## DOCKUS SIGNS WITH FRENCH BASKETBALL TEAM

SVSC All-American Diane Dockus will continue her basketball career in Europe this fall. The Mt. Clemens native recently signed a one year contract to play international basketball for Berrichonne in Chateauroux, France.

Their 40-game season begins in early September and runs through April. In her off-court time, Dockus will coach basketball at the junior high level and take French lessons.

"Playing professional basketball overseas is one of my highest goals," said Dockus, "and I've always wanted to go to France. I'm a bit apprehensive about going there not knowing anyone or the language," she admitted. "But at the same time I'm very excited about this great opportunity."

The 23-year-old, 6-foot-2 center had been corresponding with several European teams about the possibility of continuing her career and turned down a similar offer from a British team.

Dockus became the all-time leading scorer and rebounder for the Lady Cardinals during the 1981-82 season, topping the 1,000 mark in both categories. She led SVSC to consecutive appearances in the NAIA National Women's Basketball Tournament during her junior and senior seasons, including a third-place finish last season.

An English major, Dockus was the first SVSC athlete to be named to the CoSIDA Academic All-American team and the first NAIA All-American for the Lady Cardinals. A three-time All-Great Lakes Conference selection, Dockus was the Cardinals' Female Scholar-Athlete for two straight years. She will be leaving for France on Tuesday, August 24, from Detroit Metro Airport.

## SVSC HERITAGE SERIES RECEIVES GRANT

An \$11,000 grant from the Michigan Council for the Humanities was awarded to SVSC's Chrysallis Center for a planned 12-program fall series titled, "Saginaw: Its Cultural Heritage, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

Announcement of the grant was made jointly by the 29-member Michigan Council in East Lansing and Rosella E. Collamer, associate professor of English and director of Chrysallis Center. The award covers costs associated with the project, but includes an in-kind matching services provision.

The heritage series is being planned by a 15-member citizens' committee in cooperation with SVSC. Program co-sponsors include The Saginaw News, WNEM TV-5, Saginaw County Historical Society, and the Daniels Lifelong Learning Center.

"The humanities project was launched last year with a similar series of programs titled, 'Our Saginaw Valley Heritage: Rocks, Rivers and Records'," said Collamer. "It attracted large and enthusiastic audiences throughout its 12-week run, and we believe this year's program will be even better."

Again this fall, programs will be offered free every Tuesday evening at the Lifelong Learning Center beginning September 14 and concluding November 30. All guest presenters are from the Saginaw area. Programs will concentrate on development and cultural aspects of the community.

## FACULTY/STAFF ORIENTATION DATE SET

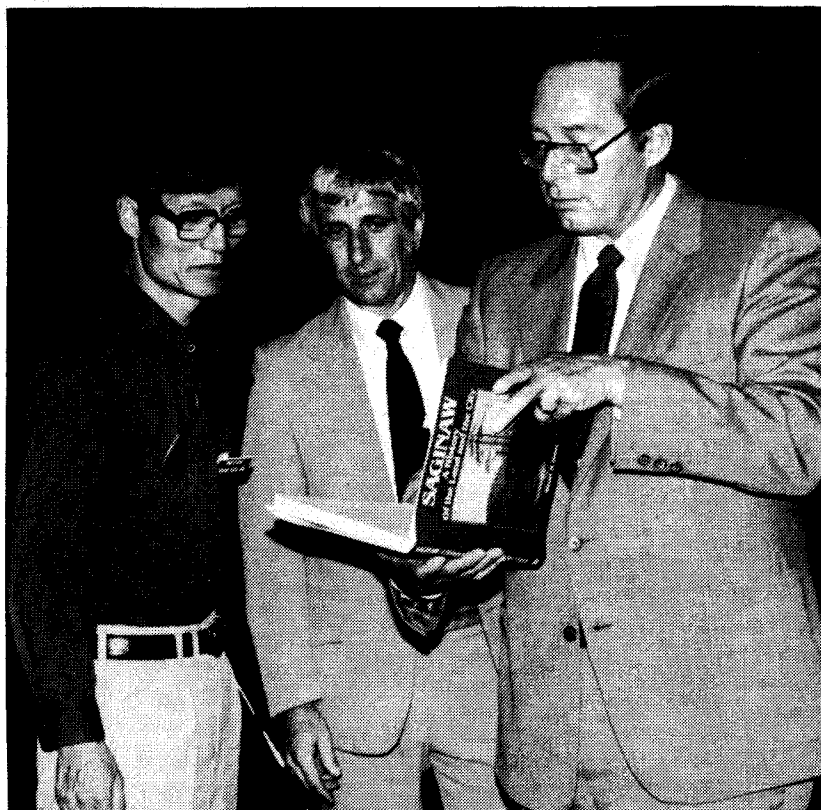

### SVSC EXCHANGE PROGRAMS GROWING

Exchange students from Kyung Hee University, Seoul, Korea; and Shikoku Women's University, Tokushima, Japan, have added an international dimension to SVSC's campus this summer. Seventeen students and their professor came from Korea July 12 to spend three weeks learning about language and culture in the U.S. They were joined July 19 by three students from Shikoku Women's University, currently completing a five-week stay at SVSC. The girls leave for Japan this Friday after an intensive course in "American Language and Culture" which included tours and classroom study.

They are part of continuing exchange programs which have sent SVSC students and professors to Korea, Japan and Poland in return for visits by students and instructors from those countries. There are also three professors from the Republic of China studying in the physics department at SVSC, and two SVSC faculty member who will travel abroad next year on Fulbright fellowships.
