HOMECOMING WEEK BRINGS FLURRY OF ACTIVITIES

Homecoming week activities come to a climax on Saturday afternoon with the SVSC-Youngstown State University football game, crowning of the homecoming queen at halftime, and the annual dinner/ dance for students and alumni that evenina.

Earlier featured events include a dinner theatre performance on Wednesday evening at 6 P.M. in Doan Center cafeteria, when the Alpha-Omega players will present the comedy "The Diary of Adam and Eve." Originally a short story by Mark Twain, the work was adapted as part of the Broadway musical "The Apple Tree". Faculty and staff members are invited to attend, with a cost of \$2.75 per person including the buffet meal. The jolly musical by the composers of "Fidder on the Roof" combines humor and nostalgia with music to provide a new perspective on the lives of the first man and first woman. The Alpha-Omega players hail from Texas and have performed the play nearly 2,000 times while traveling over $1\frac{1}{2}$ million miles.

A clubs and organizations fair from 12 noon to 4 P.M. highlights Thursday's events. Purpose is to acquaint students and the public with various activities at SVSC. Scheduled for the mall area of Doan Center, the fair includes free door prizes. An 8 P.M. performance by the SVSC marching band on Thursday evening in Doan Center rounds off the day's activities.

All members of the SVSC community are encouraged to participate in an alumni/ faculty/student seminar this Friday,

October 7. From 1-2:30 P.M., the Massey Tapes will be shown in the SVSC Theatre. followed by a 15-minute break in the Lower Level of Doan Center. A seminar from 2:45-4:30 P.M. in the Lower Level will provide the SVSC student body with an opportunity to interact on an individual basis with the participating alumni and faculty, concerning career choices and job opportunities.

From 4:30-5:30 P.M., a faculty/alumni wine and cheese party will feature the best of both from around the world in the third floor faculty lounge of Wickes Hall. Faculty members are invited, whether or not they take part in the seminar.

A talent showcase at 7:30 P.M. on Friday evening in the Theatre will bring the best in live entertainment from the Valley to campus. Prizes of \$100, \$50. and \$25 will be awarded to the best three acts. Talent showcase tickets are \$1.00 for students and \$1.50 for others. A pep rally and bon fire will follow at 10:30 P.M. to introduce this year's homecoming queen candidates, the marching band, the cheerleaders, SVSC's new pom pon squad and the football team. Refreshments will be included.

A pre-game luncheon for SVSC alumni in Doan Center begins Saturday's activities at 11:30 A.M. Tickets are \$2.75 for alumni and \$2.00 for children. Kickoff is at 1:30 P.M. for the football game with Youngstown State, with general admission tickets still available at \$3.00 and student admission \$1.50.

A homecoming dinner and dance at the Villa Venice restaurant on Bay Road, Saginaw, includes dinner at 7:30 P.M. and the 1977 homecoming dance at 9 P.M. The "Whiz Kids" band will provide entertainment; dinner and dance tickets are \$6.50 each for students and \$9.00 for guests and alumni. DIALOGUE WILL STICK TO BUSINESS

A giant rap session is coming to the SVSC fieldhouse on Thursday, October 20. One hundred leaders from business and industries across the Saginaw Valley plus an estimated 550 students from 13 mid-Michigan colleges and universities will sit down together to discuss private enterprise and the impact of governmental planning.

The students and business leaders will learn from each other at the second annual Business/Industry Dialogue, co-sponsored by SVSC, the National Association of Manufacturers and tri-county chambers of commerce. This year's Dialogue is open to both business and non-business majors. Students may attend without charge, but should sign up ahead of time at the School of Business & Management Office in 348 Wickes Hall.

Registration at 8:30 A.M. will be followed

by an informal meeting of the students and faculty members with top area business leaders over a continental breakfast. George M. Harmon, Dean of the School of Business and Management at SVSC will introduce the program and its theme "The Alternative to Private Enterprise?" A film on "The Second Battle of Britain" is next, highlighting issues relative to private enterprise versus government planning. All present will then spend an hour discussing issues related to the film and program theme on a one to one basis. An 11:30 A.M. smorgasbord luncheon will come after another film entitled "Man's Material Welfare."

SVSC President Dr. Jack M. Ryder will moderate a 12:15 panel discussion featuring questions from the audience about the role of American business in present day society. Panelists include Carl A. Gerstacker, John K. Belaski and Dr. Barbara Bryant. Gerstacker is chairman of the Compensation and Finance Committees and past president of the Board of Directors for the Dow Chemical Company, Midland.

Belaski is owner and president of Cross-roads Imports of Lansing, who during his college days was a strong critic of the free enterprise system. Bryant is vice president of Market Opinion Research, Inc. of Detroit and has done extensive public surveys of attitudes toward business.

Harmon is college coordinator for the Dialogue, while industry coordinator is Steve Doyle, Personnel Director for Chevrolet Parts Division, General Motors Corporation, Saginaw.

Students and faculty will be participating from Alma College, Alpena Community College, Central Michigan University, Delta College, John Wesley College, Kirtland Community College, Mid-Michigan Community College, Mott Community College, Northwood Institute, Saginaw Business Institute, SVSC, St. Clair County Community College, and University of Michigan-Flint.

POLISH FOLK DANCERS TO KICK UP HEELS

A celebration of Polish music, dance and song is coming to SVSC on Saturday, October 22, when the Wisla Dance Ensemble of Detroit performs at 7:30 P.M. in the Theatre.

The group, which is the Polish Folk Dance Ensemble in residence at the Detroit Historical Museum, also participated in the Third International Polish Folk Dance Competition in Rzeszow, Poland recently. The 25-member ensemble will sing Polish songs which accent their dancing in a program of universal interest.

There will be no admission charge for the program, which is being sponsored by a grant from the Michigan Council for the Arts whereby the group will perform in various Michigan cities. The funds are being matched by the Polish American Congress and The Friends of Polish Art, Detroit. Co-sponsor is the SVSC Institute of Polish Studies, which welcomes the general public to attend.


Last year, SVSC's contributions dropped by over \$1,000 from the year before. Let's all do our part in 1977-78 to make up this deficit!
