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GOALS AND OBJECTIVES COMMITTEE

To the SVSC Community:

Within the past six weeks the Goals and Objectives Committee has organized and begun its work. The following is a report on its proceedings thus far and a request for your cooperation in assisting its future progress.

To facilitate its task, this ad hoc Committee has designated, among its membership, three sub-committees: Academic Services, Student Services, and Community Services. The Committee as a whole will consider the area of institutional support. Each sub-committee has begun to identify areas and issues both direct and indirect which will serve as the basis for recommendations it will include in a preliminary report by September 1975. In addition, the Committee has met informally with Delta College's Long-Range Planning Committee to discuss common concerns, and has established a liaison sub-committee with it.

During the past two weeks, the sub-committees have begun to gather information and opinion by contacting several of you with questionnaires. That contact will continue and expand in the immediate future. Many of you also will be asked to meet personally with the sub-committees to explore, in depth, specific areas. Your cooperation in this information gathering process is absolutely necessary to insure that the Committee's recommendations are realistic and broadly based.

Finally, any individual or group within the College who wish to have direct input to the Committee should do so by addressing their recommendations or position on any issue, in writing, to Professor John Jezierski, 363 Wickes Hall. The Committee will include this input in its deliberations.

CAMPUS NOTES.

The college's class of 1974 did well in last year's job market, according to a survey completed by Mrs. Elizabeth Gibson. Her figures show that 88 per cent of the graduates seeking employment were successful, and she said SVSC graduates equaled or exceeded employment success of other college graduates across the country. The survey was sent to 323 graduates, and 164 or 51 per cent were returned.

The majority of the graduates were employed by schools, industry, and businesses within the 13-county college service area. Other graduates took jobs in Georgia, Kentucky, Colorado, Missouri, and South Africa.

The majority of the graduates took jobs in business administration or teaching. Twenty per cent of the class went into post-graduate training in education, law, social work, liberal arts, or business. The survey showed that liberal arts graduates with salable skills had the same success in getting hired as the specifically career-oriented students. Mrs. Gibson said, SVSC graduates were marketable as evidenced by the fact that only 2.9 per cent of the women and 4.6 per cent of the men could be viewed as employed in positions not commensurate with their academic preparation.

A book review by Dr. William Smith has been published in the latest issue of American Indian Quarterly. The review deals with Shem Ham & Japheth: The Papers of W.O. Tuggle Comprising His Indian Diary, Sketches & Observations, Myths, & Washington Journal, edited by Eugene Current-Garcia with Dorothy B. Hatfield. The review evaluates this edition's contributions to the field of American Indian studies.

Approximately 300 finalists in the Math Olympics will be on campus this Friday to take the concluding part of the test. Over 4700 high school students from 51 area high schools took Part I. Winners will be announced at the annual meeting of the Michigan Council of Teachers of Mathematics, which will meet on Saturday, April 19, at Doan Center.
