

CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY DEGREE



HARUO SAITO DOCTOR OF SCIENCE

Dr. Haruo Saito serves as president of SVSU's sister institution, Shikoku University, Tokushima, Japan. He was appointed to the position in April 1992 and also serves as president of Shikoku University Junior College.

Dr. Saito earned a bachelor's degree in physics from Osaka University, where he also completed his graduate work in solid state physics which culminated in his being awarded the doctorate. During graduate study he was a research associate and later became a professor at Osaka University.

From September of 1963 to November of 1964 Dr. Saito worked as a research physicist with the Oak Ridge National Laboratory in the U.S. while on leave from Osaka University. He resumed his faculty position with Osaka upon his return in 1968 and was named dean of the College of General Education in 1982. In 1987 he became director of the Research Center for the School of Education, Naruto University of Education. From 1988 to 1992 he was vice president of Naruto University and continues to hold the title of Honorary Professor there.

Saginaw Valley State University has maintained an exchange relationship with Shikoku University since 1982.

THE 1992-93 LANDEE TEACHING EXCELLENCE AWARD



ROSALIE RIEGLE TROESTER PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH

Dr. Rosalie Riegle Troester's teaching duties at SVSU go back to 1969 when she was a lecturer in English and Humanities for 12 years before joining the full-time faculty in 1981. She is a former chairperson

of the Honors Program, a position she twice held in 1985-87 and 1988-92. A magna cum laude graduate in business administration from St. Mary's College in Notre Dame (IN), she earned a master's degree from Wayne State University and was awarded a D.A. from the University of Michigan in 1983.

A member of several professional organizations, Dr. Troester has received numerous honors, awards and grants, has delivered a number of scholarly papers, and has edited and written scholarly publications and books. Among the latter are Voices From the Catholic Worker (1993), Historic Women of Michigan: A Sesquicentennial Celebration (1988), and the Police Report Writing Handbook (1984).

Dr. Troester has given numerous presentations on topics ranging from her research on the Catholic Worker Movement to African-American women writers and also on reading methods. She is active in community service organizations, including the Saginaw County Rape Crisis Center, the Saginaw YWCA, Junior League of Saginaw, American Association of University Women and the Tri-City Friends of the Michigan Women's Hall of Fame.

Dr. Troester and her husband, Edmund, live in Saginaw.

THE 1992-93 EARL L. WARRICK AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH



GAIL E. KANTAK PROFESSOR OF BIOLOGY

Dr. Gail E. Kantak has conducted extensive research throughout the Saginaw Bay watershed area. She has studied birds and plants in Bay County's Tobico Marsh, conducted research along the Saginaw River for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and researched the impact of Zebra

Mussels for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Before coming to SVSU, she conducted zoological and botanical research in the Niobrara River Valley, on the Yucatan Peninsula of Mexico, in Wyoming's Grand Teton National Park, along the Atlantic Ocean's continental shelf off America's east coast, on Apostle Island in Lake Superior and in Australia and New Zealand.

A native of Milwaukee, Dr. Kantak earned a bachelor of science degree in biological studies from Michigan State University, and was awarded master's and Ph.D. degrees in zoology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Among the professional societies that Dr. Kantak belongs to are the American Ornithologists Union, the American Society of Mammalogists, the Cooper Ornithological Society and the Ecological Society of America. She also holds memberships in the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters and the Wilson Ornithological Society. For an ecologist, Dr. Kantak has an impressive record of seven publications—research that required extensive field investigation spanning a number of years.

Dr. Kantak, who has been a member of the SVSU faculty since 1984, lives in Midland.

1993 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD



CAROLINE G.M. SCOTT

Dr. Caroline Scott enrolled in an accelerated degree program at SVSU in 1976, following ten years of motherhood and volunteer work. In 1979 she earned the Owsley Award for outstanding work in biology and collected a bachelor's degree in biology and chemistry.

Dr. Scott received acceptance to three

medical schools and chose MSU for its hands-on approach to medicine. She completed a three-year family practice residency at Saginaw Cooperative Hospitals, Inc. and now is associated with Heritage Family Physicians with offices in Birch Run and Saginaw. She is affiliated with St. Luke's and Saginaw General hospitals and St. Mary's Medical Center in Saginaw. Her professional memberships include the Saginaw County Medical Society, Saginaw Academy of Family Physicians, American Medical Women's Association, American Medical Association, Michigan State Medical Society, American Academy of Family Physicians and Michigan Academy of Family Physicians.

In September of 1992 Dr. Scott received the Outstanding Female Physician award at the first reception hosted by Saginaw Cooperative Hospitals honoring women in the local medical community. Among other honors she has been accorded are the George Adler Award for outstanding resident—emergency medicine and the Outstanding Volunteer Physician Educator—Family Practice award. She now serves as the first woman president of the 89-year old Saginaw County Medical Society.

Dr. Scott is a native of London, England. She and her husband, Gerard, came to Saginaw from Dublin, Ireland in 1966.

ACADEMIC ATTIRE

Traditions for recognizing academic accomplishments with ceremony, color and distinctive dress have existed for several centuries, dating to European universities of the Middle Ages. The academic regalia worn by participants in today's commencement procession symbolizes the degrees held and the institutions where degrees were earned. The style of these caps, gowns and hoods evolved from costumes worn during early religious processions to distinguish church and university members from the laity.

