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RYDERS TO VISIT FAR EAST

SVSC president and Mrs. Jack M. Ryder will travel to the Far East from October 11 to November 3 as representatives of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities. They will join presidents of six other colleges and universities and their spouses, along with Dr. Maurice Harari, vice president for international programs with AASCU.

The initial ten days will be spent in the Republic of China, where a schedule of five seminars with Taiwanese ministry of education officials has been set. Ryder and Dr. John Watkins, president of California State College (PA) will be making formal presentations on the topic "Strengthening the Academic Quality and Relevance of U.S. Higher Education."

Ryder and the other mission participants will visit selected universities and institutes and will review the overall relationship and potential of AASCU programs with the Republic of China, with the intention of strengthening educational collaboration between the two nations. The group will also meet with AASCU students on scholarship in Taiwan and will become acquainted with higher education trends and issues in the Republic of China. Mrs. Ryder and other spouses will acquaint themselves with the role of women in Taiwanese society, in preparation for presentations on "The Changing Role of Women in Society" at the AASCU annual meeting this November. Costs for the trip are being paid by the Republic of China government.

The Ryders will next journey to Hong Kong and then to Seoul, Korea, for three days where they will be the guests of president Chowe of Kyung Hee University. Discussions will take place there concerning exchange program development with SVSC.

Following the visit to Korea, the Ryders will travel to Japan where they will spend three days in Saginaw's sister city of Tokushima. There they will meet with representatives of Shikoku Women's University, a private institution with an enrollment of 1,800 young women. The purpose of their discussions will be to explore future faculty-student exchanges and to enhance the relationship between SVSC and the Japanese University.

Other plans are to visit the National University of Tokushima, the private Arts and Sciences College in Tokushima, and officials of government associated with the Saginaw sister city relationship.

The Ryders plan to return home November 3. Other tour participants to the Republic of China include Dr. James B. Appleberry, president of Pittsburgh (Kansas) State University; Dr. John Lott Brown, president of the University of South Florida; Dr. Roland Dille, president of Moorhead State University of Minnesota; Dr. W. Lloyd Johns, president of California State University-Sacramento; and Dr. Hollis A. Moore, president of Bowling Green (Ohio) State University and their spouses.

MAJEWSKI RESIGNS FROM BOARD OF CONTROL

Dr. Arthur J. Majewski of Detroit has resigned from the SVSC Board of Control because of "unforeseen pressures on my time." In a letter to Board chairman Charles B. Curtiss and to Governor Milliken, Majewski indicated he could no longer devote the time necessary to serve on the Board. He said that the time devoted to the college has been "enjoyable, informative and intellectually profitable. The future interests of the college will continue to be of concern to me."

1979, by Milliken, following the resignation of Dr. Helen T. Suchara of Livonia. A successor is likely to be named soon by Milliken for the remainder of the term, which expires July 21, 1983.

Maynard Ferguson and his 13-piece jazz band will be performing his hit single "Gonna Fly Now" from the movie "Rocky" and other current popular songs at Cardinal gymnasium this Sunday, October 5, at 8:00 p.m. Ferguson, a world renowned trumpet and valve trombone virtuoso, plays exciting tunes with a spirit of adventure.

After coming to the U.S. from Canada in 1948, Ferguson played with Stan Kenton and gained fame for his ability to play the trumpet's upper registers. His music of the 70's and 80's is far different from the first part of his career and will include the themes from "Battlestar Galactica" and "Star Trek."

CONCERT/LECTURE PROGRAM SCHEDULED

Start with 14 soprano voices. Add a dozen

altos, eight tenors, ten basses and scores from classical and popular music of Poland. Blend together and place on stage in the SVSC theatre. The result will be a delicious afternoon of Polish traditional music.

The renowned Lutnia Singing Society from Detroit will perform at SVSC on Sunday, October 19, beginning at 2:30 p.m. General admission tickets for the event are \$2.50 for adults or \$1.50 for children and will be available at the door.

Music has always played a central part in the life of Polish people, and Polish immigrants brought with them pride in their heritage and a desire to preserve their music and culture. One result was the Lutnia Singing Society, organized in Detroit in 1908.

Lutnia, which took its name from the Polish word for "lute," has contributed to enrichment of the cultural life of Detroit's Polish community from its beginning. Landmark performances have included annual concerts, radio appearances, presentations of Polish operas, and a nationally broadcast anniversary concert honoring Frederick Chopin. In national competition at the conventions of the Polish Singers Alliance of America, the choir has won numerous awards. In 1974 and again in 1980 they received the Cardinal Hlond Trophy, highest recognition given by the Alliance.

Lutnia's choral director is the talented concert organist, composer and arranger, Bronsilaw Siakowski. Siakowski studied at the State College of Music in Katowice, Poland, and later taught theory at a music school in Katowice. Since emigrating to the United States in 1961, his compositions have been performed by the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and at the Polish Singers Alliance convention. This versatility will be reflected in the October 19 appearance of Lutnia.

An added attraction on the program will be a slide/lecture presentation on "Poland the Beautiful" by Eugeniusz Siedliski, guest instructor at SVSC's Institute of Polish Studies. A professor at the University of Poznan, Poland, he will take the audience on a brief tour of the Polish countryside via color photography. His comments and descriptions are based on first-hand knowledge of the land and people.

-- Official fall semester registration figures show 4,331 students taking SVSC classes this year. 3,986 of these are on-campus, with 370 in Macomb, Caro, WurtSmith and other locations. There are 1,586 new students, 175 re-admitted persons and 2,570 returnees. Credit hours total 40,632. All these figures are new record highs.

Tai of the Environmental Research Institute of Michigan and F. T. S. Yu of Penn State University. The article "Interferometric Construction of Circular Gratings" was written with E. Leith, G. Collins, K. Scholten, G. Swanson and J. Upatnieks of the University of Michigan and will appear in "Applied Optics" magazine. Another article, on "Diffraction Limited Imaging through a Phase-Distorting Medium", has been submitted by Chen and E. Leith and Y. Cheng of the U of M for publication in "Optics Letters". Finally, Chen will present a paper on "Astigmatic Technique in One-Step Rainbow Holography" at the annual meeting of the Optical Society of America on October 17 in Chicago.
