PAY DAY MOVED UP TO THURSDAY THIS WEEK

Because all area banks will be closed this Friday, November 11, in observance of Armistice Day, pay day for this week will be moved up to Thursday, October 10, so employees can cash their checks.

DOCTORATES INCREASE AGAIN THIS YEAR

Although their degrees are in fields like Biology, Chemistry, Education, Math and Sociology rather than medicine, there are now a total of 75 "doctors" on staff here this fall.

In addition to administrators who hold Doctor of Philosophy or Doctor of Education degrees, 3/4 of SVSC's full-time faculty members have earned their doctorate degrees. This constitutes one of the highest percentages at any Michigan college.

The unusually large ratio of doctors has resulted because of SVSC's small size. With just 3529 students, the institution does not use graduate assistants as instructors. Persons with earned doctorates in each academic area are on board not only to meet accreditation requirements but also to give students an adequate depth of knowledge in the subject.

Unlike most larger colleges, all faculty members at SVSC -- including departmental chairmen and academic officers -- are required to teach and advise students.

"The excellence of our faculty is the strongest asset at SVSC," says Dr. Robert S.P. Yien, Acting Vice President for Academic Affairs. "Our instructors try to give individualized attention wherever possible and have a genuine interest in their students. That helps to make up for our lack of adequate classroom and laboratory space."

The current SVSC administration and faculty members have received schooling themselves at some 250 institutions of higher learning across the world. They have teaching or administrative experience in all but two of the 50 states. Fourteen nationalities are represented in the group and men outnumber women by a 3:1 ratio.

Because some specialized fields like engineering and technology or nursing do not offer doctoral level preparation, the master's degree is generally considered the highest level of education possible. Taking this into account, 82.5% of the current SVSC faculty hold terminal degrees in their academic fields.

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM GOING TO NATIONALS

With a near-perfect score of 19 points at last Saturday's NAIA District 23 cross country championship held here on campus, the SVSC cross country team will be participating in the national meet at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Team captain Pete Hallop paced the squad with a record-setting time of just 24 minutes and 56 seconds for the five-mile course. Pat Fitzgerald finished third, while Mike Heath was fourth, Brad Shaw was fifth, and Mike DuCharme was sixth for SVSC. Jerzierski finished tenth while Greg Henry placed 12th in the event, where a total of eight colleges participated. SVSC runners received all-state awards, while Hallop was named District 23 Runner of the Year and Coach Dr. Doug Hansen was honored as District 23 Coach of the Year for the sixth time.

Placing behind SVSC were Aquinas College with 70 pts., Ferris State College with

78, Spring Arbor with 122, Hillsdale with 128, Grand Valley with 157, Northwood Institute with 180 and Lake Superior State College with 230.

HAMILTON PRESIDENT-ELECT OF CO-OP EDUCATION GROUP

Eugene Hamilton, Director of the Center for Placement and Continuing Education at SVSC, is president-elect of the Midwest Cooperative Education Association. The organization, which presently has 300 members from education and business, represents seven states including Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota and Iowa.

Hamilton will become president of the group next November, succeeding 1977-78 president Harold Evans, Manager of Professional Employment for B. F. Goodrich Company, Cleveland, Ohio.

MCEA is a service-type association which conducts studies and surveys to assist both colleges and business. The group holds data exchange seminars and is presently establishing an information exchange and training institute series on a regional basis within the state of Michigan. The rapidly growing association is just three years old and expects to increase to 500 members by next fall's annual conference in Chicago. Membership between businesses and educational groups is almost equally balanced. Several employers represent tri-county business interests, and numerous Detroit or Flintbased industries or businesses also participate.

Hamilton served as a consultant for the U. S. Office of Education in Washington to evaluate federal cooperative education proposals last spring. On the recommendation of the Office of Education, he has also served as a consultant to colleges in Michigan, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Missouri, Virginia and Kentucky. He has also worked to establish training programs between employers and colleges and has been involved with several tri-county employers through cooperative training programs.
