Two appointed to seats on SVSU Board of Control

GOVERNOR JOHN ENGLER has appointed Jerome L. Yantz and reappointed Ruth Braun to the SVSU Board of Control, which is responsible for the general supervision of the institution, and the control and direction of all expenditures from the institution's funds.

Yantz, of Bay City, is a CPA and President of Weinlander Fitzhugh. In his 40 years with the company, he has served as a specialist in business development, accounting, taxes, financial planning and asset management for small and mid-size businesses.

"The combination of insight and expertise that Jerome has to offer will make him a remarkable asset to the SVSU Board of Control," Engler said.

Yantz is replacing Tom Rush, of Midland, whose term expired. Yantz' term will expire July 21, 2007.

A Saginaw resident, Braun is a former member of the State Board of Education. She also served on the State of Michigan Bicentennial Commission and Educational Advisory Committee. Her term on the Board also will expire July 21, 2007.
