Dr. Jack Ryder will give the oaths of office to the new officers and senators of the Student Government tomorrow, April 7, at 4:30 p.m. in Doan Center. This is the first such ceremony at the college to inaugurate a new student government slate of officials.

The campus' Office of Student Activities and La Nueva Generacion will co-sponsor a performance of Cheech and Chong this Thursday, April 8, at 8 p.m. in the Cardinal Gym. There is a \$4 admission charge. Proceeds from the event will go toward La Nueva's scholarship fund. Tickets may be purchased in the Student Activities Office in Doan Center.

Two students, Ruth Ann Bastone and Roberta Majeske, will give a recital on Thursday, April 8, at 8 p.m. in the Theatre Building. There is no admission charge. Ms. Bastone will play the flute and Ms. Majeske will play the piano.

Isackson, one of the ten students who graduated in the charter class of 1966, will conduct a seminar at 3:30 p.m. in Room 234. He is now an engineer working with polymers for Chrysler Corporation. An awards ceremony will be held at 3 p.m. Dinner is planned for 5:30 p.m. at Schweitzer's North in Midland. Dr. Philip L. Kumler, associate professor of chemistry, is general chairman.

The college staff will take on the Business Club in a basketball game this Friday, April 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Cardinal Gym. Everyone is invited to come and cheer for their favorite team.

Kite-flyers and crafts-seekers should come out to the college this Saturday, April 10. The Food Service is sponsoring a kite-flying contest at 1 p.m. on the soccer field, and the Office of Campus Activities is sponsoring a Spring Arts and Crafts Fair in Doan Center from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.
