

RHEA E. MILLER DOCTOR OF FINE ARTS

Rhea E. Miller, former Director of Music Education for the Saginaw Public Schools, is a native of Eaton Rapids, Michigan. She graduated from Albion College in 1919 with a Bachelor of Music degree, majoring in both piano and voice. She entered the field of public school music at the Township High School in Metamora, Illinois.

In 1922 she became the Supervisor of Music at Marshall, Minnesota. At the end of her three year tenure there five of her choral groups won first place awards at the state district music contests.

In 1924 Miss Miller entered the University of Michigan to

complete her A.B. degree. In September, 1926, she joined the Music Department of the Saginaw Public Schools, teaching vocal music and piano in the first three grades of the west side schools. She also directed the Girls Glee Club at Arthur Hill High School.

Her interest in orchestra and orchestral music stimulated the promotion of the elementary string program. City-wide Sunday afternoon concerts for the string players and their parents were arranged to encourage and further an interest in orchestral music. When the Cleveland, Detroit or Minneapolis Symphony Orchestras scheduled appearances in Saginaw, all elementary children were taken to the City Auditorium for afternoon matinee concerts.

Miss Miller provided continual incentives for high standard performances by juniorsenior high school instrumental organizations. She encouraged them to appear in parades and school concerts. Annual scholarships to the Interlochen Music Camp, given by the Morley Foundation, were awarded to deserving junior-senior high school students from each school.

In the field of choral music, Miss Miller gave encouragement to elementary and juniorsenior choirs and other choral groups. She engaged nationally recognized choral conductors for appearances at the annual junior-senior choral festivals in the City Auditorium. Their presence inspired students as well as teachers.

Miss Miller strengthened her own music credentials by attending summer sessions at Columbia University and a number of three-week workshops in choral music at St. Olaf College. She was recognized state-wide as an authority in music education for the classroom teacher. Miss Miller developed a unique program of eurhythmics, which was demonstrated throughout the state, for elementary children.

During her tenure in the Saginaw Public Schools, Miss Miller was active in community musical activities, including the Tuesday Musicale. She served as a long-time board member and president of the Saginaw Community Concerts Association. She also served on the board of the Saginaw Art Museum, at which time she presented Sunday Afternoon Wind Concerts given by individuals or small groups of music students from Albion College, Central Michigan University and Saginaw.

Miss Miller holds a life membership in the Music Educators National Conference. She retired from the Saginaw Public Schools in 1965 and is living in Saginaw. She has been a strong supporter of the fine arts at Saginaw Valley State University.

LINNEAUS C. DORMAN DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Linneaus C. Dorman joined the Dow Chemical Company in 1960 in the Special Assignments program. He has earned several promotions during his employment with Dow, moving successively to the E. C. Britton Laboratory, Pharmaceutical Research, the Central Research Plastics Laboratory and the Central Research Polymer Research Laboratory. His position titles have included Research Chemist, Senior Research Chemist and Senior Research Specialist.

In 1983 he was named Associate Scientist,

recognizing the many significant contributions he made in several areas of research, especially in the biomedical field. Dr. Dorman holds more than twenty U.S. patents, and has been recognized for his research on mineral-filled poly(amino acid) composites. His role in the development of a latex-based pregnancy test reagent, the development of new methods in solid-phase synthesis and his work on peptide synthesis also has achieved recognition. Much of his work is known and respected internationally and is covered by foreign patents.

Dr. Dorman has written numerous scientific papers. He holds membership in several professional organizations and honorary societies. Included are the American Chemical Society, in which he has held local, regional and national offices; the National Organization of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers; the American Association for the Advancement of Science; the Black Executive Exchange Program of the National Urban League; and the Society for the Advancement of Material and Process Engineering.

Honor society memberships include Pi Kappa Delta, Phi Lambda Upsilon and Sigma Xi. He was a Dow Research Fellow at Indiana University in 1959-60, and he won the Dow Chemical Central Research Inventor of the Year Award in 1983.

Dr. Dorman also has been active in civic organizations, among them the Midland Jaycees, the Midland Commission on Community Relations, the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Fellows, the Midland Rotary Club, the Midland Black Coalition, the Midland Foundation, the United Negro College Fund, Inc. and the Midland Center for the Arts Board of Directors. He is a life member of NAACP.

