detroit. Her daughter, Susan Warner, lives in Arlington, Virginia.

EDWARD B. MORLEY, JR. DOCTOR OF LAWS



Edward B. "Ted" Morley, Jr., a native of Saginaw, has an extensive record of civic and commercial activities. Born March 9, 1923, Mr. Morley has resided in Saginaw most of his life and was president of the Morley Brothers organization, a wholesaler of hardware, sporting goods, appliances, floor coverings and industrial supplies. Morley's also operated a retail store and travel agency in Saginaw. The businesses were sold in 1981.

Mr. Morley enrolled in the University of Michigan's business administration program in 1941. In 1943 he joined the U.S. Navy, enlisting in V-5 Flight Training. He graduated as ensign from the Navy's Midshipman School, and served in the Pacific Theatre until 1946.

After beginning as a warehouseman with Morley Brothers in 1948, Mr. Morley became thoroughly familiar with all aspects of the organization through a variety of positions. In 1955 he assumed management responsibility for Morley Brothers' Royal Oak branch. In 1963 he returned to Saginaw as Vice President and Operations Manager. He became Executive Vice President for the organization in 1965, and was named President and Chief Executive Officer in 1970. In 1977 he became Chairman of the Board.

Among his business accomplishments are seven years of service on the executive committee of Liberty Distributors, a national association of independent hardware distributors using the name "Trustworthy Hardware Stores." He was national chairman for Liberty Distributors from 1976 to 1978.

Mr. Morley has been an active member of the Greater Saginaw Chamber of Commerce, and was a member of its board of directors from 1968 to 1975. He served as chairman of the board in 1973.

In addition to his business activities, Mr. Morley has an outstanding record of community service. He is a former director and treasurer of PRIDE, an organization whose goal is economic and cultural redevelopment of downtown Saginaw. He is a steering committee member for the Saginaw Riverfront organization, and is on the United Way of Saginaw executive committee.

Other community service positions include past director of the Saginaw Valley Crime Commission, former trustee for the Home for the Aged in Saginaw, member of the Huron Council Executive Board, Boy Scouts of America, Board of Associates for Delta College, former member of Saginaw's Human Planning Commission, and general chairman of the Japanese Tea House and Cultural Center for People to People. He is a former member of Saginaw Valley Crime Stoppers and Saginaw Junior Achievement.

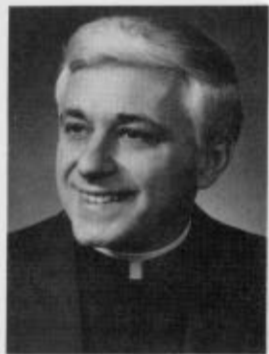
Mr. Morley has served on numerous foundation boards, including the Morley Brothers Foundation, the Council of Michigan Foundations, the Saginaw Valley State College Foundation, St. Mary's Hospital Foundation, Saginaw Community Foundation and Saginaw General Hospital Foundation. He is a member of Kiwanis, and has a 29 year record of perfect attendance. He is a past director of Germania and past president of the Saginaw Club.

Mr. Morley has been an active supporter of SVSC. In addition to his role on the SVSC Foundation, he was chairman of the SVSC Foundation Athletic Committee. He organized and headed the first two years of the Cardinal Run, has been a member of SVSC Coaches Corner and its executive committee, is a Cardinal Club member, and assisted with fund raising for Morley Track and Field.

He and his wife Sally have six sons, one grandson and one granddaughter.

KENNETH E. UNTENER DOCTOR OF HUMANITIES



Kenneth E. Untener, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Saginaw, is a native of Detroit. After attending a parish school for 12 years, he graduated with a B.A. in philosophy from Sacred Heart Seminary College in Detroit. He earned his M.Div. from St. John's Seminary in Plymouth, Michigan.

Bishop Untener was ordained to the priesthood by Cardinal Dearden in 1963. After parish work and then service in the Chancery, Untener was sent to the Gregorian University in Rome, where he obtained his doctorate in theology.

He returned to Detroit and served in the clergy office. In 1977 he was appointed rector (president) of St. John's Seminary in Plymouth.

In November of 1980, Untener became Bishop of the Diocese of Saginaw.

His articles have appeared in various periodicals, including "America Magazine," "Origins," and "National Catholic Reporter." He wrote a small book entitled "Sunday Liturgy Can Be Better." He regularly gives retreats for priests and theological/pastoral talks around the country.

