CAMPUS NOTES

Adolph Ayala, instructor of Spanish, has been selected to appear in the Bicentennial edition of Who's Who Among Hispanic Americans in the United States.

Dr. Barron Hirsch, professor of art, has been appointed chairman of the judging committee for the Owosso Area Art Competition, to be held at John Wesley College on April 24. Six judges will review the work, awarding scholarships to John Wesley to the winners.

A new 55-gallon marine aquarium has been donated to the biology department by Dominic Damore, a senior biology student in Dr. Walter Rathkamp's class. Damore is owner of Ocean Odyssey in Bay Plaza. He will set up the aquarium, also donating the initial supply of salt water fish and animals. The gift is valued at \$1,000.
