NOVEY, LEVENSON TO HEAD FACULTY GROUP

Donald Novey, associate professor of economics, and Dr. James B. Levenson, assistant professor of Biology, will head the SVSC Faculty Association for the 1979-80 school year. Novey defeated incumbent Dr. Janet Robinson and Dr. Raymond Tyner Thursday in the race for Association President. Levenson will be Vice President, after garnering more votes than opponent Dr. Norman Sterchele.

Elected Secretary is Dr. Robert C. Brad-dock, associate professor of History, while the new Treasurer is Dr. Shiv K. Arora, associate professor of Marketing. At-large members elected to the group's board of directors are Dr. David E. Barker, who will serve a two-year term, and Larry J. Kickham, assistant professor of Accounting, elected to a one-year stint. M.E.A. representative will be Robert Thaler, instructor of Sociology. Dr. Basil A. Clark, assistant professor of English, will continue the three-year term to which he was elected in 1978.

ARTHUR MAJEWSKI APPOINTED TO SUCCEED SUCHARA ON BOARD

Arthur J. Majewski, 17105 Chandler Park Drive, Detroit, has been appointed by Governor William Milliken to succeed Dr. Helen Suchara on the SVSC Board of Control. His term in office will be until 1983.

An attorney since 1943 and a graduate of the Wayne State University Law School, Majewski is vice president of the Polish American Congress in Detroit and was

chairman of the Committee to Preserve the Institute of Polish Studies at SVSC in 1975. He was the 1974 recipient of the Theodore Roethke Award for poetry and is active in various numismatic groups, having written numerous articles on coin collecting. He has also been active in the Polish National Fund and other ethnic groups. He and his wife, Marianne, are parents of one son.

FIVE WIN SVSC PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Five area high school students have been awarded scholarship for a maximum of \$1,200 per academic year to SVSC. Awarded through the Presidential Scholarship Program, the scholarships reward high school valedictorians and salutatorians within the state for a job well done. The stipend pays for tuition, fees and books, awarded at up to \$600 per semester.

Qualifications of the students are that they must have been either valedictorian or salutatorian of their high school graduating class. Students who maintain a 3.6 grade point average while attending full-time at SVSC can renew the award of \$4,800.

O'NEAL, CHARNEY ARE MVP'S

Louis O'Neal, a freshman from Saginaw High, was named most valuable men's basketball player Wednesday at SVSC's basketball banquet. Claudette Charney, a junior from Saginaw Eisenhower, was picked the most valuable player on the women's basketball team.

O'Neal started at guard nearly the whole year, and was the Cardinal's leading scorer with a 14.5-points-per-game average. He was named to both the All-Great Lakes Conference and All-District teams as well.

Charney, a 5-10 forward, was the lady Cardinal's top scorer and leading rebounder. She averaged 15.1 points and nine rebounds per game, leading SVSC to a 22-8 overall record.

The SVSC all-time women's scoring leader, Charney was a second-team All-Conference pick. She also received an honor as the team's rebounder.

Other players honored were Jim Wing, Tim Ryan, Al MacDonald, Cindy Ponichtera, Mary Lenhard and Sandy Robinson.

WOMEN'S SOFTBALL TEAM IN FUND RAISER

There's a television show called "Bowling for Dollars." And while members of Saginaw Valley State College's women's softball team will be bowling for dollars this weekend, the event has nothing to do with television. What it does involve is a new program, a couple dozen athletes and a trip to Grand Valley State College.

The squad, in its first year of play at SVSC as a non-varsity club, is hoping to raise enough money in Saturday's Bowl-A-Thon to make the trip later this month to Alledale for the AIAW State Small-College tournament.

"We've got some really good softball players here," chuckes lady Cardinal coach Ingrid Kuppert. "Now we'll get a chance to see how well they can bowl."

Each of the two-dozen members of the team are taking pledges for at least a penny per pin for the three games she --

or a suitable stand-in -- will bowl in the event at Saginaw's Stardust Lanes, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

"This team is really looking forward to some post-season play," says Kuppert, "and I'm really hoping we'll have a chance to get to the tournament.

"This team is good enough that it's a shame they'll have to stop playing after the regular season is over. And we've got the talent to go someplace in the state tournament, too."

The Bowl-A-Thon isn't the only project the women have been involved in to raise money, either. At the SVSC Jazz Band Big Band Concert a few weeks ago, they decorated SVSC's gym and waited tables during the event -- and the money went into the softball budget.

"We're getting there," says Kuppert, "both on the field and off." The team now sports a 3-3 record.

LEADERSHIP TO BE PROBED

If you want to be a leader, you must think like one, and a special course this Spring Session here will teach you how.

"Probing Leadership", a special seminar-type course, will be sponsored by SVSC's Academy of Applied Philosophy.

"This class will help people think about the problems of leadership. It's not the usual how-to-do-it course, but rather has an analytical base," says Dr. David R. Weaver, associate professor of political science. He and Dr. G. Alexander Ross, assistant professor of sociology, will co-teach the class. It will be offered as Political Science 255 from 4 to 7 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays starting May 8 for three credits.

Demonstrating that being a leader can pay, the Academy will award \$150 scholarships each to up to five students in the class. These will be based upon performance in the course and the quality of a required research paper.
