SVSC TO HONOR OUTSTANDING EDUCATOR


SVSC is seeking nominations for its top faculty honor, the Franc A. Landee Award for Excellence in Teaching. The annual award is presented to a professor who demonstrates superior knowledge of subject matter, prepares students academically, displays sincerity and relates classroom learning to real life.

This year 90 faculty members are eligible for nomination. Ballots are available from selection committee chairman Dr. William K. Barnett, dean of arts and behavioral sciences, and must be returned to him by March 15. The Landee Award recipient will be honored during commencement exercises in May and will receive a special plaque, \$500 and other honors.

Franc A. Landee was a research chemist at Dow Chemical Company who also taught parttime at SVSC. Upon his death in 1968, a memorial fund was established for the purpose of giving recognition each year to an outstanding educator.

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTE NAMES COORDINATOR

Amy C. Millette has been named coordinator for the Business and Industrial Development Institute at SVSC. Her appointment was effective February 21.

Ms. Millette's responsibilities include supervision of preliminary interviews with entrepreneurs seeking assistance from BIDI, and providing client guidance in the use of SVSC library facilities and research techniques. She will maintain communication with entrepreneurs to provide follow-up service and evaluate the effectiveness of SVSC/BIDI services.

Other duties include participation in program planning, coordination of efforts to meet requirements of any grants obtained by BIDI, and interaction with the business community and SVSC faculty. She will report to Dr. Leonard F. Herk, director of BIDI.

For the past nine months, Millette has served as acting coordinator of sponsored programs at SVSC. Prior to joining the SVSC staff in 1981, she was employed by Millette and Associates, and before that by Gibson Greeting Cards.

She is a graduate of Miami University, where she earned a Bachelor of Arts in English with emphasis on creative writing. A Bay City resident, she recently married Dennis Ferguson.

SPORTS REPORT

SVSC's bowling team took its first step towards what coach Ted Nitz hopes will be a national championship by winning the MICB Saturday. The SVSC kegglers amassed 6,433 points in two rounds, blanking both the U of M-Flint and Eastern Michigan University. They also set a school record by averaging 214.7 per man per game for the six-game session, and had three bowlers with 700s. The league title gives SVSC an automatic berth in the National Collegiate sectionals in Detroit in April.

The Cardinals men's **track** team won the District 23 championship for the sixth straight year at Siena Heights Friday. SVSC finished with 267 points, winning 10 of 17 events. Eddie Brown was a quadruple winner and set a new field house record in the triple jump with a leap of 47 feet, 7 3/4 inches. The men's defense of their NAIA crown begins Friday in Kansas City.

The Lady Cards track team also swept the District 23 championships with 113 points to 54 for second place Hillsdale. Kelly Vasold was a triple winner, with Cindy Reinhart, Colleen Booms and Cheryl Gulli each posting double wins. Sue Priemer and Sue Gay also chipped in with victories.

The Lady Cardinal basketball team rolled to lopsided 98-44 victory over Hillsdale's women Thursday, but lost a 62-61 squeaker to Grand Valley on Saturday. The Lady Cards, now 12-2 in the GLIAC and 19-4 overall, are one game behind league leader Oakland University. They will host Oakland Saturday for a game likely to decide the conference championship.

SVSC men's **basketball** team also split last week, pulling out a last-second 76-74 win over Hillsdale on Thursday, but losing to Grand Valley by a 10-point margin Saturday. The 92-82 loss to GVSC left the Cards still in the running for a share of the conference title, since league-leader Ferris was beaten by Hillsdale Saturday.

SVSC's first year of post-NCAA wrestling competition led to a wild-card berth in the Division II national tournament for freshman Darrell Burchfield. The 118-pounder beat an All-American to earn the trip. Craig Gavette and Scott Strickler each posted a 1-2 record in the Saturday regionals at Ferris.


