ANSWERS COMING ON CRITICAL ISSUES

Tired of getting the run-around instead of straight answers about the economy, energy, the environment and government? A chance to learn what's really happening and why is coming Thursday and Friday, April 10-11.

Leading businessmen, economists, industry officials and government analysts will all be taking part in SVSC's first business symposium, dubbed "Critical Issues of the '80's".

Admission will be free and open to students, faculty, staff and the general public for all sessions. Location will be the SVSC theatre, said James L. Mitchell, dean of the school of business and management.

Keynote speaker at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 10 will be Herbert H. Lyon, vice-president of The Dow Chemical Company. His message will focus on some of the critical issues facing us as individuals and a nation. Lyon will offer solutions for these pressing problems in a timely talk which reflects his many years of successful business experience.

"Business and the Energy Crisis" will be the first of four topics on the Friday, April 11 program. This 9:00-10:30 a.m. session will be moderated by Art Van Dyke, news anchorman for WNEM-TV-5. Analysts include Robert Montross, general manager of Consumers Power Company's Midland nuclear plant. Other panelists include J. Ernest Mitchell, director of corporate planning for Dow Chemical Company, Phillip Sworden, supervisor of the department of natural resources for Dow Corning Corporation and Bernard Bartos, project manager for steam electrical co-generation at Dow Corning.



Each of four panels will examine topics in a relaxed informal manner, giving the audience an opportunity for questions, Mitchell noted.

"Business and Inflation" will be the second topic explored, between 10:45 a.m. and 12:00 noon. Moderator will be Merrill-Lynch account executive Charles B. Curtiss. Panelists include John F. Hanieski, director of the research and marketing division of the office of economic development in the Michigan Department of Commerce and John H. McCray, Jr., assistant dean for Student Services and lecturer in economics for the University of Michigan-Flint.

Two panel discussions will round out the afternoon program schedule. "Government and Business Relations" from 1:15-2:15 p.m. will be moderated by Alfred Peloquin, metropolitan editor of the Saginaw News. Panelists will be Jerold E. Ring, legislative representative, government & community relations, for Dow Chemical and Bill Ochalek, manager of federal non-product legislation, with the government relations section, General Motors Corporation.

"Business and the Environment" will be considered from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m., with newsman Art Lewis of WSGW Radio as moderator. Panelists will be Dr. Stacy Daniels, research specialist in the environmental sciences research lab at Dow Chemical and Al Garwick, senior engineer and plant engineer at GM's Bay City Chevrolet facility.

Running concurrently with the panel discussions will be four audio-visual presentations in Room 15 of the Project 68 Building, located next door to the theatre. At 9:15 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., a 25-minute film describing processes involved in providing safety of new

chemicals will be shown. Entitled "Bill Smith's New Chemical", the film has been produced by Dow Chemical Company. "Energy: Crisis or Confusion" is a 20-minute slide presentation slated for viewing at 10:00 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. Narrator will be Jack Otter, senior staff assistant for public relations at Saginaw Steering Gear, and questions and answers will follow.

"Telecommunications of the Future" is a 20-minute slide presentation from Michigan Bell Telephone Company which will be shown at 10:45 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. in the '68 Building. Narrator will be Tom Straebel, who will also answer questions. "A Play Half Written - The Energy Adventure", a 27-minute film produced by Consumers Power Company, will be shown at 11:30 a.m. and 2:45 p.m.

Keynote speaker Lyon has been with Dow since 1947 and is a member of its board of directors and its compensation, finance and investment policy committees. He has also served as director of corporate administration and has been a member of the company's executive committee. His other roles at Dow have included serving as controller and later plant manager at the former Madison Division and then as controller of the company. He is a director of Asahi-Dow, Ltd. in Japan, the U.S.-Yugoslav Economic Council and the Japan-U.S. Advisory Council on Economic Relations.

"The programs both Thursday evening and Friday provide excellent opportunities to hear well-informed people presenting problems and suggesting solutions," Mitchell said. "This will present an unparalleled opportunity to learn more about these critical issues, as discussed by some of the most knowledgeable people in the U.S." Persons with questions about the symposium should contact Eugene J. SCIENCE COLLOQUIUM SET ON CHEMOTHERAPEUTIC AGENTS

Preventive medicine is gaining increasing interest and this concept is being extended to dental disease, one of the most prevalent non-life-threatening ailments in the world today. A major cause of dental disease is dental plaque, which are microorganisms which form a tenacious amorphous layer on teeth or inhabit crevices around the gums. This week's SVSC science colloquium, on Friday, March 28, will discuss new anti-microbial agents which are being designed to control the growth of harmful microorganisms without causing a major alteration of oral flora.

Speaker at the 1:30 p.m. session in 238 Wickes Hall will be Dr. Edward E. Flagg, research specialist in the central research bioproducts laboratory of The Dow Chemical Company. His topic will be "Chemotherapeutic Agents Against Dental Disease" and he will discuss two dental agents which utilize the effective cariogenic microorganism, Streptococcus Mutans. The two products are Tiodonium Chloride, an agent which underwent extensive development at Dow Chemical and Chlorohexidine, an agent which is being used commercially in Europe.

Refreshments will be served and all are welcome to attend. The talk will also be part of the seminar series sponsored by the Midland section of the American Chemical Society.

--A research paper entitled "Interaction of

Exercise and Ambient Environment During Heat Acclimatization" by assistant professor of physical education Dr. Ingrid Kupprat has been accepted for publication in a forthcoming issue of the "Hungarian Journal of Sports Medicine", a refereed journal. Kupprat's work was done in collaboration with Doctors Barbara L. Drinkwater and Steven M. Horvath of the Institute of Environmental Stress at the University of California-Santa Barbara. Park will also give a speech at the Saginaw County Realtor's Association's annual meeting at the Frankenmuth Bayarian Inn on April 14. His topic there will be "Current Problems of the nousing Industry and Local Economy". More than 200 people will be in attendance there.

--Dr. Guy M. Lee, Jr., administrative assistant to the president for affirmative action, has been nominated for inclusion in the third edition of "Who's Who Among Black Americans, 1980".
