ORIENTATION PROGRAMS SET

Three summer orientation sessions have been scheduled for students who will be attending SVSC for the first time this fall semester. Programs are set for Tuesday and Wednesday, June 23 and 24; Monday and Tuesday, July 13 and 14; and Tuesday and Wednesday, August 11 and 12. Each session begins with check-in at 7:30 a.m. on the first day and concludes by 4:00 p.m. the following day.

According to SVSC coordinator of orientation MaryAnne Lustgraaf, "New students are special people with special needs. Orientation aids each student by informing him or her about resources, assistance and services which are available."

Lustgraaf notes that transfer students may also attend any of the orientation programs. All students who participate will be able to register for fall classes with the guidance of college personnel.

Participants will also complete required basic skills tests during the sessions. Those interested in special placement may take exams in mathematics, chemistry or foreign languages. Results will be available before students complete class registration.

A special program has been planned for the families of entering students, and parents or spouses may attend with their student. Family members may stay either in SVSC residential halls or off campus.



Registration fee for students is \$30 and includes programs, meals and housing. Program fee for family members is \$5, with meals available at \$16.50 and dormitory rooms at \$4 per person.

BOARD MEETS WITH DELTA COUNTERPARTS

A common college calendar for both SVSC and Delta College could become a reality as soon as fall 1983, following a joint session Monday, June 8, of governing boards from the two colleges. Both boards agreed to try making changes needed to implement a parallel schedule, so that semesters and events on both campuses would coincide.

Board members said they were pleasantly surprised to learn how many cooperative arrangements are already underway or being planned between Delta and SVSC. Subcommittees are jointly looking at ways to improve coordination in academic, administrative and student services areas. Some courses and even faculty members are being shared, as are purchases of many library, bookstore and large equipment items.

Members got a first-hand look at the new library consortium computer recently installed at SVSC to link the two college libraries. Advantages of numerous cooperative efforts appear to be paying off in all areas except the possible combining of major insurance cost items like worker's compensation. Both presidents Jack Ryder and Donald Carlyon said they are proud of the continuing positive relationships and cooperation between their staffs and that both colleges have gained considerably from the good relations between Delta and SVSC.

CAMP SESSIONS TO SHAKE A LEG

Five training camps are scheduled on campus this summer, including an All Star Cheerleader Conference on June 29 - July 2, U.S. Cheerleader's Association with sessions on July 6-9 and August 3-6, Mid-Michigan Pom Pon Camp on July 23-26, and Firebird Cheerleader Camp on July 28-31. High school, junior high and college squads can sign up for sessions which teach everything from creating posters to crowd control and preparing routines for competition.

The All Star Cheerleader Conference of Kansas City will bring a four-day workshop to SVSC in late June. More than 100 girls are expected to participate in instruction on cheers, pom pon routines, motivating crowds, pep rally planning and uniform selection. Advisors will also attend daily seminars designed to aid in program development. Cost, including tuition, room and board, is \$82.

One hundred and twenty-five young women will be here for each of the U.S. Cheerleader's Association camps. Daily activities include cheerleader and pom pon chants, routines, gymnastics, songs, adagio stunts, pyramids, and tumbling. USCA is the largest cheerleader group in the country, and each year sponsors national championship competitions. Winners of local camps will receive awards and are eligible to enter national events. Cost for either of the four-day workshops is \$79.90 per person.

Squads from across the state can attend the Mid-Michigan Pom Pon camp to learn how to perform synchronized routines. A highlight of the program will be kickline workshops which cover leg stretches, arm hooks and instruction on how to move a kickline to spotlight performances. Squads will also learn use of props and good basic moves. An advisors' seminar will be offered from 9:30-11:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 23. The camp is open to both J.V. and varsity squads for a cost of \$78 per girl.

