## BOARD OF CONTROL SETS GROUNDBREAKING

Announcement of groundbreaking ceremonies for Pioneer Hall of Engineering and Technology highlighted Monday night's Board of Control meeting. Festivities are slated for 10:30 am on Saturday, October 23, prior to the 1:30 pm S.V.S.C. Homecoming football game with Wayne State University. The new 45,000 square foot facility will house classrooms and laboratories for Engineering and Technology students, with completion expected by next fall. To date, \$2,181,000 of the \$2,700,00 project cost has been raised, all from private donations.

Progress was also reported on attempts to secure state and federal funding for Instructional Facility No. 2, a proposed new major science facility which would also incorporate classroom and office space. Estimated to cost between \$9 and \$10 million, the project is presently being considered by state officials in Lansing.

A new intercollegiate program for men's and women's Track and Cross Country was also approved with Dr. Doug Hansen serving as coach, plus modest new intramural programs for a number of on-campus sports.

Fall semester registration figures show a 4% increase in on-campus enrollment and a 3% gain in total students to 3,332, who have registered for a new high of 31,861 semester credit hours. College President Dr. Jack M. Ryder was disappointed that the turnout wasn't even higher but pointed out that many other state colleges and universities have had to fight just to hold their own and expressed gratification that enrollments at S.V.S.C.

are up. Increased tuition costs (up 29% in two years for undergrads) and increased employment here contributed to the growth slowdown, which will result in a tight budget this year.

Resolutions approved by the Board included initiation of a deferred giving and the beginning of a formal program for alumni relations.

Amateur astronomers are welcome to bring their telescopes to the observatory, located on Pierce Road near the southwestern corner of the S.V.S.C. Campus.
