### **CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY DEGREE**



### WILLIAM J. EDWARDS DOCTOR OF LAWS

William J. Edwards began his career in broadcasting as an announcer at radio station WBRC in his hometown, Birmingham, Alabama. Over the next several years his career advancement entailed moves to Jacksonville, Florida; Cincinnati, Ohio; Fairmont, West Virginia; Indianapolis, Indiana; and Hollywood, California.

He has served as president of G.C.C. Communications of Houston, Inc. and of Suncoast Stereo Corporation of St. Petersburg, Florida.

In 1947 Mr. Edwards founded the Lake Huron Broadcasting Corporation based in Saginaw, Michigan. In addition to compiling a distinguished business record, he became actively involved in community service here. His list of contributions to public life is long. He served as cochairman of the Saginaw chapter of ARC in 1951 and general fund chairman for the organization in 1952. He was president of the Saginaw Symphony Orchestra Association in 1954 and president of United Fund of Saginaw County from 1960-62. He also served on the boards of the Saginaw Community Chest, the Saginaw Library Commission and the American Council of United Funds. He was president of the Saginaw Rotary club in 1959-60 and holds memberships in several other service organizations.

When Saginaw Valley College was chartered as a private college in 1963, Mr. Edwards was among the community leaders to provide active support for the school's establishment. He chaired a capital campaign seeking \$4 million to purchase a campus site and construct facilities. The drive ended successfully on June 29, 1965 with \$4,240,755 raised. A month later Gov. George Romney signed a bill making SVC part of the state system of public colleges and universities.

Mr. Edwards served on SVSU's Board of Fellows from 1968 to 1975. He has served on the board of trustees of his alma mater, Birmingham-Southern College.

Honors accorded to Mr. Edwards include Saginaw Man of the Year (1950), Distinguished Service Award (Jaycees, 1951) and Outstanding Business Leaders Award (Northwood Institute, Florida, 1991).

Mr. Edwards and his wife, Julia, divide their time between homes in North Palm Beach, Florida, and Harbor Springs, Michigan.

# PROFESSOR OF POLITICAL SCIENCE

Since joining the SVSU faculty in 1989, Dr. Bradley J. Miller has gained a reputation for inspiring students to learn by going beyond the traditional classroom setting. Students in his political science classes have volunteered to work in political campaigns, and at least one became a candidate for state office.

Dr. Miller's classes also have handled phone surveys during some elections, gaining first-hand experience in the workings of the U.S. elective process. Such activities complement the theoretical knowledge presented in the classroom.

His personal experience with city and state govenrments and political campaigns led Dr. Miller to pursue a Ph.D. in political science at the University of Kentucky. He previously had earned a Master of Public Administration from Wayne State University and a B.A. in political science/public administration from Michigan State University.

Dr. Miller's research interests include volunteerism and traditional public services, quality issues in administration and alternative dispute resolution mechanisms. He has been a member of the SVSU Speakers Bureau since 1991 and speaks on a variety of topics related to his field of expertise. He also frequently serves as a consultant to local media during election periods.

A member of several professional organizations, Dr. Miller has received several honors and awards throughout his teaching career. He has served as chair of the Political Science Department at SVSU since 1992 and has been advisor for both the Pre-Law/Political Science Club and Pi Sigma Alpha Political Science Honorary. He also has served on several other University committees and is an Honors advisor for Political Science.

His scholarly activities include consulting work for several organizations, contributions to newsletters and presentation of papers at academic conferences. He has served as discussant on several panels, both for community groups and in academic settings.

Dr. Miller and his wife, Carolynn, reside in Ann Arbor.

# JEAN E. BROWN PROFESSOR OF TEACHER EDUCATION

Dr. Jean E. Brown not only conducts and writes about research, but uses the results of her own and others' research in her teaching. She is respected by colleagues as representing the best combination of research and teaching abilities.