Untener serves on the board of directors of the Saginaw Valley Campus Ministry, the Board of Trustees of Alma College and the United Way Board of Saginaw County.

THE 1986-87 FRANC A. LANDEE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

DONALD J. BACHAND ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE



Dr. Donald J. Bachand, recipient of the 1986-87 Franc A. Landee Award for Excellence in Teaching, joined the SVSC faculty in 1978 as an assistant professor in the Criminal Justice Department. Now an associate professor, he has taught in the subject areas of advanced police administration, personnel management, community relations and social and political problems.

Prior to his teaching career, Dr. Bachand had several years of law enforcement experience with the Detroit Police Department. Between 1969 and 1971 he performed various duties in the Office of the Police Commissioner (Detroit).

He was then assigned to general patrol duties at the 14th Precinct. He also served as liaison between the police department, news media and the public in police related matters and acted as investigator for citizen complaints received by the Mayor's Office.

In 1976 he assumed supervisory responsibility within the department. He designed and implemented management information systems for evaluating new and innovative law enforcement programs and directed the evaluation of the effectiveness of the Detroit Police Department's Youth Bureau.

At SVSC Dr. Bachand has served as a sponsor of the Criminal Justice Club, was a member of the 1980-81 Long Range Planning Committee and has served on numerous faculty selection committees and faculty evaluation teams. He was a member of the steering committee that prepared the College's self-study report for the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. He has actively supported both the SVSC Honor Society and the Honors Program for academically outstanding students. He was 1982-83 chairman of the Criminal Justice Department. Currently, Dr. Bachand is vice president of the SVSC Faculty Association.

Dr. Bachand earned an Associate's Degree in law enforcement at Mercy College of Detroit. He later graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree from Mercy, with a double major in sociology and law enforcement. He earned a Master's Degree in criminal justice from the University of Detroit. In 1983 he completed requirements to receive a Ph.D. in adult and continuing education from the University of Michigan. As part of his doctoral program, Dr. Bachand conducted research relating to crime and the elderly offender. He has since taught courses and published numerous papers on that topic.

His professional memberships include the Academy of Criminal Justice Sciences, the American Academy of Professional Law Enforcement, the American Society of Criminology, the American Sociological Association, the Gerontological Society of America, Michigan Criminal Justice Educators Association, Michigan Education Association and National Education Association.

His community activities include service on the East Central Michigan Law Enforcement Council, Region 7; the Deep River Township Planning Commission; board of directors, Bay County Women's Center; committee member on the Sterling Area Action Committee; and law enforcement advisor for the Arenac County Board of Commissioners and the Arenac County and Bay County sheriff's departments. He frequently serves as a professional consultant to area law enforcement and social service agencies.

Dr. Bachand resides with his wife Liana in Lapeer. They are the parents of three children.

THE 1986-87 EARL L. WARRICK AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH



SUK KOO YUN PROFESSOR OF PHYSICS

Dr. Suk Koo "Tom" Yun began his teaching assignments with Saginaw Valley State College as an assistant professor in the Physics Department in 1969. He has served as chairman of the Physics Department since 1977.

Dr. Yun has extensively researched theories that explain the creation of the universe. He has worked within the "multigenerational grand unification" theory that attempts to unify three fundamental forces in nature and seeks to reveal the origin of the replication of family structure of the building blocks of matter. The theory explains why particles come in three families in a generation group,

and predicts new particles, as well as calculating their masses.

Most recently, Dr. Yun has directed his research toward unifying the multigenerational grand unification theory with the theory of gravity as it was presented in Einstein's "Theory of Relativity." The resulting idea currently being investigated by physicists is called the "Superstring Theory." This theory must be constructed in ten dimensional space-time, rather than the more familiar four dimensional space-time.

In conjunction with his research, Dr. Yun regularly spends summers conferring with colleagues at Harvard and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has contributed more than 20 articles to national and international scholarly journals and has published three books, including "A Vision of Beauty in Order" and a laboratory manual for general physics.

Dr. Yun has been the recipient of several scholarships, stipends and awards. The most recent was a \$6,000 research grant from the National Science Foundation to support his work in theoretical high energy physics from October 1985 to March 1987. He also was awarded International Travel Grants by NSF to participate in the 19th International Conference on High Energy Physics in 1978 and the 22nd conference in 1984.

