What Works for First-Year Students: Developing Self-Efficacy for Success

The December issue of *In the Loop* focused on the many challenges first-year students face as they adjust to their new lives in college. These challenges include everything from working out new relationships and exploring their sexuality to time management and the pressure of deciding on a major. For many students, it's a matter of confidence and self-efficacy, or the feeling that they can master the tools needed to succeed academically.

Naturally, this presents several challenges for instructors across all areas of study. Among those challenges is motivating and encouraging students to interact with course content, as well as learning about the SVSU academic community, in general. According to educators Arthur Chickering and Zelda Gamson, who have written extensively on the topic of student motivation and learning, one-on-one interactions such as office visits with students is one important way instructors can enhance their students' self-efficacy and intellectual commitment.

Members of the Adjunct Faculty community at SVSU who wish to meet with students in a one-on-one or small group setting can meet with students in the workspaces maintained by the Office of Adjunct Faculty Support Programs (OAFSP). Student efficacy is also more likely to exist when students feel they are in the capable hands of instructors who are authorities in their areas of study and experts in teaching the course content. Instructors should avoid being perceived as peers among their students. Self-efficacy is enhanced in students when the students solve problems themselves, rather than their instructors doing it for them. As an authority figure, instructors provide students the knowledge and the tools students need to successfully apply new knowledge.

Designing your course so that each task, lesson, or project is an extension of previously learned course material can enhance students' self-efficacy as they put their newly gained knowledge into practice. In such an environment, students learn to adapt themselves and their tools so they can make meaningful and positive contributions to a global community that is constantly changing.

Attendance Now Recorded in Cardinal Direct

SVSU will now use an online process for instructors to record students who are no shows during the first few weeks of class. Previously, the Registrar's Office collected this information on Scantron sheets. In a few days, you will be asked to log into Cardinal Direct and go to the Faculty tab. Once there, on the left side of the screen you will see a link titled: Grading and Attendance. There you will find your student roster. Select all students who have not attended class during the first few weeks. This is such an easy thing to do, but is essential in allowing the University to keep track of financial aid monies.

Course Design Workshop: Creating 'Significant Learning' Experiences

Success in the classroom depends in large part on what happens before the semester even begins. That includes designing a course that creates "Significant Learning" for students. Using Benjamin Bloom's well-known taxonomy of education as a model, Dr. L. Dee Fink, Director of the Instructional Development Program, University of Oklahoma, created a "Taxonomy of Significant Learning." Fink's model includes six elements: Foundational Knowledge, Application, Integration, Human Dimension, Caring, and Learning How to Learn.

For significant learning to occur, the learner must change, says Fink,

adding that without change, there can be no learning. The learner must be willing to "unlearn" certain assumptions and connect new knowledge to themselves and the world around them.

To learn how to design a course that creates "Significant Learning" experiences for your students. attend the three "Course Design" workshops offered by the Office of Adjunct Faculty Support Programs. Library News: First Year Students' Library Experiences

First year students needing to do research for class assignments can now link to a library website just for them. The "1st Year Student" button on the library homepage was designed with first year students' information needs in mind. Valuable resources such as print and electronic books, journal articles, newspapers and more are interactively linked in an attempt to appeal to new college students.

Resources include a search box to the library catalog, a YouTube video about the library, 3-5 minute online tutorials, and a "Chat" button that allows live conversation with a librarian for research and resource questions. Many other resources are available that also help students get

an overview of key library resources and services.

Please encourage your students to utilize the "1st Year Student" button on the library homepage so they can successfully navigate basic library resources and services, while having assistance immediately available for their questions.
