BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Faculty Association Report

Dr. Walter T. James read a communication from Dr. David Weaver, president of the SVSCFA, announcing the establishment of a fund to purchase a picture or other work of art in memory of Dr. JoAnn Lazarus, who passed away last week. All members of the college community were asked to contribute to the fund, chaired by Dr. Leslie Whittaker.

Administrative Report

Dick Thompson, Acting Director of Admissions, said applications for winter semester are up 42 per cent over this time last year, with first-time-in-college applications up 80 per cent. With an expected attrition rate of 20 per cent, or 625 students, Thompson still expects the college to keep its enrollment rate despite the trend to have a 5-10 per cent drop in the number of students enrolled for the winter semester as compared to the fall semester.

Dr. Ryder added that the college is expecting a 20.8 per cent increase in student body next fall, and is trying to secure State support for five additional portable classrooms.

Dr. Ryder said the total budget cuts proposed for SVSC is almost 10 per cent of the college's appropriations, and that the college will have to cut back on library resources and delay hiring of certain administrative positions. He said the college has a hearing with the Budget Office on Wednesday, during which time they will discuss this and next year's budget. The Budget Officer from the Governor's Office will be on campus this Friday, November 21, to meet with college officials. Dr. Ryder said he will delay any action until the cuts are approved by the Legislature.

Committee Reports

The Board approved a motion for the college to pay retirement plan for all salaries up to \$12,000, beyond that the employee pays 5%.

The Board approved expenditure of \$4,000 for the paving of Parking Lot A; authorized the expenditure of \$4,769 to the firm of Grables, Mills & Young, Inc., and \$81,726 to the Bourdow Trucking Company for construction of the new Parking Lot E, east of Wickes Hall.
