DINNER THEATRE ALSO PART OF HOMECOMING EVENTS

"The Diary of Adam and Eve," a jolly musical by the composers of "Fiddler on the Roof," will be presented at SVSC's Doan Center on Wednesday, Oct. 5, during a 6:30 P.M. special dinner theatre performance. The live play will be a highlight of the annual fall homecoming week.

Based on a famous short story by Mark Twain, the performance will feature the Alpha-Omega players, a national touring group from Rockport, Texas who have received critical acclaim for their unique production style. The troupe has performed this play more than 2,000 times on college campuses, at country clubs, and military bases across the country.

This musical is the first show by Jerry Bock and Sheldon Harnick to reach Broadway after their triumph with "Fiddler on the Roof" and was a 13-month-long success in New York.

The cast, assembled from all parts of the United States by Director Drexel H. Riley, will include Rosalind Huffman in the role of Eve, while John Westbrook will portray Adam and Paul Pierce will take on the role of the Snake. The musician is Cynthia Coleman.

At a time when nudity occurs in so many stage and film attractions, the characters in this musicaletto in which bareness could be justified will all be fully clothed.

Eight lilting songs carry the action in the play, including the famous song of Eve's, questioning "What Makes Me Love Him?"

SVSC PROF TO ASSESS CARTER'S NUCLEAR ENERGY POLICY

Valley residents curious about how President Carter and congress are formulating the nation's nuclear energy policy this month can find out next Thursday (October 6) at SVSC.

Dr. Brian G. Chow, Associate Professor of Physics, will present a public lecture entitled "An Assessment of President Carter's Nuclear Energy Policy" at 7:00 P.M. in the Wickes Lecture Hall.

Chow is author of "Liquid Metal Fast Breeder Reactors -- An Economic Analysis", published recently under the National Energy Project of the American Enterprise Institute for Public Policy Research, Washington, D.C. He is also a special advisor to eleven mid-western congressmen from both political parties and has been in Washington this month briefing the legislators.

Questions Chow will discuss during the free lecture include the philosophy behind President Carter's nuclear policy, as well as the consequences and implications of the President's proposal. He will also describe the role that nuclear energy here and in the rest of the world plays in Carter's energy plan, plus his own view of what the future should be for nuclear energy and fast breeder reactors.

FOOTBALL FILM LUNCHEON TUESDAYS

Film highlights of the preceding Saturday's football game will be presented during the remainder of this fall's football season each Tuesday at 12:15 in the Lower Level of Doan Center. Head Coach Muddy Waters will both describe the previous game and give a preview of what lies ahead on the following Saturday. There is no charge for watching the game films, and interested participants should simply go through the regular cafeteria line and come to the lower level.

SVSC-DELTA CO-SPONSORING PARENT EFFECTIVENESS SERIES

A series of television programs showing an alternative approach to bringing up children will be presented this fall by SVSC and Delta College. "Parent Effectiveness", a thirteen-week series of half hour dramatizations, will debut on Channel 19 beginning Sunday, October 2, at 7:30 P.M. Each program segment will be repeated on Mondays at 2:30 P.M.

The shows are based on an internationallyrecognized method for raising responsible
children and enhancing the relationship
between parent and child. Actors will be
used to illustrate various communication
skills in dramatized case studies. Scenes
from the lives of six fictional families
portray familiar problems and conflicts,
including television watching, homework,
helping with chores, allowance, sexuality,
planning a vacation, and choice of friends.

Persons who wish to enroll in the "Parent Effectiveness" course may do so either through SVSC or Delta, for a \$15.50 registration fee. One non-credit Continuing Education Unit (CEU) may be obtained through SVSC.

Four test-seminar sessions are included in the course, as well as the 13 half hour TV programs. The test-seminar sessions will be held at Delta College, and are scheduled for the evenings of October 18, November 15, December 13, and January 10 from 7 to 10 P.M.
