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SVSU names building for Herbert D. Doan

The Saginaw Valley State University Board of Control Monday, March 19 approved the naming of "Instructional Facility No. 3" for Herbert (Ted) Dow Doan.

Doan, of Midland, is a former president of The Dow Chemical Co., a former member of The Dow Board of Directors and the board of directors of Dow Corning Corp. He was founder of Doan Associates and a founder of Doan Resources Corp. Doan is a member of the board of directors of Neogen Corp. in East Lansing, chairman of the board of the Michigan Molecular Institute in Midland; and is on the board of Dendritech Inc., a for-profit subsidiary of MMI. He was active in the state through his co-chairmanship of Gov. John Engler's Venture Capital Task Force and as president of the Michigan High Technology Task Force. Doan also served on the National Science Board and was its vice chairman. He also served on the board of the Office of Technology Assessment in Washington, DC.


In naming the building for Doan, the SVSU Board resolution said Doan's leadership with Dow and his support of the sciences have "enriched the lives of the people in the region and beyond, and has provided a solid foundation on which the campus continues to expand and develop." He also was cited for his service and generosity to SVSU during its 38-year history.

Doan majored in chemical engineering at Cornell University and served in the U.S. Air Force. He also served on the National Advisory Committee for the College of Engineering at the University of Michigan, and is a former member of the University of Chicago Board of Governors for Argonne National Laboratories. Doan is a founding board member of ARCH Development Corp., Chicago, Ill. He is a

member of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, the American Chemical Society and Sigma Xi.

"The Herbert Dow Doan Science Building" is an expansion of the existing Science Building. The building will cost \$25 million – 75 percent provided by the state of Michigan and 25 percent by the University. It includes 105,000 square feet of new construction and 38,530 of renovated area. The two-story facility fills-in between the Science Building and Zahn Library, with the new construction to the east. It includes classrooms, computer laboratories, computer science teaching laboratories, chemistry laboratories, the physics and biology departments, as well as laboratory support spaces and faculty offices.

Architect for the building is Jickling Lyman Powell Associates Inc. of Troy. General contractor is Spence Bros. of Saginaw. Completion is expected this summer.

- **Jeffrey S. Ashley**, assistant professor of political science, had an article titled "The Social and Political Influence of Betty Ford" accepted for publication in *White House Studies*, a refereed journal that takes an interdisciplinary approach to viewing the president, White House events, and the people who have played a role in the evolution of the presidency.
- **Tai-Chi Lee**, professor of computer science, attended the 39th Annual ACM (Association for Computing Machinery) Southeast Conference where he presented a paper titled "Open Source Network Computing." The purpose of this research is to develop a diskless X terminal package that would allow inexpensive hardware, including obsolete/older PCs and workstations, to be used as network booted X-Windowing System display clients for a Unix server. The conference took place March 16 and 17 at the University of Georgia in Athens.
- **Matthew Zivich**, professor of art, has a series of four photographic works on display at the Lansing Art Gallery, 425 S. Grand Avenue, Lansing. The exhibition is called "Celebrating the Figure: A Body of Work" and is a competitive exhibition open to Michigan artists 18 years or older. The works must incorporate the human figure. The juror was Robert J. Wilbert, professor emeritus in the Department of Art and Art History at Wayne State University. Zivich's works are photographs that comprise the series, *The Goldscheider Poses* and consist of a total of 24 poses based on figures from Michelangelo's Sistine Chapel frescoes. The show runs through April 19.

Author/Scholar to discuss Trust, Deception and Communication

Judee Burgoon, director of Human Communication Research of the Center for the Management of Information at the University of Arizona, will discuss "Trust, Deception and Communication in Mediated Interaction" at 7 p.m., Monday, April 2 in the Rhea Miller Recital Hall.

Burgoon has authored or co-authored seven books and monographs and nearly 200 articles,

chapters and reviews related to nonverbal and relational communication, interpersonal relationships, the impact of new communication technologies on interaction, and public opinion toward the media.

In 1999, Burgoon was awarded the National Communication Association's Distinguished Scholar Award, its highest award for a lifetime of scholarly achievement. A recent published survey identified her as the most prolific female scholar in the field of communication in the 20th century. She holds a doctorate from West Virginia University in communication and educational psychology.

Burgoon's appearance is part of SVSU's Dow Visiting Scholars and Artists Series. The program was endowed through a generous donation to the University by the Herbert H. and Grace A. Dow Foundation of Midland.

Copyright workshop presented

A workshop titled "Faculty and Fair Use in the Digital Age" will be offered Tuesday, April 3 from 9 a.m. to noon in the Emeriti Room.

The Copyright Act is highly technical and difficult to understand. The electronic environment complicates copyright issues for many faculty members. This workshop will highlight areas important in teaching and learning and will focus on interpreting the law so that faculty members may exercise their fair use rights to the fullest extent the law allows. Faculty members often are unaware that their use of copyrighted works for distribution to classes may infringe copyright.

Among the issues to be addressed are:

- Distribution of materials either through photocopying or creating coursepacks
- Making copyrighted works available to students on course websites
- Library electronic services
- Using materials on the Internet and World Wide Web
- Video and other nonprint materials in the classroom
- Distance learning
- Online service provider liability

Presenter will be Laura N. Lolly Gasaway, director of the Law Library and professor of law at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

SVSU Student Art Project Makes 'Plea' — Students in Craig Prime's "Introduction to Crafts" class pose near an environmental installation that focuses on school violence. Among the criteria for the class project was to create a structure 30 inches high and 20 inches wide, using lost or discarded items. The students also were asked to write five words that would represent the last five words they could speak to the world. Twenty-four students placed their assembled objects three to four feet apart, creating a meandering 100-foot visual. Between each support hangs an orange nylon banner Prime provided with the word "Plea" written on one side and the student's last five words to the world written on the other. The entire installation was a temporary segment of the SVSU campus environment through Monday, March 26 — it will leave almost as fast as it appeared, representing the lives lost to violence. Upon disassembling the installation, each student was asked to present their structure to an organization, person or school of their choice.

Meaghan Nunn placed second in Poetry. Phil Garno was second in Prose and third in Dramatic Interpretation. Tim Horenziak was second in Dramatic Interpretation. Melanie Rusz was fourth in After Dinner Speaking. Eric L. Johnson placed fifth in poetry.
