The college has received a \$30,000 federal grant to develop the Cooperative Education program. The grant is for the 1974-75 academic year, and is renewable for another two years. Program Director Gene Hamilton said he will be researching a number of unanswered questions, such as whether to give academic credit for work-study experience.

Hamilton said approximately 100 students have participated in some work experience paralleling their career study. These work experiences are varied, he said, to remain flexible to individual student needs. Work experiences have included one semester on a full-time job and the next semester in college, and part-time work experience combined with college attendance.

The charter for Sigma Pi Sigma, the national physics honor society within the Society of Physics Students, has arrived and is hung in Room 246. Francis Chan and other members of the physics faculty invite interested persons to drop by and see it. Membership in the society is limited to individuals who are in the upper one-third of their class in general scholarship. Six students and alumni were inducted into