Dr. Dorman is an emeritus member of the Saginaw Valley State University Board of Fellows, a board of community leaders advisory to the President and Board of Control of the University. He served as secretary, vice chairman and chairman of the Board for two years.

Born in South Carolina, Dr. Dorman earned a Bachelor of Science degree in chemistry from Bradley University and a Ph.D. degree in chemistry from Indiana University. He and his wife Phae are the parents of two children, Evelyn Suzanne and John Albert III.

ROBERT H. TIDERINGTON DOCTOR OF LAWS

Robert H. Tiderington is Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer of Fischer-Flack Inc. The firm was created through the merger of the Flack-Pennell Company, purchased by Mr. Tiderington in 1955, and the J. George Fischer Company, which he purchased in 1971.

Mr. Tiderington is a graduate of Cooley High School in Detroit. He also attended the Business Institute there. His business career began with his employment as a stockman and delivery driver for Detroit Ball Bearing Company in 1935. In 1941,

following his marriage to Charlotte Hughes, he transferred to the Saginaw Branch of the Detroit Ball Bearing Company. Soon after, he was promoted to manager of that operation.

Mr. Tiderington has been very active in community affairs. He is past president of the Saginaw Downtown Lions Club, the Saginaw Club, and of the Saginaw Township Board of Education. He also served as president of Junior Achievement of Saginaw County and of the United Way of Saginaw County.

He currently serves on the directing boards of St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw Cooperative Hospitals Inc., and the Navy League. He is secretary-treasurer of St. Luke's Healthcare Association and president of the Home for the Aged and of the Japanese Cultural Center and Tea House.

Other organizations that have benefited from Mr. Tiderington's board service include Family Federal Savings and Loan Association, United Way of Michigan, Saginaw County Chamber of Commerce, Samaritan Center of Saginaw Valley and Saginaw Valley Rehabilitation Center. He is past vice president of the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce.

His current memberships include the Saginaw Club, Saginaw Country Club, Torch Club, Germania of Saginaw, Hidden Valley and Otsego Ski Club, Elf Khurafeh Shrine, Royal Order of Jesters Court £74, and the Bay City Consistory. He is Past Master of Pioneer Lodge #79 F&AM, and continues to be an active member of the organization.

Mr. Tiderington is a member of Saginaw Valley State University's Cardinal Club and Coaches Corner.

The Tideringtons are parents of three sons, Robert H. III, James E. and Thomas E.

THE 1987-88 FRANC A. LANDEE AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING



ERIC F. PETERSEN PROFESSOR OF HISTORY

Eric F. Petersen, recipient of the 1987-88 Franc A. Landee Award for Excellence in Teaching, began his teaching assignments with Saginaw Valley State University in 1969 as an assistant professor of history and advanced to professor of history in 1978. He specializes in U.S. history and American social history and has developed courses examining the arms race/military preparedness, as well as the social and political effects of U.S. participation in 20th century wars, including the Korean War and the war in Vietnam.

Students comment that Dr. Petersen's classes are interesting, that he puts great detail into his lectures and obviously enjoys teaching and his subject. His classes are popular and have high enrollments at all levels.

Recognized as an innovator, Dr. Peterson has taught several courses off campus and was among the first to teach a television course. He originated a television course on the Vietnam War.

Dr. Petersen earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in history from St. Olaf College. His Master of Arts and Ph.D. degrees in history were completed at the University of California-Los Angeles. He has completed summer institute fellowships at Vanderbilt University, the University of Michigan and the University of Connecticut.

Research papers authored by Dr. Petersen have been presented at professional meetings and conferences throughout the United States. His work has been published in scholarly journals such as the "Pacific Historical Review," the "California Historical Quarterly" and the "Southern California Quarterly." He also has authored a number of unpublished papers.

Dr. Petersen is extremely active as a faculty advisor, both in the history department and for students with undeclared majors. He also has served on several honors-thesis committees and the Honors Program Committee, and twice chaired the history department.

Dr. Petersen and his wife Sally reside in Midland. They are the parents of two sons, Ethan and Seth.

THE 1987-88 EARL L. WARRICK AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH



HSUAN SHEN CHEN PROFESSOR OF PHYSICS

Dr. Hsuan Shen "Frank" Chen joined Saginaw Valley State University as an instructor of physics in 1969 and attained the rank of professor in 1979. Prior to his work at SVSU he taught and served as a research assistant at the University of Minnesota.

