SPACE CHANGES

Look for some major changes in Wickes Hall when classes resume March 8 after the spring break.

The library will be shifted around to provide greater book security and open areas for new books soon to be purchased.

The book check-out counter will be moved to the southwest corner of the library. The reading area in the northwest corner will not be touched, and a new reading and study area will be created in the space now occupied by the periodical stands, which will be condensed into a smaller space. As the book collection increases over the next two years, the southeast study area will be eliminated.

Library changes include closing all entrances to the library except the southwest door. All the doors can be used for exit during an emergency.

The two lavatories on the north wall of the second floor will be in the process of transformation into animal and plant labs for biology. Biology now has no space for the mice and rats needed in class experiments, and no space to raise the necessary plants. The fixtures in the lavatories will be removed, but will be replaced in the future when a new building provides the lab space needed.

CAMPUS NOTES

The Department of Safety and Security is now located in Doan Center, at the west end of the building between the game room and cafeteria. During regular class sessions, its hours will be 8 a.m. to 12 midnight Monday through Friday. The department has added a new extension, 555, which is to be used for emergencies only. All other calls should be made on either 527/528. The emergency number is available 8 a.m. to 12 midnight, Monday through Friday. The college has received two major gifts, totaling \$181,000, for the construction of Pioneer Hall of Engineering and Technology. One gift of \$75,000 is from Mrs. Josephine Ashmun of Midland, and the other is an anonymous gift of \$106,000. The two gifts bring the total for Pioneer Hall to \$956,000. The college intends to raise \$2,700,000 to build and equip the building.

The college will be on Spring Break February 28 through March 7. No classes will be held during that time.

The college will interview four candidates within the next month for an appointment as director of the Institute of Polish Studies and as a full-time faculty member. The individual selected will teach either in the history or modern foreign languages department, depending on his/her area of study. The first candidate, Dr. James Sehnert from Allendale, Michigan, will be on campus today, and give a public address at 4 p.m. in the theatre building. The public has been invited to attend the session.

The department of criminal justice is sponsoring the second in its series of Crisis Intervention Training seminars for law enforcement officers March 1 through March 5. The project is funded by a grant from the Office of Criminal Justice Programs of the State of Michigan. Ray Voelker, associate professor of criminal justice, is project director. Instructors for the seminar include Dr. Martin Shinedling, associate professor of psychology; Ms. Joy Hargrove, assistant professor of psychology; and Dr. Robert S.P. Yien, associate professor of sociology.

The Chrysallis Center, under a grant from the Michigan Council for the Humanities, will continue its "Forge and Flame" series with an hour-long radio broadcast this Sunday, February 29, on WBCM at 9:15 a.m. The topic for the discussion is "The Desire to Express Kinship---Buy, Buy, Buy? The Consumption of Goods and Services as a Social Value." Panelists include Dr. J. James Thomas, associate professor of English; Dr. Bernyce Smith, associate professor of education and English; Douglas J. Doane, principal of Eisenhower High School; and Miss Irene Warsaw, light verse writer from Bay City.
