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## CAMPUS NOTES

The Art Department will sponsor a "Super-8 Animation" workshop on filmmaking conducted by Michael Lilly of Swartz Creek on Wednesday, April 2, at 10 a.m. in Room 18 of the Project '68 Building. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Lilly, a graduate of Western Michigan University and Herron Art Institute in Indianapolis, Indiana, has studied filmmaking at the University of California and the Flint Institute of Art, and is currently director of filmmaking for the Swartz Creek School System. His work was included in the 1975 Michigan Focus Show in Detroit.

John Clinkenbeard, Bill Elliott, and Larry Kickham will offer a workshop on "Medical Insurance and Social Security Erosion of Income" on Friday, April 4, at 12 noon in Room 234. They will offer explanations and assistance on BC/BS forms and procedures, and will explain the serious losses in retirement income suffered because of rapidly increasing Social Security costs. All faculty and staff are invited to attend.

Erik Beckman will present a paper entitled "To Attract and Retain: A Commentary on Police Personnel Practices" to the Public Service Section of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts, and Letters on Friday, April 4, at the University of Michigan.

New jackets and coordinated choir outfits, purchased with funds from the sale of the college's radio station, will be worn for the first time at the Music Department's Spring Choral Concert on Thursday, April 3, at 8 p.m. in the Theatre Building. The SVSC Singers and the College Choir have performed at Delta College, Bridgeport High School, Carrollton High School, Northwest High School, and Central Michigan University's School of Music.

Ms. Joy Hargrove and Dr. Janet Robinson will present research papers at the 10th International Congress of Gerontology, June 22 through 27, at Tel Aviv, Israel. Ms. Hargrove will discuss "Increasing Life-Period as a Determinant in the Motivational Operation and Dissolution of the Cognitive Psychological Process," and Dr. Robinson will discuss "Changes with Age in Structuring of Information for Utilization in Memory."

The Criminal Justice Department will sponsor three seminars on Crisis Intervention Training for police personnel. The first will be held on campus April 7 through 11. The purpose of the seminars, said Erik Beckman, is to enable the police officer to understand and resolve crisis situations involving family disturbances, ethnic and minority group relations, mentally ill persons, suicidal persons, street tensions, neighborhood problems, and labor disputes.

Instructors for the seminar are: Dr. Richard Blak of the Detroit Juvenile Court; Timothy Braaten, Director of Research of the Saginaw Police Department; James Burke of the Macomb County Criminal Justice Training Center; Ms. Joy Hargrove, assistant professor of Psychology; David Smydra, Jackson Police Department Administrative Assistant; and Lt. Ray Voelker of the Saginaw Police Department.

"Self-Defense for Women," a common-sense approach to personal protection, will be taught as a non-credit course during the spring semester. The course, which combines the techniques of judo, karate, and ju-jutsu, begins Monday, May 12. It will meet for eight weeks from 7:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the gym. The course also will include physical fitness training through exercises. Interested persons may register with John Broadfoot in the Continuing Education Office, or register the night of the course.