Dr. Chen has earned international attention for his research in optics and holography. He has more than forty published papers on various aspects of holography and applied optics. Many have appeared in international journals and results of his studies have been presented at conferences worldwide. In 1982 he conducted seminars on rainbow holography at various sites in the People's Republic of China.

Because of his acclaim, three visiting scholars from the People's Republic of China arrived in 1981 to work with Dr. Chen for a two year period. Dr. Chen currently is working with Professor Chen Ming-Yi, vice chairman of the Department of Fine Mechanical Engineering at the Shanghai University of Science and Technology.

Much of Dr. Chen's work has involved analysis of the astigmatic process that is utilized in astigmatic rainbow holography, a U. S. invention. He also has developed methods for applying laser technology to the production of computer-generated holograms – three-dimensional images of objects. Practical applications of his work include the ability to test materials for certain properties without having to physically damage or dissect the materials and the ability to produce three-dimensional images of internal organs.

Dr. Chen has involved students and research associates in his work and as the co-author of papers. Area secondary school physics teachers, fellow university physics faculty members and researchers also are the beneficiaries of his study.

The quality of Dr. Chen's work has led to numerous grants. Included are the Atomic Energy Commission Research Grant in Nuclear Physics, three National Science Foundation grants and three SVSU research grants. In 1987 Dr. Chen completed a two year research program funded by Control Data Corporation and managed by the University of Michigan. The total award was over \$70,000.

Dr. Chen is recognized as one of the top ten U.S. researchers in optical holography. His colleagues at SVSU awarded him the 1986 Faculty Association Research Award.

Dr. Chen is a member of the Optical Society of America. In 1983 he was honored as distinguished faculty member by the Michigan Association of Governing Boards and Michigan House Concurrent Resolution No. 150.

In addition to his teaching and research, Dr. Chen serves as director of the SVSU Observatory, which houses a 16 inch Schmidt Cassegrain Reflector and a number of smaller telescopes.

Dr. Chen earned a Bachelor of Science in physics from the National Taiwan University, where he received a merit scholarship in natural science. His Master of Science degree in physics was awarded by National Tsing Hua University, and he earned a second master's degree in computer engineering from the University of Michigan. He completed requirements for his Ph.D. in physics at the University of Minnesota. He also completed post-doctoral study in the University of Michigan's department of physics and was first a visiting scholar, then a visiting research scientist in the electro-optics laboratory at the U. of M. Dr. Chen, his wife Catherine and their two sons, James and John, reside in Midland.

DAVID H. ROCHE

David H. Roche received a Bachelor of Arts degree from then Saginaw Valley College in 1970, with majors in accounting and economics. While attending SVC, he served as vice president of Student Government and president of the student senate. As an undergraduate, he was awarded the Wall Street Journal student achievement award.

In 1971 Mr. Roche completed requirements for the Master of Business Administration degree at Michigan State University. He was inducted into Beta Alpha Psi, a national accounting honors society.

From 1971 to 1976 Mr. Roche was employed with Touche Ross & Co., Certified Public Accountants, as a member of the audit staff. He earned his CPA certificate in 1974.

Mr. Roche joined the Saginaw Township-based Michigan Sugar Company as controller in 1976. He was promoted to vice president-administration and assistant secretary in 1980. He also is a trustee of the U.S. Beet Sugar Association headquartered in Washington, D.C.

A Saginaw native, Mr. Roche has served on the Saginaw County Chamber of Commerce board of directors since 1983. He sits on the advisory board of St. Mary's Medical Center and has served as a division campaign co-chairman for United Way of Saginaw County.

Mr. Roche has actively supported the local activities of Boy Scouts of America and is active with Indian Guides. He is involved with various school and church activities in Saginaw Township, including the township "Support Our Schools" committee. In 1985 he served on the Educational Needs Study Committee for the Saginaw Township Community Schools. Currently he serves as a member of the strategic planning sub-committee of finance for the school district.

The Saginaw Valley Chapter of Professional Secretaries International named him "Executive of the Year" in 1987.

A past board member of the SVSU Alumni Association, Mr. Roche has taught accounting part-time at SVSU. He is the thirteenth person to receive the Distinguished Alumni Award, which is based on service to the community, the University and the SVSU Alumni Association.