Dr. Yun received a Bachelor of Science in physics from Seoul National University in Seoul, Korea. He earned a Master of Science in physics at the University of Chicago, and completed his Ph.D. in physics at Boston University.

His teaching career began at Clarkson College of Technology in Potsdam, New York. Yun served as a teaching fellow and research associate in physics while studying at Boston University. From 1967-1969 he was a postdoctoral research associate with teaching duties at Syracuse University before coming to SVSC.

Dr. Yun's professional memberships include Society of Sigma Xi, the American Physical Society and the Particles and Fields Division of the APS. He has been listed in "Who's Who in the Midwest," "American Men and Women of Science," "Dictionary of International Biography," "Notable Americans," "Men of Achievement," "International Who's Who in Community Service" and various other biographical listings.

His service to SVSC includes acting as faculty representative to the Student Senate; membership on the 1970 Committee on Interdisciplinary Courses; Secretary of the Faculty Senate from 1970-72; membership on the Subcommittee of General Education in 1974, the Humanities Grant Committee in 1977-78, the Academic Advisement Committee in 1978-79, the 1980-81 General Education Committee and the Computer Science Program Committee from 1981-85; acting as advisor for the SVSC Physics Club; and numerous other service activities. He participates annually in the Science Open House, and in 1979 organized and coordinated the SVSC Einstein Centennial Lecture Series and the 1979 SVSC expedition to Winnipeg, Canada, to observe the solar eclipse.

Dr. Yun and his wife Chung-Hei reside in Midland. They are the parents of two daughters and a son.

1987 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

GERTRUDE M. ALLEN



Gertrude Margaret Allen believes in looking ahead; that it's non-productive to look back. In 1970 that belief led her to enroll in a degree program at Saginaw Valley State College. She was then 47 years old, the mother of two grown children. She also had worked at a variety of positions – mostly secretarial – since she was 16.

Mrs. Allen was graduated cum laude from SVSC in 1973 with dual majors in sociology and psychology and minors in English and philosophy. Having whetted her appetite for learning, she went on to earn a Master of Arts in psychology from Central Michigan University in 1979.

Since 1974, Mrs. Allen has been employed by the Michigan Department of Social Services as a Licensing Consultant for children's day care homes. As part of her responsibilities, she has licensed large numbers of homes providing day care in Saginaw County and the Thumb area, and she supervises nearly 300 such homes. She holds regular meetings for prospective day care providers and offers counseling to the operators of the homes. She is a tireless worker for child protection, and identifies and brings to court suspected cases of child abuse, as well as exposing day care homes that operate outside of the law.

Mrs. Allen is deeply concerned with the quality of services available for those in need, and devotes countless hours of her own time to assisting the children and families of the children served by day care homes. She organized fellow D.S.S. workers and members of the Saginaw Chapter of the American Association of University Women to collect toys, clothing and food – including items for special diets – for client families at Thanksgiving and Christmas. The program has grown over the years and other organizations have joined the effort.

Drawing from her educational experience at SVSC, Mrs. Allen has forged human and intellectual bonds of community service. She is an active member of A.A.U.W.'s Saginaw Chapter, and was president from 1979 to 1981. Under her leadership, the organization opened a used book store, the "Book Loft," in downtown Saginaw. The shop stocks books of every description, ranging from very old to nearly new. Books are donated, then resold at low cost. Profits from book sales are used to fund scholarships for qualifying students attending Delta College or SVSC.

Mrs. Allen is a member of the Child Abuse and Neglect Council and of the Community Coordinated Child Care organization, both child advocacy groups. Other memberships, past and present, include the Michigan League for Human Services, the League of Women Voters and board of directors of Interlink Home for Runaway Children. In 1983 she chaired the "Nuclear Arms and Defense" section of the National Issues Forum, and was responsible for securing an arms expert from the Reagan administration at no cost to the local community.

She is a member of U.A.W. Local 6000, Michigan State Employees Association, and was recently appointed State Chairperson of Women's Committee for Local 6000. Mrs. Allen was chapter president of the Michigan State Employees Association from 1980 to 1984. She also served on the association's arbitration committee for southern Michigan, was legislative representative for Region 5, and worksite coordinator for Chapter 63.

Her achievements were recognized through listing in "Who's Who of American Women," 1985-86, 14th Edition.