Dr. Brown is considered one of Michigan's leaders in the field of teaching reading and writing in K-12 education. Her work to integrate reading and

writing in the classroom is innovative, and she is noted for her dedication to education in Michigan and involvement with tri-county schools.

Following teaching positions at Mississippi University for Women and Utah State University, Dr. Brown joined the SVSU faculty in 1982. She earned B.A. and M.A. degrees in English from Pacific University (Oregon) and an Ed.D. from Utah State University. She holds memberships in several professional organizations, include the National Council of Teachers of English, the International Reading Association and the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.

Dr. Brown's impressive record of publication includes numerous articles and book chapters, booklets, news columns, professional newsletter contributions and several book reviews. She also has collaborated with other SVSU faculty to write four books, two of which were selected by the National Council of Teachers of English for national distribution. She is the editor of a fifth book, *Preserving Intellectual Freedom: Fighting Censorship in the Schools*, slated for publication this fall.

Dr. Brown regularly presents papers at state and national conferences. She also has received a number of grants for her work. She has been accorded many honors and was the 1990 recipient of the Charles Carpenter Fries Award for Service to the Profession. She received the Phi Delta Kappa Research Award in 1992 and the SVSU Faculty Association Award for Scholarship in 1990.

She resides in Saginaw Township.

### TIMOTHY L. LIPAN

Timothy L. Lipan is a 1974 graduate of SVSU with a B.B.A. in marketing. As a student he took an active part in campus life and served on the Student Senate.

His commitment to the University continued after graduation. He was instrumental in founding SVSU's present Alumni Association and served as its president from 1980 to 1990. During his tenure he worked to strengthen the Association by developing a regular meeting schedule, adopting bylaws, developing short- and long-range plans and creating

guidelines for establishing constituent societies.

The Alumni Announcer newsletter was initiated during Mr. Lipan's presidency. It has been published and distributed to graduates at least three times each year since 1980.

Under his leadership, the Alumni Association worked with the SVSU Foundation to encourage alumni donations for scholarships, academic equipment, library books and other support of University programs. Partly as a result of Mr. Lipan's efforts, alumni have become an important part of the structure of the University. They serve on campus committees and are directly involved in many activities. Mr. Lipan was a member of the Presidential Search Committee in 1989.

Mr. Lipan has been employed by the American Red Cross for nearly 20 years and currently is the Executive Director of the Muskegon-Oceana Chapter. In 1991 he received the Vice President's Tiffany Award for Employee Excellence, granted by the Midwest Regional President of American Red Cross to the most outstanding Red Cross employees in the nation. In 1989 he was the recipient of the Reese Award, which usually is reserved for outstanding volunteers. The local board of directors accorded the honor to Mr. Lipan because his contribution far exceeded the responsibilities of his position.

A Muskegon area resident, Mr. Lipan is active on many local boards and committees. He is a founder of the local AIDS Forum, an active member of Rotary International, and current chairman of Muskegon's summer festival. He also is deeply involved in United Way activities.

Mr. Lipan and his wife, Bonnie, reside in Norton Shores.

### **ACADEMIC ATTIRE**

Traditions for recognizing academic accomplishments with ceremony, color and distinctive dress have existed for several centuries, dating to European universities of the Middle Ages. The academic regalia worn by participants in today's commencement procession symbolizes the degrees held and the institutions where degrees were earned. The style of these caps, gowns and hoods evolved from costumes worn during early religious processions to distinguish church and university members from the laity.

Bachelor's and master's degree gowns traditionally are black, although some universities prescribe a school color for their graduates'gowns. The bachelor's gown has long pointed sleeves while the master's gown has a sealed oblong section at the wrist. Doctoral gowns are identified by bell-shaped sleeves with velvet crossbars.

