FALL SEMESTER UNDERWAY; WELCOME BACK!

With a record number of students on hand for the beginning of fall semester, classes resumed this week at SVSC. While final enrollment figures will not be available until after late registration concludes, last year's 3,529 head count was surpassed Tuesday during open registration. This fall's credit-hour figure will also be ahead of the previous all-time high of a year earlier.

This fall there are 103 full-time faculty positions, representing a net gain of four over a year ago. In all, there are 14 new faculty members in our midst, and they will appreciate having you extend a hearty SVSC welcome to them.

Biographical information sheets are needed from each new faculty member for a composite news release currently in preparation. The Office of Information Services would appreciate having each new instructor contact us at extension 4054 so that we can get a biography sheet to you and arrange to take your portrait. Approximately 20 other faculty members also have not submitted biographical data, which is needed for a new, detailed College directory presently nearing publication. Please submit either a copy of your vita to Information Services or call us for a blank copy of our brief biographical form. Faculty photos will be taken this Thursday, September 7 from 1:30 to 3 p.m. at the Office of Placement and Continuing Education Services. Our photographer will also be on hand there on Friday, September 8 from 9 to 10 a.m. Final dates for faculty photos to be included in the new directory will be

next Monday and Tuesday, September 11 and 12 from 10 to 11 a.m.

Persons who do not want their home addresses or telephone numbers included in this directory should so inform the Office of Information Services in writing not later than next Friday, September 15. Your spouses' names can also be deleted through the same procedure.

Attached to this issue of the Interior for your information is a copy of the Office of Information Services' new College publications guide, to provide directions to you in the preparation of College brochures and other external printing during the coming year. Copies of this guide were distributed several weeks ago, but many persons did not receive theirs because of being away for the summer. Due to recent staff reductions, it is imperative that the steps outlined in this guide be followed.

-SVSC RECEIVES \$464,240 NURSING GRANT

A \$464,240 grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare to SVSC to enhance the development of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program at the College was jointly announced today by College officials and Eighth District Congressman J. "Bob" Traxler.

The three-year grant was approved for the budget period beginning September 1, 1978 through next August 31. \$233,064 will be received the first year. Renewals for the second and third years, recommended at \$138,271 and \$92,905, respectively, would depend on the College's first-year performance, according to HEW officials.

"Grants awarded for the remainder of the project period will be determined annually based upon the progress made, the previous level of expenditures, and current eligible budget requirements," said Jessie M. Scott, Assistant Surgeon General and Director of the HEW Division of Nursing.

"The nursing grant will allow SVSC to develop one of the most modern nursing training facilities in the state," President

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Jack M. Ryder said. "It will allow us to expand our nursing faculty, so we can educate people here in hopes that they will remain in the area and serve the population here after completing their degree. In the past, people from the area seeking a Bachelor's degree in nursing have had to go to other parts of the state, where they have often remained following their education."

Present statistics show that over 2,700 active registered nurses plus inactive nurses in SVSC's 14-county primary service area are potential students for the B.S.N. program.

The evaluation of project objectives will be accomplished through the use of rating scales, nursing care plans, criteria checklists, test scores, and clinical performance ratings. Students, faculty, community health staff members, and clients will participate in the evaluation of health care given by students. Decision-making strategies will be evaluated through computer interaction monitoring and the use of decision-making models.

SVSC's grant proposal consisted of 220 pages and the award is the largest single grant ever received by the College.

FOOTBALL OPENER SATURDAY WITH WAYNE STATE

SVSC's fighting Cardinals football team faces one of its toughest tests of the season Saturday when top contender Wayne State University comes to Cardinal Field for the 1:30 p.m. season opener.

Pre-season predictions by GLIAC coaches placed the Tartars in second place, behind Grand Valley, with SVSC's Cardinals in fourth place.

Each full-time SVSC employee is entitled to one fall all-sports pass without cost. This will cover admission to fall football games, with this season's contests including Wayne State on Saturday September 9, Indiana Central on Saturday, September 16; Ferris State on Saturday, September 23; Grand Valley State on Saturday, October 14; and Northwood Institute on Saturday, November 11. All games begin at 1:30 p.m.

Passes can be picked up in the Business Services Office, '66 Building, during regular working hours. Additional passes are available for \$7.50 each and may be purchased for spouses and dependents of the employees.

PARKING DEADLINE SEPTEMBER 20

All faculty, staff and administrative personnel who plan to park in the reserve areas of Lot C and the Gymnasium lot will be required to purchase their gate control cards no later than Wednesday, September 20. After that date, all SVSC reserved parking permits issued for the 1977-78 fiscal year will be invalid. Gate cards may be purchased between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Department of Public Safety.

RECEPTION FOR EVENING STUDENTS PLANNED

Evening students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels will have an opportunity to meet College President Jack M. Ryder and College Vice Presidents on Monday and Tuesday September 18 and 19, at the third floor student concourse of Wickes Hall. The reception will be planned for 8 to 9 p.m. to coincide with class breaks. Coffee, punch and cookies will be served.

Because many of our students attend classes only in the evening and rarely have an opportunity to meet with high-level administrators, these receptions should provide an opportunity for them to interact with the President and the vice presidents. It will be appreciated if instructors can allot time between 8 and 9 p.m. for students to participate.

ARGENTINE VISITORS ARRIVE

Four Argentine educators arrived at SVSC on Tuesday, September 5 for a visit which will last until early December. Coordinating a visit to this area will be Drs. Jose Ricardo Pastor, associate professor of Spanish; Harold W. Peterson, Dean of the School of Education; and Kenneth Wahl, associate professor of education.

President and Mrs. Jack M. Ryder journeyed to

Florida last week where they represented the American Association of State Colleges and Universities in extending a welcome to the 40 Argentine educators who will be spending this fall in the United States. They presented Argentine Minister of Education General Ovadari Solari with a copy of the first record recently produced by the SVSC symphonic band.

EASTLAND PARTICIPATES IN INTERNATIONAL SYMPOSIUM

Dr. George W. Eastland, professor of Chemistry and Chemistry Department Chairman, recently participated in an international symposium which dealt with "Electron Spin Resonance in Studies of Polymers". The session was held at the Midland Macro-Molecular Institute.

BLAKE SHOW ON NOW

An exhibit entitled "The Book of Job" by William Blake is presently on display at the Arts Workshop Gallery in the '66-68 Building through Friday, September 22.

The plates, which were engraved by Blake in 1826, follow his usual practice of combining images with text so that he could offer his own interpretation of the cause of Job's suffering and ultimate triumph. Completed near the end of his life and at the height of his artistic power, these engravings represent the summit of Blake's work as a print maker.

The facsimile edition on display was produced in Paris at the Trianon Press and purchased from the Blake trust at the Tate Gallery in London by Dr. Barron Hirsch, chairman of the SVSC Art Department.

Between September 26 and October 6, the Arts Workshop will be presenting an invitational exhibition featuring works by 10 outstanding fiberists from the Tri-Cities area. Entitled "Fiber Directions, 1978", the exhibit promises to be a showing of fresh new ideas. There will be a formal opening on September 25 at 7:30 p.m. to introduce the artists involved in this show.

NEW CAFETERIA RATES POSTED

For the 1978-79 school year, new cafeteria rates will be in effect according to Director of Food Services John Curry. Breakfast will now cost \$1.50 per day, while lunch will be \$2.00 and dinner \$2.50. Special rates will be \$4.50 for steak night, \$3.50 for special buffets, and \$4.00 for the luau.
