#### WINTER ENROLLMENTS STABLE

Student enrollments continue to remain stable for the winter 1982 semester at SVSC. A new winter enrollment record of 4,078 students have signed up for classes, reports registrar Paul Saft. That figure is up 1.3 percent from last winter's 4,026 headcount.

The number of students enrolled for winter courses has increased each year since SVSC began, according to Saft. Thus 1982 marks the 17th consecutive year that a winter enrollment record has been set.

Credit hour registrations total 38,612 this winter, some 1.3 percent below the winter semester 1981 report of 39,125 credits. Average credit load per student this winter is 9.47 credits versus 9.72 a year earlier, notes director of institutional research and planning Dr. Ann K. Dickey.

#### BIRDS ARRIVING

A display of bird and wildlife prints will bring a taste of spring to the art workshop gallery. Beginning February 1, paintings and etchings by Richard Bishop will be on exhibit through Monday, February 15.

Following World War I, Bishop developed an international reputation as the world's foremost wildfowl illustrator. He received numerous awards for his work, and his painting "Canada Geese" was selected by the U.S. Department of the Interior for the 1936 Federal Duck Stamp.

Bishop's art reached a broad audience

through use as calendar illustrations, and he produced glassware, jewelry and fabrics. He is the author of "Bishop's Birds" (1936); "Bishop's Wildfowl" (1948); and "Ways of Wildfowl" (1941).

According to art department chairman Dr. Barron Hirsch, "Bishop's work is not academic, but essentially romantic; it has feeling. It is not simply birds, but an integrated view of wildlife that expresses a harmony between man and nature."

The display is from a private collection, and can be viewed free of charge at the gallery weekdays from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. For more information, please call the fine arts office at ext. 4159.

#### RUSSIAN EPIC AND THRILLER COMING

A Russian epic film expressing feelings of an artist in conflict with his society and a Hitchcock thriller will help Valley Film Society members take the chill off February days. Both movies will be shown at 8:00 p.m. in Wickes lecture hall.

"Andrei Rublev" is set for Friday, February 5. Based on the life of a 15th century Russian monk and icon painter, the film follows his experiences in a Russia ravaged by Tartar invasions. Many critics consider it the most important Russian film of the past 20 years.

On Friday, February 19, Alfred Hitchcock fans can view "Topaz." This film is based on Leon Uris' best seller which exposed one of the most explosive spy scandals of this century. It tells the story of men and women caught in the web of international tensions. Espionage is their way of life, and the movie explores political and personal consequences of their actions.

#### BLACK HISTORY MONTH OFFERS VARIED FARE

Literature, art, theatre, music, film and food will all be part of SVSC's Black History Month celebrations in February. Campus activities coordinator MaryAnne Lustgraaf has put together a variety of programs to demonstrate the rich cultural heritage and contributions of the Black community.

Events kick off with an art exhibit in lower level Doan Center from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, February 2. Works displayed will be by SVSC students and local Black artists.

At 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 4, a view of life from the perspective of four Black poets will be presented through readings from their works. Paulette White will include selections from her collection of "Love Poems to a Black Junkie." Joining her in Doan Center's large private dining room will be Naomi Long Madgett, Talata Dorsey and Rose Margaret Bean to share their compositions with the audience.

A lecture examining "Perspectives on Africa and its Art" by Valerie Harold will take place in lower level Doan at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, February 8. Ms. Harold is an associate professor of humanities at Delta College.

A series of films exploring various facets of the Black experience will be shown in Doan Center throughout February. Each film will screen once at 11:30 a.m. and again at 7:30 p.m. The list includes "Our Country, Too" and "Black Women" on Wednesday, February 10. On Monday, February 15, audiences can view "Dance Theatre of Harlem" and "Heritage of the Negro." "To be Young, Gifted and Black" is set for Monday, February 22, and the series concludes on Thursday, February 25, with "Diary of a Harlem Family."

Musical performances with a Black accent include a special concert by the "21st Century Steel Band" on Wednesday, February 17, at 8:00 p.m. in the SVSC theatre. The group has attracted world-wide attention with its unique ability to produce music from discarded steel oil drums that have been

specially cut and shaped.

Gospel music devotees will find a Thursday, February 18, program to their liking. Several community vocal groups will join forces at 8:00 p.m. in SVSC's theatre to present a Gospel concert. They include the Tabernacle Baptist Church and adult choir, Saginaw High School Soul Choir, Delta College Soul Choir, Buena Vista High School choir, Brother and Sister Mercy Stevens and other groups. Matt Hennessee, assistant city manager in Saginaw, will host the performance.

Completing the performing arts section of the month-long observance will be a special presentation of "First Fruits" by Saginaw's Kuumba actors. They will be on stage at the SVSC theatre at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 24.

Three activities which are part of the course "Harlem on My Mind" have been opened to interested community members. They include the movie "Harlem Renaissance; the Black Poet" on Wednesday, February 3, plus recorded music sessions on February 19 and 22. Each meeting will be at 1:30 p.m. in room 213 Pioneer Hall.

To close out the month, campus activities will host a soul food banquet at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, February 23. Guest speaker for the event will be Essama Nssah Bonifus, professor of economics at Central Michigan University. Reservations are required, and the meal costs \$5 per person.

All activities except the banquet and the "21st Century Steel Band" concert have free admission. General admission tickets are \$2. SVSC students may attend free, and faculty/staff for \$1. For reservations or more information about any event, call campus activities at ext. 4260.