The length of the academic hood, which drapes over the back of the gown, denotes the wearer's academic achievement. The hood's length, width, color of trim and the color or colors of the lining all are symbolic. Linings, exposed in the center of the hood, indicate the colors of the degree-granting institution. For Saginaw Valley State University the colors are cardinal red and royal blue. The trim—satin for a master's degree, velvet for a doctorate—reveals the wearer's major field of study. Width of the trim is two inches, three inches and five inches for the bachelor's, master's and doctor's degree, respectively. The master's hood is pointed; the doctor's hood is bell-shaped. The hood's length is three feet for the bachelor, three and a half for the master and four for the doctor.

The customary head covering is either the mortarboard or a soft beret modeled after the cap of Cambridge University. The tassel on the cap may be black or a color indicating the degree.

The SVSU Board of Control and the President wear regalia especially designed for them in SVSU's colors. Members of the governing board of an institution are entitled to wear doctoral gowns regardless of their academic degree.

# THE SEAL OF SAGINAW VALLEY STATE UNIVERSITY

The triangle within the SVSU seal symbolizes the geographical area formed



by Bay City, Midland and Saginaw. It denotes the linking of three separate communities and surrounding areas through an institution dedicated to higher education.

Three symbols within the seal are of Egyptian origin. The figure at the top represents life, denoting that education is an ongoing, life-long process and has a value that lasts forever.

The symbol at the lower left represents light—perhaps the inner light. It recognizes that our knowledge is a torch of smokey pine that lights the pathway but one step ahead.

Opposite the light of knowledge in the lower right corner is a staff, which stands for strength. This may be regarded as an appeal for the endurance necessary to search for and find the truth, as well as the strength to speak and live it.

The year of the University's founding, 1963, appears below the triangle.

Saginaw Valley State University was founded in 1963 as a private institution to meet higher education needs in east-central Michigan. In 1965, Saginaw Valley College (SVC) became state-assisted. In 1975 the name was changed to Saginaw Valley State College (SVSC) and, in 1987, the institution achieved university status (SVSU).

There were just 119 students when classes began in 1964, but strong academic programs, reasonable costs and a variety of extra-curricular activities attracted growing numbers of students. Today, about 7,000 people from Michigan, several other states, and 16 nations are enrolled in more than 60 programs of study leading to bachelor's and master's degrees. International exchange and guest professors and students and an active international program bring the added dimension of other cultures to SVSU.

The primary mission of the University is to promote the intellectual and personal growth of students. A highly qualified faculty, most of whom hold terminal degrees, teach in both day and evening classes. The average class size is under 25 students, so instructors can give personal attention to individual needs. As an important part of its mission, SVSU fosters research and creative activities. The goals of the research program are to extend knowledge, inspire superior teaching, and contribute to the intellectual, social and economic well-being of the region.

Community service is another element of the University mission. SVSU sponsors continuing education courses, conferences, workshops, entrepreneurship and technology transfer efforts. Cultural events, many campus activities and the library are open to the public.

The University has a 782-acre campus located on M-84 (Bay Road) within the triangle formed by Bay City, Saginaw and Midland. Excellent transportation routes (1-75 access within three miles) connect the rural campus with urban centers.

SVSU is one of the most modern centers for higher education in the state. Recently completed construction projects totaling over \$60 million complement facilities built between 1966 and 1978 to provide an attractive, barrier-free campus. The Science Building and Maurice E. Brown Hall opened for 1986 fall semester classes. The Melvin J. Zahnow Library opened early in 1987, and the Dorothy (Honey) and Ned S. Arbury Fine Arts Center and Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Gallery later that year. Other facilities include Pine Grove Apartments, a 40-unit student housing complex, and the Administrative Services Building. The Ryder Center was completed in fall 1989.

While these added facilities are important assets in meeting the University's mission, the essence of a university is not bricks and mortar, but the people who teach and learn within a building's walls. The employment and retention of highly qualified professionals to its teaching faculty and support staff is a primary goal of the University.

The physical facilities, coupled with the commitment of SVSU personnel to serve the needs of the Saginaw Valley region, promise a bright future for the University and the people it serves.
