POLICY CLARIFIED FOR ADVERSE WEATHER

Because some uncertainty has existed about SVSC staff obligations when inclement weather closes the college, any future announcements on radio or television will indicate whether or not staff members are to report for work when classes are cancelled. If the college is closed for both students and employees, this will be indicated in the announcement.

Stations called when inclement weather occurs are: WNEM-TV 5, WJRT-TV 12, WEYI-TV 25; WSGW, WKNN, WSAM, WKCQ, and WWWS in Saginaw; WRDD, WHNN, WXOX, and WGER in Bay City; WMPX and WRCL in Midland, and WKYO in Caro.

Normally, an announcement involving closure on the following day will be for day classes only, and stations will be re-notified in the early afternoon if late afternoon and evening classes will also be affected.

Because some confusion exists from SVSC classes being cancelled on Monday, January 15, the Office of Personnel has announced that individuals who were scheduled to work on that day are to be paid without charging that time to their paid leave. According to Larry K. Fitzpatrick, Director of Personnel, individuals who reported to work and worked on January 15 will receive compensatory time-off equal to the hours they worked. Individuals who were not scheduled to work that day will not be paid, unless they utilized some applicable paid leave status. Employees who were on sick leave Friday January 12 and returned to work on January 16 are to be charged sick leave for January 12 only and

will be paid for Monday, January 15 without having to utilize additional sick leave. Persons who were sick on Friday, January 12 as well as Tuesday, January 16 must utilize paid leave for Monday, January 15. Hourly staff members called in to work either Saturday or Sunday, January 13 or 14, which is not normally scheduled time, are to be paid time and one-half.

DISPLAY SHOWS ART FOR PUBLICATION

The complex process of converting ideas to printed words and illustrations will be revealed in a display titled "Art for Publication" at SVSC this week.

The exhibit, by SVSC publications designer and art faculty member Paul Davis will be open to the public without charge daily from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. between Fridays February 2 and 9.

Location is the Fine Arts Workshop in the Project '68 Building.

Shown in the display is the complete process of preparing artwork for printing. Viewers can trace all steps from the idea or concept stage through the layout, paste-ups or keylines, illustrations, and printed press sheets.

Original art and illustration will be exhibited, along with samples of numerous award-winning publications from SVSC and other colleges.

EAST-WEST ECONOMIC RELATIONS TO BE DISCUSSED

As the United States and other capitalist nations begin to trade with more and more Communist countries, the economics of such agreements become very important in the shaping of our everyday lives. Dr. Boguslaw Jasinski, professor of economics from the Academy of Economics, Cracow, Poland, will look at these relationships Tuesday, February 13 at 1:30 p.m. at SVSC.

Sponsored by the Institute of Polish Studies and the Department of Economics, Jasinski will be speaking on "East-West Economic Relations: Current Trends and Perspectives" in the lower level of Doan Center.

Jasinski is an eminent authority on the subject, having written over 30 books and articles. He has also taught as visiting professor at several universities. He is currently visiting Grand Valley State College as a consultant, and has guested at such institutions as Delhi University in India and the University of Florida. He spent four years in Ghana teaching the economics of Socialism, and three in Cairo, Egypt, as economic advisor to the Polish Embassy there.

There is no admission charge for the lecture, and free coffee and doughnuts will be served beginning at 1 p.m.

POM PON CLINIC HERE SATURDAY

The second annual SVSC Pom Pon Clinic is set for this Saturday, February 3 from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Cardinal Gymnasium. According to clinic coordinator Karen Laatsch, high school pom pon squads state-wide have been invited to participate at a cost of \$2.00 per squad member.

Following registration from 8 to 9 a.m. and a welcome from 9 to 9:15 a.m., a speed-learning routine will be taught to all squads by the SVSC Pom Pon team.

Additional help with the routine will be available throughout the day. Squads will be judged on this routine in an afternoon competition.

Each squad will perform an original routine for competition from 2 to 4:30 p.m., following individual squad help from 12 noon to 12:45 p.m., a routine review, and preparation for the competition.

Special routine presentations, which will not be judged, will be staged from 4:30 to 5 p.m. The day's activities will conclude with an awards presentation at 5 p.m.

BOWLING TEAM STILL IN THE RUNNING

With just one Michigan Intercollegiate Bowling Tournament left, SVSC still has a shot at the title.

And it spent Saturday jockeying into position for a strong finish.

"I think we're in pretty good position right now," says SVSC coach Ted Nitz. His team is in fourth place with a 42-28 mark, even though it was just above .500 -- at 30-26 -- before Saturday's match.

Central Michigan University, which won all 14 points Saturday, is in first place with a 53-17 slate, while Michigan State is close behind at 49-21. Eastern Michigan trails at 43-27.

Close on SVSC's heels is Ferris at 38-32, followed by Lawrence Institute (21-42), University of Michigan (16-47) and Lake Michigan College (11-59).

The final MIBT match is Saturday, Feb. 10 at Central Michigan.
