Dr. William Hoffmann has signed contracts to write two articles for the newly established Encyclopedia of Southern History. The editors selected Hoffmann to write on Andrew Jackson's Jefferson Day Toast, and on Willie P. Mangum, a North Carolina senator and national Whig leader. Hoffmann is the author of Andrew Jackson and North Carolina Politics. Authors for the encyclopedia were selected on the basis of scholarly reputation.

Dick Bologna has been appointed by the Saginaw County Department of Health to serve on its Substance Abuse Advisory Committee. The committee plans to improve substance abuse programs in Saginaw County.

Dr. William Smith has published "A Resource Bibliography of American Indian Literature" in the January issue of English Journal, a publication of the National Council of Teachers of English. The article is a bibliographical essay presenting and evaluating 22 books in the field of American Indian literature.

An effort is being made by members of the SVC staff to establish the Saginaw Valley College Alumni Association. Search letters have been sent to the 930 alumni to secure correct addresses. Upon receipt of the correct addresses, an alumni card will be sent, which will permit the alumni free access to library facilities, sports events, and student activities. For those interested in art, February provides a lot of opportunities on campus. The Fourth Annual Printmaking Show will be held in the Workshop Gallery in the '68 Building throughout the month; and the Roten Galleries of Baltimore, Maryland, will bring original graphic art to the campus on Tuesday, February 19. The exhibition will be shown in the Wickes Hall Library from 12 noon to 7 p.m.

The Theatre Arts Department will produce its first play of the winter season on February 22, 23, and 24. "Where Has Tommy Flowers Gone?" was named one of the ten best plays of the 1971 season by Time Magazine. Tickets may be bought at the Student Activities Office or the Theatre Arts Office.
