CAMPUS NOTES

Doan Center will be the site of a Rotary Information Institute this Saturday, October 11, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Approximately 75 representatives from 33 clubs will attend.

The Chrysallis Center will sponsor another five-week Assertive Training Program beginning Saturday, October 25. The workshop, which meets from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon, is designed to teach the difference between aggressive behavior and assertive behavior.

The Center will also offer the Self-Inventory Testing Program, a series of five personality, vocational, and interest tests, on Thursday, October 23, at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. Interested persons may contact Chrysallis, ext. 385.

Fall enrollment figures showed a 27.5 per cent increase in headcount, and a 21.8 per cent increase in credit hour production. The increase could be followed by a major increase for the winter term, according to Dick Thompson, Registrar. The college has a total headcount of 3,242 students with 31,341 credit hours.
