Reservations are not required.


FAMILY MEMBERS TO VISIT SEPTEMBER 26

VISITING PROFESSOR BRINGS MOVIE FROM POLAND

A special showing of the new Polish movie "Girls of Wilka" with English subtitles is set for next Thursday, September 17, at 7:30 p.m. in Doan Center. The movie is a subtle, sociological analysis of human relationships, similar to some of the analyses of Ingemar Bergman. It was brought to SVSC by visiting professor Dr. Cezary Mendelius, who just came to the campus from the English Institute at the University of Poznan, Poland.

Dr. Mendelius will be on hand to answer questions and provide comments on the movie, which was produced by Andrzej Wajda, winner of the Cannes Golden Palm award last year for his movie "Man of Marble" about Joseph Stalin. There will be no admission charge for the SVSC showing and the public is invited to attend.

WHY A \$45,000 TREE MOVER?

Answers to some of the questions submitted to SVSC's Executive Committee during the past two weeks from members of the campus community are detailed below. Please remember to contact the office of information services at ext. 4054 via a phone call or by your note or memo when things come up that arouse your curiosity. Deadline for questions to reach us is Tuesday evenings at 4:30 p.m. of the week prior to publication.

Questions with the greatest campus-wide interest submitted in recent weeks include:

Why did the College spend \$45,000 for a tree-moving machine in these tight budget times? Couldn't the money have been used much better in other ways?

The equipment purchased recently for moving evergreen trees from bosks to other locations on campus will be used for three to four years and then resold after moving of the larger trees has been completed. College officials estimate that the resale price will be high enough to make our actual cost for the machine very low during the years it is operated here. In addition, SVSC had borrowed CMU's smaller machine for a number of years and will allow them to borrow this unit as repayment. Some thought is also being given to the possibility of selling larger trees from the bosk as a money making project. Finally, it may be possible to rent the machine, which is considerably larger than others owned by area nurseries, to pay for its cost. In future months, you'll be seeing that many of the trees moved by the new machine could not have been relocated otherwise.

When will the 1981 salary increases be announced for administrative/professional staff members? Is there any relationship between the performance evaluations made earlier this summer and the percentage of individual raises?

Present plans are to have the pay adjustments made in paychecks distributed on October 9. New rates will be effective retroactive to July 1, 1981. The salary adjustment process is separate from earlier performance evaluations, but it is incorrect to say that there's never a relationship between the two processes. Primarily, the discussion between the supervisor and employee will determine the degree of specific relationship to the subsequent salary adjustment. Regarding salary equity adjustments, the Executive Committee jointly reviewed promotions and other reclassifications and considered these in a group.

Is there some way I can donate money for a specific piece of equipment needed in my department and still get a tax deduction for a charitable contribution?

Yes, there is -- provided that the equipment will belong to the college and will be used in the performance of college duties.

Why has the state car operation been moved again, resulting in shorter hours for being able to pick up keys? Why don't you move the cars closer to the sign-out place, at least for this winter?

First of all, the operation was moved from public safety to physical plant so that two existing employees could be assigned additional duties to absorb the work of one person in public safety. This made it possible to reduce the staff by that position. In the future, keys will be available after hours and cars will be located near the water tower. Final details will be announced shortly.

Last winter on slippery mornings, I kept getting a busy signal on the college weather line. What's the best way to find out if we're open or closed at SVSC?

As soon as a decision is made to close classes or any college operations, three persons immediately call all area radio and television stations. If you hear no news from SVSC, that means operations are proceeding normally. In other words, no news is bad news, if you were planning on some extra time in the sack. Simply keep your radio or TV tuned to any Bay City, Midland or Saginaw station, and we'll get the word out as soon as a decision is made. The college weather line -- 790-4477 -- is primarily used for announcements concerning closings after 4:00 p.m.

STUDY SKILLS SERIES SPELLS "SUCCESS"

SVSC students will have help this fall developing study skills needed for success in today's fast-paced college courses. Coordinator of orientation programs MaryAnne Lust-graaf has planned a series of seminars to give students an edge in the academic world.

Each workshop session will be offered Mondays from 3-5 p.m. and repeated from 5-7 p.m. the following Thursday, for the convenience of both daytime and evening students. All sessions are free and meet in lower level Doan Center. The meetings are also open to persons not enrolled as SVSC students, so long as space permits.

Topic this week is "Organize Your Time and Classes." Completing the September schedule are "Catch on to Lectures" on the 21st and 24th, and "Compose Intelligible Notes," set for September 28 and October 1.

Offered October 5 and 8 will be "Make Sense Out of Textbooks and Coursework." On October 12 and 15, students will learn to "Construct Term Papers and Written Assignments" and on October 26 and 29 they find out how to "Participate Loud and Clear in Class Discussions and Speaking Assignments."

As the semester continues, participants are taught techniques to "Take Exams and Control Test Anxiety" on November 2 and 5 -- just in time for mid-terms. And in case exams scores are less than expected, students can return for the November 9 and 12 sessions and learn how to "Assert Yourself and Your Rights." Further help with any developing problems is offered on November 16 and 19 with a seminar that shows the way to "Reduce Stress and Resolve Conflicts."

The series concludes, appropriately enough, with instructions to "Prepare Yourself for Finals" set for November 30 and December 3.