Her service to SVSC includes 9 years on the board of directors of the Alumni Association, 14 years on the Chrysalis Center Committee, and membership on the advisory committee for the SVSC Social Work Department in 1985-86.

Gertrude and Joseph A. Allen reside in Saginaw and are the parents of two children, Michael J. Allen and Janice Lynn Tuke. The Allens have five grandchildren.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic regalia of robe and hood are believed to have had their beginnings at the English Universities of Oxford and Cambridge during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. The hoods are a carry-over from the times when the monks, who operated the universities, wore them to protect their shaved heads in winter or to collect alms when worn as shoulder capes.

Use of the academic robe came to the United States in 1754 with the founding of what is now Columbia University. In 1895 a commission of university officials adopted a universal code of design and color for academic garb that has undergone various revisions, the latest in 1960. Styling of robes varies for the bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees, and the width of border and length of hood increase with the type of degree. The color of the velvet border of the hood indicates the field of study, while the lining designates the colors of the institution granting the degree. In the case of Saginaw Valley State College, the colors are cardinal red and royal blue.

The mace carried by the marshal in the academic procession symbolizes authority. This mace survived the 1985 Saginaw Valley State College fire.

THE INSIGNIA OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE COLLEGE

The geographical area formed by Bay City, Midland and Saginaw is represented by the triangle within the Saginaw Valley State College seal. This depicts the merging of three separate urban communities, with a combined population of more than 400,000, into the metropolitan Saginaw Valley.

The three symbols within the seal are of Egyptian origin. The figure at the top stands for life or living, denoting the fact that education is an ongoing, life-long process and has a value that lasts forever.

The symbol at the lower left represents light — perhaps the inner light. It recognizes that “our knowledge is a torch of smokey pine that lights the pathway but one step ahead.” Standing opposite this light of knowledge in the lower right corner is a staff, which stands for strength. This may be regarded as an appeal for the endurance necessary to search for and find the truth, and the strength to speak and live it.

The year of the College's founding, 1963, appears below the triangle.



SAGINAW VALLEY STATE COLLEGE was founded in 1963 as a private institution to meet higher education needs in east-central Michigan. It became state assisted in 1965.

There were just 119 students when classes began in 1964, but strong academic programs, reasonable costs and a variety of extra-curricular activities attracted growing numbers of students. Today, nearly 5,400 people from Michigan, several other states, and 20 nations are enrolled in more than 50 programs of study leading to bachelor's and master's degrees. International exchange and guest professors and students and an active international program bring the added dimension of other cultures to SVSC.

The primary mission of the College is to promote the intellectual and personal growth of students. A highly qualified faculty, most of whom hold terminal degrees, teach in both day and evening classes. Most classes have no more than 25 students, so instructors can give personal attention to individual needs. As an important part of its mission, SVSC fosters research and creative activities. The goals of the research program are to extend knowledge, inspire superior teaching, and contribute to the intellectual, social and economic well-being of the region.

Community service is another element of the College mission. SVSC sponsors continuing education courses, conferences, workshops, entrepreneurship and technology transfer efforts. Cultural events, many campus activities and the library are open to the public.

The College has a 782-acre campus located on M-84 (Bay Road) within the triangle formed by Bay City, Saginaw and Midland. Excellent transportation routes (I-75 access within three miles) connect the rural campus with urban centers.

SVSC is one of the most modern and well-equipped centers for higher education in the state. Recently completed and in-progress construction projects totaling over \$60 million complement facilities built between 1966 and 1978 to provide an attractive, barrier-free campus. The new Science Building and Maurice E. Brown Hall opened for 1986 fall semester classes. The Melvin J. Zahnow Library opened early in 1987, with completion of the Fine Arts Center and Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery scheduled later in the year. Other new facilities include a 40-unit student apartment complex and the Administrative Services Building. Ground will be broken for an \$18.7 million health and physical education complex yet this spring.

While these added facilities are important assets in meeting the College's mission, the essence of a college or a university is not bricks and mortar, but rather the people who teach and learn within a building's walls. The employment and retention of highly qualified teaching professionals for its faculty and support staff is a primary goal of the College.

Americans appreciate and value learning. The number of adults participating in organized learning has risen dramatically in recent years. Furthermore, both public and private support for education has increased since 1984. These added resources and new physical facilities, coupled with the commitment of SVSC personnel to meet the needs of the Saginaw Valley region, promise a bright future for the College and the people it serves.
