## Edwards Lecture to focus on painting and literature

The Department of Philosophy is sponsoring the 2001 Edwards Lecture in Philosophy and Religion. Dr. Arindam Chakrabarti, professor of philosophy from the University of Hawaii, will present "Aesthetics of the Ugly and the Hideous," at 7 p.m., Monday, Oct. 8 in Founders Hall.


In this lecture, Chakrabarti will consider the question, "Can disgustingly ugly things become the subject of good art?" He will address the issue using an ancient Indian theoretical framework, and assess the representation of the repulsive in modern European and South Asian painting and literature.

After being trained as a philosopher of language at Oxford, Chakrabarti spent several years receiving traditional training in Indian

logic (Navya Nyaya) and metaphysics, which made him fluent in Sanskrit. Before going to Hawaii in 1997, he was a professor in the Department of Philosophy at the University of Delhi, India.

Chakrabarti has edited or authored four books, and has published numerous articles and reviews. He currently is working on a book on moral psychology.



## SVSU receives nursing grants

The Crystal M. Lange College of Nursing and Health Sciences received three grants this fall.

The first is a \$523,000 Nursing Workforce Diversity Grant titled "Project OPEN" that will support the recruitment and retention of students from educationally and financially disadvantaged backgrounds, and culturally diverse students in professional nursing education, 2001-2004.

The college also received a \$100,000 state grant to support the development of a parish nurse network for the Bay County region.

A third grant for \$200,000 (\$50,000 each year for four years) with the Saginaw County

Health Department was received to evaluate a federal Healthy Start grant, "New Beginnings," which has as its goal the reduction of African-American infant mortality by 50 percent.

## Administration & Business Affairs Division announces reorganization

The following changes in the Administration and Business Affairs Division are effective immediately:

### Business Services

To accommodate the workload associated with the growth of the University, as well as the purchasing of equipment and furnishings for new building construction, Kathy Nowaczyk will assume the duties of a newly-created position, University Buyer.

### Human Resources

In recognition of increased operating complexities and a commitment to provide a higher level of service to the University community, the Office of Human Resources will be restructured. The new structure will present two distinct (yet interactive) components.

1. Creation of a department within the Office of the Controller titled "Employment and Compensation Services." This department, to be managed by Dave Martin, will integrate employee benefits and employment and hiring responsibilities with the payroll function. Ann Miner, Jodi Hutchinson and Lorie Kohn will report directly to Martin.

2. Establishment of an Office of Staff Relations reporting to the Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs. Doug Dawson has agreed to serve as Interim Director of Staff Relations, and the process of recruiting an assistant director is under way. This office will be responsible for contract negotiation and administration, planning and implementation of new personnel programs, development of staff training programs and human resources policy initiatives.

These operations will be moved to Wickes Hall by Nov. 1.

### Office of the Controller

Consistent with the changes discussed above, this office will now become the Office of the Controller and Human Resources. The search process for a Controller is under way.

### Office of the Vice President

The Assistant to the Vice President position has been eliminated.