Sponsored by the National Cheerleader's Association, the Firebird Cheerleader camp is open to individuals or squads from middle school through junior high, high school and college. Instruction will cover pep rallies, pom pon routines, pyramids and tumbling, plus ideas for fund raising and designing spirit posters. Special workshops

are planned for sponsors to share ideas with other sponsors, advisors and staff members. Food, lodging and registration for the four day camp is \$88.

DANCE/EXERCISE CLASS SCHEDULED

A series of classes designed to improve physical fitness is scheduled here on Monday and Wednesday mornings beginning June 29. Members will practice dance routines and exercise to music during the hour long sessions.

According to area coordinator Marj Barris, aerobic dancing is a fitness sport that can take the place of jogging. "Our system is a whisper of exercise and a shout of fun," she notes.

MUSIC PROF PENS JAZZ TEXT

Rock 'n Roll music has been around a lot longer than you may think. A new college textbook titled "History of Rock and Roll" by associate professor of music Dr. Charles T. Brown traces this popular music form back to the late nineteenth century.

Brown has signed a publishing contract with Prentice-Hall of Englewood Cliffs, New Jersey. The text is expected to be available in college bookstores across the country by the end of the year.

"Rhythm and blues music made a big impact on Rock 'n Roll. The development of each type of music up to our present new wave music becomes clearer when studied in the context of the earlier varieties," he believes.

If you're an aspiring book writer but unsuccessful in being published, take heart from Brown's experiences. After writing his text during a sabbatical leave in winter semester 1981, he sent out sample chapters to a dozen publishers, not including Prentice-Hall. He received a like number of rejection slips, containing a myriad of reasons from "no market"

tc "not structured well enough."

Meanwhile an article by Brown in the "National Association of Jazz Educators' Journal" drew a large response from readers who use jazz materials. A friend he had studied with during a 1978 National Endowment for the Humanities summer grant program learned about the manuscript and told a contact at Prentice-Hall, who offered Brown the publishing contract just a month after obtaining the manuscript.

Brown feels his success shows that professors even at a small school such as SVSC can "write something decent that has a real impact on a major field like Rock 'n Roll music. It's a more rational, practical subject for a book and makes more sense than if I had written a scholarly text on a classical music topic I know more about," he says.

STUDENTS SELECTED FOR STUDY IN POLAND

Two students who witnessed the beginnings of the Polish workers' strike last summer will be returning to Poznan, Poland, for eight weeks beginning this Saturday, June 20. They will be joined by four other SVSC students for summer study at the University of Poznan.

Included in the 1981 exchange group are Elizabeth Demenczak, 6292 W. Court, Flint; Brian Drewniak, 24548 Melody Lane, Taylor; Barbara Federspeil, 2322 Delaware, Saginaw; Colleen Gulvas, 4081 Green Isle, Saginaw; Michael Hanley, 418 Adams, Saginaw, and Richard Koscielski, 718 Gee, Bay City.

Gulvas and Hanley were among five SVSC students who traveled to Poznan in 1980 as part of an exchange agreement between the University of Poznan and SVSC. While in Poland, they took classes at the University of Poznan, lived in college dormitories, and traveled throughout the Polish countryside.

In the process, they learned much about the nature of life in Poland and the spirit and national pride of their Polish hosts. Soon after their arrival in Poland and some five weeks before it made world headlines, they were aware of the developing strike by Polish workers.

Both Gulvas and Hanley are eager to return to Poznan and observe changes which occurred because of the workers' movement.

Gulvas does not anticipate any problems for the American guests because of political activity in Poland. "We were treated in a very good way last year, so I feel at ease about returning," she states.

While in Poland, Gulvas and Hanley will continue their studies in Polish language and history. They also hope to travel to more of the rural villages and meet more Poles. And, as experienced travelers, they will assist other members of the SVSC delegation to learn about Polish culture and customs.

Selection to the program is based on academic excellence and outstanding citizenship. The evaluation committee was chaired by Dr. Robert S. P. Yien, vice president for academic affairs at SVSC. Tuition and living expenses for the students will be provided by the University of Poznan, and part of their travel expenses will be funded by the SVSC Foundation from private donations.
