EXCERPTS FROM A POLISH EXPERIENCE

The holiday season is a time of renewing friendships and sharing with family members. This year several members of the SVSC family will be spending Christmas abroad: Greg and Barbara Gray in Japan; Dr. Art Andrewes in Norway; and Gary and Pam Thompson in Poland. The Grays are participating in SVSC's exchange program with Shikoku Women's University in Tokushima, while Art Andrewes and Gary Thompson both hold Fulbright Fellowships for academic pursuits abroad.

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Being here puts America into a much larger perspective than I am used to seeing it. Only a small portion of world history has occurred while America has been the USA."

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The following excerpts are shared from cards and letters sent by the Thompsons.

"We received our visas on the morning of the day we were to leave. ... We arrived in London on August 29. Except for long visits in several bookstores we were normal tourists. Andy posed in a lion's mouth in Trafalgar Square; we took the tour in the double-decker red bus; walked along Sherlock Holmes' Baker Street; and visited the London Zoo. ... The next week we took the ferry from Dover to Calais and then the train to Basel, a beautiful city where three countries meet. On the 8th of Sept. we took a day train through the Alps to Vienna and were thinking about SVSC's faculty orientation and the State of the College address.

"Poland is very poor. From the train we saw family after family working side by side by hand in their long narrow plots. Everything seemed gray and gloomy. But now that we are getting to know so many people, images are changing. I really like it here.

"Our two week orientation in Krakow was excellent. Besides language and culture lessons, there were tours of the city and several castles outside the city, a weekend at Zakopane, a visit to the salt mines (we laughed too, but there were beautiful sculptures, a lake and a cathedral all carved from salt, some hundreds of years ago) and a visit to Auschwitz (I am glad this was last—it took my stomach about a week to recover).

"Americans are welcomed here, more so than in any other country we traveled through (although the government's reaction to Americans is different from the Polish people's). In fact, there may be a reason that our apartment is next to a cemetery and empty coffins are kept downstairs....

"Lublin is the prettiest city (besides Zakopane, which is in the mountains) we have seen yet in Poland. Our apartment is near the university in an older part of town in a five-story L-shaped building. We're on the fourth floor. It's a two-room apartment with a kitchen and bath, plus a

balcony and lots of windows. It has a nice feeling and we are very lucky to have it -- Poles here wait ten or more years for an apartment and then end up in highrises on the outskirts of town. There are lots of trees and a play area in the courtyard.

"Andy goes downstairs and collects kids. At first we went with him, but he doesn't need us anymore. Once a mass of them came up to ask where we were from, and since we didn't answer Russia or Germany, they went back to play with him. They are exchanging languages. Andy returned quickly one day saying 'Nie ma kids,' meaning there were no kids to play with. 'Nie ma' is a phrase we hear often while shopping.

"Andy will start school Monday. My enrolling in year-long Polish courses at the Catholic University counts as work (a requirement for enrolling Andy in kindergarten). It seems like an excellent program, besides being an excellent way to meet another set of people. ... The Catholic University has a good feel about it. It's like the people here are involved in what is happening in Poland, while those at Marie Curie just watch. It's also interesting that across the street from KUL is a military parking lot with tanks and guns pointed at KUL.

"On the day that Parliament banned Solidarity the TV was full of news reports showing tanks and guns and a movie about a resistance group which didn't succeed....No one takes the newspapers or TV seriously here. There are several Catholic weeklies which leave blanks where items are censored and indicate which part of the censorship law has been violated. Silence says a lot.

"Items which we haven't seen since we arrived are beginning to appear on the shelves: tomato paste, chicken, good pieces of meat, etc. There is no subtlety in the government's timing. Generally, the shelves are starting to fill up, but I am sure it will last only as long as our behavior is good.

From Gary: (postcard dated December 1) "Polish post cards seem to feature public buildings (hotels and rail stations). This

one, fortunately, gives a view to the northwest, away from the Stalinist architectural monument, the 'Palace of Culture.' Lublin's train station is somewhat smaller than the Dworzec Centrainy here; it's like comparing the Tri-City Airport to O'Hare."

SPORTS REPORT

The SVSC men's basketball team celebrated "Christmas with the Cardinals" with an offensive explosion against the University of Michigan-Dearborn last Saturday. Seven players scored in double figures for the Cardinals (6-3) as they pounded the Wolves, 127-60. It was the highest single-game scoring output in the school's history. SVSC collected 130 cans of food in addition to several jars and cereal and cracker boxes which will be donated to the Salvation Army. The goods will be distributed in food baskets to needy families in the Saginaw area.

It was another successful weekend for the Lady Cardinal basketball team as they made it three straight victories over NCAA Division I opponents. SVSC came from behind to edge the University of Michigan, 68-66, in Ann Arbor Saturday. The Cards took nearly eight minutes to score a point in the game and trailed by 14 points mid-way through the first half. SVSC boasts a 4-1 record. The Lady Cards will make a trip to Indiana for a two-game road stand January 5-6 before hosting Pittsburg State on January 8 for their home opener.

The SVSC grapplers turned in a good performance at the Toledo Open on Saturday to close the 1982 portion of the season. Senior Bill Kielts (167 pounds) and freshman Darrell Burchfield (126) each finished third in the olympic style tournament. The Cardinals will be off until January 14 when they travel to Northern Michigan University.