Mr. Roche and his wife Rae Ann are the parents of three children, Melissa, David and Sarah. They reside in Saginaw Township. He is the son of Helen G. Roche of Saginaw and the late David C. Roche.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

Academic regalia of robe and hood are believed to have had their beginnings at the English Universities of Oxford and Cambridge during the twelfth and thirteenth centuries. The hoods are a carry-over from the times when the monks, who operated the universities, wore them to protect their shaved heads in winter or to collect alms when worn as shoulder capes.

Use of the academic robe came to the United States in 1754 with the founding of what is now Columbia University. In 1895 a commission of university officials adopted a universal code of design and color for academic garb that has undergone various revisions, the latest in 1960. Styling of robes varies for the bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees, and the width of border and length of hood increase with the type of degree. The color of the velvet border of the hood indicates the field of study, while the lining designates the colors of the institution granting the degree. In the case of Saginaw Valley State University, the colors are cardinal red and royal blue.

The mace carried by the marshal in the academic processional symbolizes authority. This mace survived the 1985 Saginaw Valley State College fire.

THE INSIGNIA OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY

The geographical area formed by Bay City, Midland and Saginaw is represented by the triangle within the Saginaw Valley State University seal. This depicts the merging of three separate urban communities, with a combined population of more than 400,000, into the metropolitan Saginaw Valley.

The three symbols within the seal are of Egyptian origin. The figure at the top stands for life or living, denoting the fact that education is an ongoing, life-long process and has a value that lasts forever.

The symbol at the lower left represents light — perhaps the inner light. It recognizes that "our knowledge is a torch of smokey pine that lights the pathway but one step ahead." Standing opposite this light of knowledge in the lower right corner is a staff, which stands for strength. This may be regarded as an appeal for the endurance necessary to search for and find the truth, and the strength to speak and live it.

The year of the University's founding, 1963, appears below the triangle.



Saginaw Valley State University was founded in 1963 as a private institution to meet higher education needs in east-central Michigan. In 1965, Saginaw Valley College (SVC) became state-assisted. In 1975 the name was changed to Saginaw Valley State College (SVSC) and, in 1987, the institution achieved university status (SVSU).

There were just 119 students when classes began in 1964, but strong academic programs, reasonable costs and a variety of extra-curricular activities attracted growing numbers of students. Today, nearly 6,000 people from Michigan, several other states, and 16 nations are enrolled in more than 60 programs of study leading to bachelor's and master's degrees. International exchange and guest professors and students and an active international program bring the added dimension of other cultures to SVSU.

The primary mission of the University is to promote the intellectual and personal growth of students. A highly qualified faculty, most of whom hold terminal degrees, teach in both day and evening classes. The average class size is under 25 students, so instructors can give personal attention to individual needs. As an important part of its mission, SVSU fosters research and creative activities. The goals of the research program are to extend knowledge, inspire superior teaching, and contribute to the intellectual, social and economic well-being of the region.

Community service is another element of the University mission. SVSU sponsors continuing education courses, conferences, workshops, entrepreneurship and technology transfer efforts. Cultural events, many campus activities and the library are open to the public.

The University has a 782-acre campus located on M-84 (Bay Road) within the triangle formed by Bay City, Saginaw and Midland. Excellent transportation routes (I-75 access within three miles) connect the rural campus with urban centers.

SVSU is one of the most modern centers for higher education in the state. Recently completed and in-progress construction projects totaling over \$60 million complement facilities built between 1966 and 1978 to provide an attractive, barrier-free campus. The new Science Building and Maurice E. Brown Hall opened for 1986 fall semester classes. The Melvin J. Zahnow Library opened early in 1987, and the Fine Arts Center and Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery later that year. Other new facilities include a 40-unit student apartment complex and the Administrative Services Building. Construction is continuing on an \$18.7 million health and physical education complex, with completion expected in the spring of 1989.

While these added facilities are important assets in meeting the University's mission, the essence of a university is not bricks and mortar, but the people who teach and learn within a building's walls. The employment and retention of highly qualified professionals to its teaching faculty and support staff is a primary goal of the University.

These new physical facilities, coupled with the commitment of SVSU personnel to serve the needs of the Saginaw Valley region, promise a bright future for the University and the people it serves.
