
"COMEDY OF ERRORS" DUE THURSDAY

William Shakespeare is visiting SVSC this Thursday, April 9, when the National Shakespeare Company performs "The Comedy of Errors" at 8:00 p.m. in the SVSC theatre.

The play makes use of humor in a case of mistaken identity. It is as much fun today as when it was presented at London's Globe Theatre as the first effort of an unknown playwright named William Shakespeare.

When a man and his servant arrive in a quiet village only to find themselves treated like long-time friends and lovers, the result is hilarious confusion. And when their identical twins, residents of the village, become entwined in the situation, there is mayhem. Irate wives, mischievous slaves and townspeople all add to the mix-ups.

EPIC POLISH FILM SCHEDULED

Area persons with Polish heritage, or those who simply want to learn more about the country's history, can do so in a special way. The Institute of Polish Studies is sponsoring a showing of "The Deluge," a Polish movie with English subtitles.

Set in seventeenth century Poland, the color film depicts a time when wave after wave of foreign invaders nearly submerged the country. This period became known as "the deluge," and a heroic defense of the monastery town Jasna Gora has become an inspiration to millions of Poles.

The movie, based on a Nobel-prize winning book by H. Sienkiewicz, is a richly costumed portrayal of the struggle and eventual victory of Polish forces. It will be shown in two parts at Saginaw's Temple theatre. Part I is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 25, with Part II set for 2:30 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 3.

Tickets will be available at the door before each performance and are \$3.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children, students and senior citizens. For more information about the film, contact the Polish Institute by phoning ext. 4315 between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. daily.

HIGH-FLIERS COMING TO SVSC

A lot of high fliers will be in the air over SVSC this Sunday, April 12, during the annual college kite flying contest. Slated for 2:30-6:30 p.m. at parking lot "B" near the Project '66-'68 buildings, the annual contest will benefit UNICEF this year. Sponsor is the SVSC volunteer service, which will award prizes for the most creative and highest flying kites. The general public is welcomed to participate.

DANCER PERFORMS ON BRASS PLATE

An intricate "Kuchipudi" dance will highlight a special evening this Saturday, April 11 featuring classical dances of India. Sponsored by the India Association of East Central Michigan, the event is set for 7:00 p.m. in the college theatre.

Mrs. Uma Suresh will be performing the Kuchipudi, which requires great skill. The dancer balances on a brass plate while executing the steps to musical accompaniment. "Only the most skilled of dancers are able to perform this feat," notes Sumitra Heinert, ticket committee member.

"Bharata Natyam" (Ballet of India) will also be presented by Mrs. Suresh. She will wear colorful costumes native to India while portraying various aspects of Indian culture and history through dance. Mrs. Heinert explains that a single dancer is able to tell a complete story about several mythological characters and episodes from Indian folklore by using stylized movements of the hands, feet, eyes and body.

Mrs. Suresh frequently performs with her twin sister Rama, and they have won several awards at the state and national level. She studied with Vazhuvoor Ramaih Pillai and Padmabhushan Kamala Laxman, and has taught dance at Colgate University. The Canton, Michigan, resident is slated to perform at Detroit's Ford Theatre later this month.

Included in the evening's entertainment are short documentary movies depicting culture and customs of India. Also, the significance of each dance and the history of hair styles and costuming will be explained by Mrs. Suresh's husband.

BANK ROBBERY SEMINAR PLANNED

Area bank employees and police officers will learn how to act during a bank robbery or other crisis situations at a bank robbery seminar planned here for next Wednesday, April 15. Representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation will be on hand from 1:00-3:00 p.m. to teach bank tellers and other employees how to interface with each other and with law enforcement personnel during times of emergency.

Featured at the SVSC theatre will be a film by criminal justice department chairman Jon Cisky and WNEM TV-5 news and anchorperson David Barker on a recent simulated bank robbery staged in Freeland.

The same film will be shown at 8:00 p.m. that evening on channel 5. It has also been sold to the NBC television network for future broadcast, according to Cisky.

TWELVE SCHOOLS AT FOREIGN LANGUAGE CONTEST

More than 50 area high school students competed recently in the third annual poetry contest sponsored by the department of modern foreign languages here. Representing 12 schools, they recited poetry in lower and upper divisions for prizes in French, German, Polish and Spanish categories.

In French, upper division winners were Becky Yeatmen in first place and Dianne Marsh in second, both of Carrollton high school, while Michelle Fisher also of Carrollton took first place in lower division. Second place winner was Julie Hastings of Eisenhower high school (Saginaw).

Winner in the upper division German competition was Steve Kirkby of Midland Dow high school, while Marilyn Dunker of Freeland high school was second. In lower division, Julie Schramke of Bridgeport-Spaulding high school garnered top honors, followed by Christine Hollenbeck of Bay City Handy high school.

All winners in the Polish competition came from Bay City All*Saints high school. In upper division, Connie Boks was the winner, with Mary Ellen Luczak placing second. Angela Eichhorn was top student in lower division, while Pam Lokajtys placed second and Pat Ciechanowski was given a special mention award.

A first place tie in upper division Spanish divided honors between Brian Lenox of Carrollton high school and Tim Morningstar of Swan Valley high school (Saginaw). Second place went to Camille Mayote of Saginaw St. Mary's Cathedral high school, while Elena Castanon of St. Mary's and Tammy Revesz of Vassar high school received special mention awards.

Lower division Spanish was won by Bill Olivarez of Bridgeport high school, with Tammy Francis of Vassar high school placing second.

A group of students from Carrollton St. Josephat's elementary school also participated in the contest in a special class. I Polish upper division, Jenny Robison took first place, with Paul Lasiewicki taking second. First place in Polish lower division went to Amy Schwaderer, followed by Leslie Renico in second.

SUPERCOMPUTERS NEXT SCIENCE TOPIC

Dr. Myron Ginsberg of General Motors Research Laboratories will present "An Overview of Supercomputers for Scientific Calculations" at the next science colloquium this Friday, April 10. His lecture will describe the architecture of several supercomputers and compare them with smaller equipment, outlining strengths and weaknesses of each.

Following the discussion, several short movies will portray research activities at GM's Warren Research Laboratories and other topics dealing with current computer applications.

Ginsberg is a participant in the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics visiting lectureship program. Currently he is a senior research scientist specializing in numerical analysis and mathematical software for GM research laboratories. Previously he taught computer science at Southern Methodist University.

15 session is aimed at beginning gardeners, and you can learn about basic tools needed, what vegetables are well suited for small gardens and how to get started with your own garden.

New techniques will be offered to experienced gardeners on Wednesday, April 22. Both workshops are free and open to all members of the campus community. Participants are requested to register with campus activities by the day prior to each session.