Bachelor's and master's degree gowns traditionally are black, although some universities prescribe a school color for their graduates' gowns. The bachelor's gown has long pointed sleeves while the master's gown has a sealed oblong section at the wrist. Doctoral gowns are identified by bell-shaped sleeves with velvet crossbars.

The length of the academic hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, denotes the wearer's academic achievement. The hood's length, width, color of trim and the color or colors of the lining all are symbolic. Linings, exposed in the center of the hood, indicate the colors of the degree-granting institution. For Saginaw Valley State University the colors are cardinal red and royal blue. The trim—satin for a master's degree, velvet for a doctorate—reveals the wearer's major field of study. Width of the trim is two inches, three inches and five inches for the bachelor's, master's and doctor's degree, respectively. The master's hood is pointed; the doctor's hood is bell-shaped. The hood's length is three feet for the bachelor, three and a half for the master and four for the doctor.

The customary head covering is either the mortarboard or a soft beret modeled after the cap of Cambridge University. The tassel on the cap may be black or a color indicating the degree.

The SVSU Board of Control and the President wear regalia especially designed for them in SVSU's colors. Members of the governing board of an institution are entitled to wear doctoral gowns regardless of their academic degree.

THE SEAL OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY

The triangle within the SVSU seal symbolizes the geographical area formed by Bay City, Midland and Saginaw. It denotes the linking of three separate



communities and surrounding areas through an institution dedicated to higher education.

Three symbols within the seal are of Egyptian origin. The figure at the top represents life, denoting that education is an ongoing, life-long process and has a value that lasts forever.

The symbol at the lower left represents light—perhaps the inner light. It recognizes that our knowledge is a torch of smokey pine that lights the pathway but one step ahead. Opposite the light of knowledge in the lower right corner is a staff,

which stands for strength. This may be regarded as an appeal for the endurance necessary to search for and find the truth, as well as the strength to speak and live it.

The year of the University's founding, 1963, appears below the triangle.

Saginaw Valley State University was founded in 1963 as a private institution to meet higher education needs in east-central Michigan. In 1965, Saginaw Valley College (SVC) became state-assisted. In 1975 the name was changed to Saginaw Valley State College (SVSC) and, in 1987, the institution achieved university status (SVSU).

There were just 119 students when classes began in 1964, but strong academic programs, reasonable costs and a variety of extra-curricular activities attracted growing numbers of students. Today, about 7,000 people from Michigan, several other states, and 16 nations are enrolled in more than 60 programs of study leading to bachelor's and master's degrees. International exchange and guest professors and students and an active international program bring the added dimension of other cultures to SVSU.

The primary mission of the University is to promote the intellectual and personal growth of students. A highly qualified faculty, most of whom hold terminal degrees, teach in both day and evening classes. The average class size is under 25 students, so instructors can give personal attention to individual needs. As an important part of its mission, SVSU fosters research and creative activities. The goals of the research program are to extend knowledge, inspire superior teaching, and contribute to the intellectual, social and economic well-being of the region.

Community service is another element of the University mission. SVSU sponsors continuing education courses, conferences, workshops, entrepreneurship and technology transfer efforts. Cultural events, many campus activities and the library are open to the public.

The University has a 782-acre campus located on M-84 (Bay Road) within the triangle formed by Bay City, Saginaw and Midland. Excellent transportation routes (1-75 access within three miles) connect the rural campus with urban centers.

SVSU is one of the most modern centers for higher education in the state. Recently completed construction projects totaling over \$60 million complement facilities built between 1966 and 1978 to provide an attractive, barrier-free campus. The Science Building and Maurice E. Brown Hall opened for 1986 fall semester classes. The Melvin J. Zahnow Library opened early in 1987, and the Dorothy (Honey) and Ned S. Arbury Fine Arts Center and Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery later that year. Other facilities include Pine Grove Apartments, a 40-unit student housing complex, and the Administrative Services Building. The Ryder Center was completed in fall 1989.

While these added facilities are important assets in meeting the University's mission, the essence of a university is not bricks and mortar, but the people who teach and learn within a building's walls. The employment and retention of highly qualified professionals to its teaching faculty and support staff is a primary goal of the University.

The physical facilities, coupled with the commitment of SVSU personnel to serve the needs of the Saginaw Valley region, promise a bright future for the University and the people it serves.

THE MACE

The mace carried by the marshal in the academic processional is a symbol of authority traditionally used in Britain and Canada for the opening of parliament. The name derives from the Latin *mateola*, meaning mallet or staff. In the Middle Ages, such staffs, with a metal ball at one end, were used as weapons.

SVSU's mace was designed by Victoria Gillespie, wife of SVSU Professor Thomas Gillespie. The handcrafted mace was constructed with a wooden handle and metal head. A message intended to be opened and read after 20 years was placed inside the metal head. However, a campus fire in 1985 prevented that historic occasion.

Although it was feared the mace had been totally destroyed by the fire, eventually the charred head was recovered. Mrs. Gillespie constructed a new handle, cleaned the head, replaced a red stone set in it and had a carpenter construct a box for storing the refurbished mace.

The mace is used each year during Commencement ceremonies, as well as on other auspicious occasions.
