TELEPHONE "CUTOVER" COMING FRIDAY

Michigan Bell Telephone Company executives have announced plans to "cutover" from the College's present PBX system to an all-new Dimension 2000 system this Friday, May 26. At that time, the main College number will change from 793-9800 to 790-4000. The 695-5325 number to and from Midland will not be altered.

Under the new system it will be possible to expand the total number of campus telephones from approximately 500 at present to 2,000 in the future. Each campus phone will have a unique 7-digit number, said Bob Becker, Director of Business Services. Persons from the outside will be able to dial any campus phone directly, provided they have the full number. In such cases, it will no longer be necessary to go through the College operator.

On campus, the final four numbers will allow employees to contact other offices in the College.

Training sessions put on by Michigan Bell representatives are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, May 24-25, in the Pioneer Hall reference library on the second floor. If you have not received a letter from the Business Services Office informing you of the preferred time for you to participate, please phone Ext. 209 immediately so you can be assigned to a group.

The new system will offer considerably greater telephone flexibility than has been possible in the past. When you are away from your desk, it will be possible

to have calls transferred automatically to a phone at your temporary location. Conference calls will now be considerably easier to arrange and persons outside the College will be able to dial the phone on your desk directly if they have your number.

A new interim phone directory is being distributed this week by the Personnel and Business Services Offices. Postal cards are also available from Business Services to inform those off campus of your new number.

More than 400 students have now received merit scholarships from the Triskelions, who surpassed \$126,000 in total contributions to the College with this year's donation.

Most of the money has been generated by the organization's two business enterprises, the on-campus gift shop and the consignment shop, located in Midland. This year, the consignment shop accounted for \$12,000 of the total, with the gift shop raising \$3,000.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS

-- Dr. John C. del Regato, Assistant Professor of Education, presented two papers at national meetings in April. The first, "Acoustical Mathematics Instruction" was presented at the Council of Diagnostic and Prescriptive Mathematics meeting in Scottsdale, Arizona. The second, "Auditory Approaches to Teaching Mathematics," was presented at the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics meeting in San Diego.

-- Dr. John V. Jezierski, Associate Professor of History, has been awarded a \$1.500 Newberry Library Grant to prepare a handbook for area teachers to deal more effectively with state and local history. The material will be based largely on the work of the Goodridge brothers, a Black photography team who operated out of Saginaw in the late 1800's, and will emphasize existing sources of local history, such as old buildings, museums, artifacts, antiques, plus oral accounts. The grant from the Chicago-based Newberry Library is funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities.

-- Dr. S. K. ''Tom'' Yun, Associate Professor of Physics, accompanied members of the SVSC Physics Club to the Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory and the Argonne National Laboratory near Chicago on May 5 & 6. The visits were arranged by the Physics Department in cooperation with the two laboratories. The Fermi Lab tour included a look at the facilities and research activities in the pre-accelerator, linear accelerator, and the world's biggest proton synchrotron "atom smasher", whose circumference is over four miles. The Physics Club also visited the site of the first nuclear chain reaction and toured the University of Chicago campus, including the Fermi Institute for Nuclear Studies and Physics Department. At the Argonne Lab, they observed various research activities on the experimental nuclear reactor, zero-gradient synchrotron, superconducting magnets, solar

energy research and computer facilities.
