BOARD RECEIVES HEATING/COOLING RECOMMENDATION

At Monday night's Board of Control Meeting, a recommendation was received from the engineering firm of Harley-Ellington-Pierce-Yee and Associates that a 12.1 million dollar heating and cooling facility be built on campus, including more than a mile of underground tunnel. The centralized facility, which would use oil or natural gas for fuel upon its 1980 projected date of completion, could be modified later to use coal. This flexibility to respond to future changes in fuel availability could lead to a second phase for the project in about 1985.

Phase one would include a \$6,200,000 building with 2 boilers and 2 electric centrifugal refrigeration machines, as well as a \$5,950,000 underground utility distribution system. Phase two would cost the state an additional \$3,950,000.

The study was contracted by the Department of Management and Budget Bureau of Facilities and must be accepted by that group and the Joint Capital Outlay Committee before funding would be possible. The same firm was also recommended as the engineering group to conduct a proposed College Utilities Study.

The architectural and planning firm of Rosetti and Associates was recommended for re-mapping the campus master plan, which will include an evaluation of all parts of the 750 acre campus and will attempt to create a desired campus image and atmosphere. Seven firms were interviewed last week by a campus

screening committee; the actual contract for the study will be signed by the Bureau of Facilities in Lansing. Rosetti and Associates plans to interview faculty, students, and administrative and staff members and plans to set up shop on campus during part of its study, for direct interaction with all of the influences which can affect a campus like SVSC. They plan to look at how the college interacts with the area community and how this should influence the master plan.

The Board also approved the operating budget for the 1976-77 fiscal year, with both total revenues and expenditures set at the same figure, \$6,221,884. This compares with \$5,495,141 in revenues last year. Some 70.6%--or \$4,386,750--of revenues will come from state appropriations this year, with another 27.8% or \$1,728,080 obtained from student fees \$2,480,556 or 39.8% of the expenditures column will go into instruction. Other major categories include institutional support, academic support services, student services, operation and maintenance of plant, student financial aid and public services.

A resolution approved by the Board paid tribute to college athletic teams which have distinguished themselves in winter sports. Commended were the men's basketball team, with a 23 won and 7 loss record, the women's basketball team with a 22-11 record and a second place finish in the College Division State tournament, and to wrestler Ralph Roberts who earned All-American honors, plus a number of individual team members and their coaches.

The Board also rewrote its April 1966 by-laws, to include existing practices which allow members of the public to address board meetings. The Board has previously followed the guidelines of the new Open Meetings Act ever since the college opened, but now they have formally written these into their by-laws.

By participating in the drive, you will be entitled in the future to receive any blood you might need without having to pay. Call the Student Government office at ext. 236 to give your "gift of life".


### INVESTIGATIVE JOURNALIST HERE THURSDAY
