SPRING SESSION REGISTRATION IS NEXT MONDAY

Spring session registration for bachelor's and master's level courses at SVSC is

slated for next Monday, May 8, from 3:00 to 6:00 P.M. in Wickes Hall. Students who have already been admitted to SVSC will be able to sign up for classes and make registration payments at the Registrar's Office. Master Charge and BankAmericard (Visa) credit cards will also be accepted.

Course changes can be made for students previously registered during the drop/add period Tuesday, May 9, through Friday, May 12. Late registration will also be possible; however, a \$10.00 late fee will be charged after May 8. Drop/add hours will be 5:30 to 7:00 P.M. Tuesday, May 9; 9:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. and 5:30 to 7:00 P.M. on Wednesday, May 10, and Thursday, May 11; plus 9:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. on Friday, May 12. Late registrants for spring session must pay for their courses by 4:00 P.M. Monday, May 15.

Students who have not yet been admitted as either a guest or regular student should come to the Admissions Office in Wickes Annex, located directly north of Wickes Hall, before planning to register. Official transcripts are necessary for any previous college course work which prospective students plan to transfer to SVSC. A high school transcript is necessary if fewer than 30 college credits have been earned. There is no admission charge at SVSC.

A printed list of available courses for spring and summer sessions is available from either the Admissions or Registrar's Office. In addition, a number of one-week and two-week short-term classes have been added for spring session.

# SVSC STUDENTS WIN \$700

Five students from SVSC recently participated in a "Students in Free Enterprise" competition sponsored by Michigan Division, Dow Chemical U.S.A. in conjunction with National Leadership Methods from Austin, Texas.

The SVSC group joined students from 11 other Michigan colleges and universities in the program and came away with \$700 as second place in the competition. Winning first place and \$2,000 this year was Monroe Community College, while third place and a \$300 prize went to Hillsdale College. Last year, the contest was won by Delta College.

## "PLATO" COMPUTER DEMONSTRATION COMING

Two operating terminals of the "Plato" education assistance computer system will be demonstrated on campus May 18 & 19 in Wickes and Pioneer Halls.

Representatives from Control Data Education Company will be present from noon Thursday, May 18, to noon Friday, May 19 to demonstrate computer-assisted instruction techniques possible with the units.

Arrangements for the demonstration have been made by Dr. Richard A. Mock, Professor of Environmental Studies in the Division of Engineering and Technology. According to him, the "Plato" system can augment rather than hinder creativity in teaching while also helping the instructor to do his or her "own thing" more easily. Mock feels that any faculty members, regardless of academic discipline, will find the demonstration worthwhile. He stated that facilities of this type can help significantly with many instructional problems and are also excellent learning aids for students. Mock has brochures available which describe some of the capabilities offered by the "Plato" system.

# SPECIAL ORIENTATION SET FOR FRESHMAN FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Twenty-two freshmen recruited to play football next fall at SVSC will meet with Coach Frank 'Muddy' Waters, President Jack M. Ryder and four other college officials this Saturday, May 6, for a special orientation program. The recruits and their parents will meet at Cardinal Gymnasium at 10:00 A.M. for coffee and then tour the campus. Lunch will follow, vital information will then be presented on how to ease the process of getting squared away in college, and highlights of last fall's football games will be shown. The day will conclude with a hospitality period at the Waters' home.

Waters established the program to acquaint the young men and their parents with the college and prevent an attack of homesickness next fall. Each year some freshmen quit the team and college because of homesickness, he said. It is a malady prevalent on many squads which begin practice before school begins, when there is not a great deal of campus entertainment except football.

### CAMPUS NOTES

- -- Mary Haggerty, 7821 Stafford Drive, Saginaw, won the Wall Street Journal Student Achievement Award in SVSC's Accounting Department by having the highest grade point average for a graduating senior in accounting. The award consists of a specially-designed silver medal and a year's subscription to the Wall Street Journal. She received the award at the graduating senior banquet on April 22. Among her college honors, she was the recipient of a law and finance scholarship.
- -- Dr. James Levenson, Assistant Professor of Biology, will be offering a field course dealing with the systematics, phenology and ecology of mid-western spring flora. The lectures and laboratories, conducted in the field, will be part of an intensive two-day environmental workshop to be conducted at the Riveredge Nature Sanctuary, Saukville, Wisconsin on May 20 & 21 through the University of Wisconsin.
- -- Dr. S. K. "Tom" Yun, Associate Professor of Physics, has been invited to join the Theoretical High Energy Physics Division of the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory during summer 1978 as a

visiting professor to conduct research in unified gauge theories and new particles. The Fermi Laboratory has the world's newest and most powerful particle accelerator ("atom smasher"). It is called the synchrotron, with a diameter of 6,562 feet and a four-mile circumference, where protons are accelerated to 200-500 billion electron volts of energy. In this facility and others, various new particles called psi, tau and charmed particles were discovered in recent years.

Yun's unified SU(6) gauge theory, which unifies three fundamental forces of elementary particles, attempted to explain these new particles and related phenomena observed in a coherent theoretical framework. His paper was presented at the annual American Physical Society meeting in San Francisco last February and is in press for publication in the Physical Review.
