CAMPUS NOTES

James Kilpatrick, syndicated newspaper columnist and television commentator, will speak on "Leadership, Technology, and Politics" tonight at 8 p.m. in the Theatre Building. Kilpatrick's visit is sponsored by the college's Academy of Applied Philosophy.

The first in a series of mid-afternoon rehearsal/performances by the Cardinal Concert Band will be Wednesday, January 28, at 3 p.m. in the lower level of Doan Center. The concerts will continue each Wednesday afternoon.

The Concert Band has 55 members, and features many fine musicians from the tri-cities, including two out-of-state players. Members of the audience will participate in a drawing at each of the concerts. At the final concert in April, the winners will be in a drawing and the lucky person gets a prize.

The Cardinal Jazz Ensemble will present a rehearsal/performance next Tuesday, from 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. in Room 16 of the '68 Building. Sitting/standing room is available to all jazz lovers.

The National Alliance of Businessmen, in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor and Veterans Administration, will present a Veterans Employment Seminar Program this Thursday, January 29, at 1 p.m. in the lower level of Doan Center.

The retirement reception for Heine Loeffler has been changed from this Thursday to Friday, from 3 p.m. to 4 p.m. in the lower level of Doan Center.

Representatives of the State Board of Nursing will be on campus from Monday, February 2 to Friday, February 6 to inspect the college's facilities. This visit is the final step in gaining approval for the college's nursing program.

Education's influence on choices in the consumer's world will be discussed by faculty and community leaders in a Humanities class on Thursday, January 29, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. in Room 319. The panel discussion, which will be taped by WBCM radio for later broadcast, is one in the Forge and Flame series arranged by the Chrysallis Center. Panel members will include Dr. J. James Thomas, associate professor of English; Dr. Bernyce Smith, associate professor of Education and English; Douglas J. Doane, principal of Saginaw Eisenhower High School; and Miss Irene Warsaw, light verse writer from Bay City. Mrs. Rose Collamer, director of Chrysallis, will moderate the discussion. The topic will be "The Desire to Express Kinship: Buy, Buy, Buy?--The Consumption of Goods and Services as a Social Value."

The Wickes Hall faculty parking area has been extended south to provide parking spaces for visitors, volunteer workers at the Triskelion Gift Shop, and handicapped persons. The number of persons receiving handicap permits has increased greatly this winter semester.

The Office of Campus Safety and Security will be permanently located in the former game room area in Doan Center. The office is presently located in Room 16 of the Project '68 Building. Zane Rybkowski, director, said his new office will be ready soon.

Two research papers co-authored by Dr. Suk-Koo Yun, associate professor of Physics, have been accepted for publication by The Physical Review. The papers were co-authored while Yun was a visiting professor at the Randall Laboratory of Physics at the University of Michigan during the summer of 1975. During his sabbatical, Yun was a visiting professor at Harvard University. A paper based on his work there has been submitted to The Physical Review for possible publication.

Dr. Donna Read, assistant professor of Education, will present a paper at the Great Lakes Regional Conference of the International Reading Association in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on February 6. The paper is titled "Language of Children," and will be presented at the session "Early Childhood and Reading."

A paper by Dr. Brian G. Chow, associate professor of Physics, has been published by the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, Washington, D.C., an organization chaired by Professor Paul W. McCracken. The article disputes the assertion that fast breeder reactors can provide an overall savings on the cost of generating electricity. Chow's monograph was reviewed by various experts, including Dr. Glenn Seaborg, Nobel laureate and former chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission; Dr. Chauncey Starr, president of Electric Power Research Institute; Dr. Thomas Cochran, nuclear physicist; and Dr. Edward J. Mitchell, professor of Business Economics at the University of Michigan.
