## **SVSU proceeds with Phase II of Village Student Housing**

The Board of Control Monday, Aug. 14

authorized the University to begin
construction on Phase II of the Village Student
Housing project. More than 1,200 students are
expected to live on campus this fall.

The facility will provide approximately 280 beds and is expected to be completed in August 2001. Estimated cost of the project is \$13 million. Ground breaking is expected to begin this fall.

Phase I of the Village Student Housing project, of 208 beds, opens this fall. In fall 1999, a living center for students beyond their first year opened with more than 300 residents. This fall's expected residency numbers are up from 1999's 930 on-campus residents.


Robert L. Maurovich, vice president for

student services and enrollment management, said an additional 150 new students are expected each year for the next five years and many will need housing accommodations.

Added Richard P. Thompson, dean of student affairs, "Retention is so great, we filled the University Village complex and have 55 students on a waiting list. We've also moved some freshmen into the Living Center because of the number of new freshman.

"It's a good problem to have," Thompson continued, "but if we don't consider a 2001 housing project now, we will have 200-plus students who couldn't live on campus."

President Eric Gilbertson added that Phase II was part of the Board's five-year plan for the University.

### Nine awarded LULAC Scholarships

Nine SVSU students were among 35 recently awarded scholarships from the League of United Latin American Citizens. The nine were recognized during a special reception Thursday, Aug. 17 at SVSU. During the reception, LULAC awarded more than \$19,000 scholarships for the 2000-01 academic year.

This year is the 21st Annual Scholarship Awards Reception. The reception site alternates between SVSU and Delta College. The LULAC mission is to promote educational opportunities for Hispanic students and to encourage good citizenship, cultural pride and community involvement.

The Saginaw LULAC Council No. 11055 was established in 1979 and awarded \$3,000 in its first-year. Since its founding, the local council has awarded more than a quarter of a million dollars to nearly 1,000 local (Saginaw, Bay, and Midland counties) Hispanic students.

#### Victim-Offender Reconciliation Program (VORP) offered

This 16-hour series, offered Sept. 22 and 23, begins with overviews of the adult criminal and juvenile justice systems. Diversion and probation will be emphasized. In addition, a history of restorative justice will be presented, along with an explanation of alternative dispute resolution and modern legal culture. The workshop focuses on procedures of mediation between victims and offenders, including the roles of prosecutors' offices, courts and probation. Role-playing scenarios will be utilized.

## SVSU graduates Taiwan M.B.A., M.A. students, welcomes Taiwan alumni to campus



A gift of the SVSU Alumni Association in Taiwan, the *Tai Chi* sculpture, by artist Ju Ming, was presented to SVSU officials at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 17. The piece is located near the Bell Tower.

Commencement ceremonies took place Aug. 17 in Founders Hall for 17 students graduating as members of the ninth class of the Taiwan M.B.A. program. To date, 144 students have graduated from the program. The first Taiwan M.B.A. course was taught in Taipei, Taiwan during May 1991. The first class graduated in December 1992.

Another 21 students completed requirements for the Master of Arts in Communication and Multimedia. Established in 1998, this interdisciplinary program is offered through the College of Arts and Behavioral Sciences, and provides educational and professional development for people seeking advanced preparation in the theory, practice and technology of contemporary organizational communication.



# Board okays new housing, accepts \$1.7 million technology grant

The Board of Control Monday, Aug. 14 found that again the campus is faced with an oncampus housing shortage. With more than 1,200 students expected to live on campus this fall, the Board authorized the University to begin construction on Phase II of the Village Student Housing project. (See Interior article, Page 1.)

More than 30 new faculty members will be on campus this fall. The Board was provided with a list of new faculty and their credentials (see insert). Robert S.P. Yien, vice president for academic affairs, told the Board that with this year's new class, 42 percent of SVSU's faculty are new hires since 1995.

The Board accepted a U.S. Department of Education Title III grant for \$1.7 million for technological infrastructure improvements over a five-year period. The grant value is \$350,000 per year. The grant funding will go toward campus infrastructure support, both internal and external, for technology infusion. First year plans call for an upgrade to the campus network for Internet II, connecting to an Internet II consortium. During the next two years, plans are to connect the SVSU network with regional education networks. Plans also are to provide significant technology upgrades to several classrooms.

The Board also authorized the University to enter a lease agreement, if necessary, with the State Building Authority. The Board took the action regarding "Instructional Facility No. 3," the expansion of the University's existing Science Building.

In other action, the Board:

- Adopted a revised SVSU Student Code of Conduct, including an alteration to the campus Internet acceptable use policy to address excessive use of available resources.
- Appointed Barbara Mahar Lincoln (Saginaw) to the Marshall M. Fredericks Sculpture Museum Board. In addition, board members Carole Cassio (Colorado), Alma Gilmore Doud (Saginaw), Rosalind Rymal (Brighton) and Lyla Williams (Midland) were reappointed.
- Received an enrollment progress report, showing an undergraduate enrollment increase. Robert L. Maurovich, vice president for student services and enrollment management, said he is optimistic the University will realize a 4.25 percent increase in credit hours for fall semester.
- Maurovich also presented an academic profile of this year's freshman class. The class includes 28 percent with high school grade point averages of 3.50 or better; 31 percent have GPAs between 3.00 and 3.49. Fifty-four Presidential Scholars enrolled this year (Presidential Scholars are their high schools' valedictorians or salutatorians). In addition, the freshman class includes 28 Award for Excellence Scholarship recipients students with a high school GPA of at least 3.70 and an ACT composite score of 28.
- Received a report from Larry Engel, director of school and university partnerships, on the status of public school academies chartered by SVSU.
