1982/83 LANDEE WINNER NAMED

Dr. Teruo Ishihara rarely wears a suit and tie because "I don't want anything to come between me and the students."

His philosophy of personal concern for students, coupled with dedication to SVSC and its activities, made him a popular choice for the school's Landee Award for Excellence in Teaching. The annual award was presented to Ishihara, a professor of mechanical engineering and technology at SVSC, at a dinner in his honor last Thursday.

A majority of the students, alumni and faculty who submitted ballots felt Ishihara demonstrates qualities such as superior knowledge of subject matter, ability to motivate and inspire students, sensitivity toward student opinions, fairness and integrity. He also received praise for his commitment to SVSC and its programs.

"Dr. Ishihara is an outstanding example for the SVSC community," said Dr. William K. Barnett, chairman of the Landee award selection committee. "His contributions go far beyond the guidelines for selecting Landee winners. Terry not only teaches and maintains extensive office hours, but also attends many campus functions."

A plaque presented by SVSC President Jack M. Ryder was the highlight of the Landee award dinner for Dr. Terry Ishihara (c) and his wife, Simi. Ishihara also will receive an honorarium and be recognized during Commencement exercises on May 7.

SVSC President Jack M. Ryder noted the Landee award is the most distinguished honor the college presents to its instructional staff. "It is a tribute to Dr. Ishihara's dedication that he would be selected after only three years with SVSC," Ryder said.

Much of Ishihara's teaching philosophy is based on personal experiences and his attitude toward others. "Teaching lets you interface with people," he commented, "and to me that is the most important aspect of life." He added, "My undergraduate years at Washington State University had an especially important effect on me, and they will always be with me."

Ishihara compared Washington State in the 1940's to SVSC today -- small colleges offering much opportunity for interaction between students and faculty. He feels SVSC is becoming an important part of the tricounty community. "We have a great thing going here," he asserted.



SVSC's Landee award is not the first citation Ishihara has received for teaching excellence. In 1974 he received the Outstanding Teacher Award from Triangle Fraternity at Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology, and in 1969 he was cited for outstanding service to engineering students at the University of Missouri.

Ishihara began his teaching duties at SVSC in 1980. In addition to a bachelor of science earned at Washington State, he holds math education certification from the University of California-Berkeley, a master of science in applied math from San Jose State University, and a master of science and Ph.D. degrees in mechanical engineering from the University of Arizona.

He and his wife, Simi, are the parents of five children. They reside in Saginaw township with their youngest son, Terry, who is an honor student at SVSC.

The Landee award includes a plaque, \$500, and a year of honor in memory of the late Dr. Franc A. Landee, former Dow Chemical Company research scientist who taught parttime at SVSC.

PRESIDENTIAL MEETINGS SET

In an effort to inform the campus community about budgetary problems faced by the college, President Jack M. Ryder and Vice President for Business Affairs Jerry A. Woodcock have scheduled a series of meetings. Two sessions open to all interested members of the campus community are set for 3:30 p.m., Monday, April 18, and 10:30 a.m., Tuesday, April 19 in lower level Doan Center.

During the past two weeks, Ryder and Woodcock have met with SVSC Faculty Association officers, the Student Senate, "Valley Vanguard" staff members, and department directors and A/P staff from the areas which report to vice presidents Gilbert, Sharp and Woodcock. Financial data contained on inserts in last week's and the current issue of the "Interior" was discussed, and there was opportunity for questions and comments by those attending. In addition, information was presented about the cost of SVSC's athletic program. This information also will be presented at next week's meetings.







STUDENT CLUB TO HELP FUTURE STUDENTS

A club trying to aid science students at SVSC has undertaken the task of raising a \$10,000 endowment fund for future scholarships. The Biology and Chemistry Science club recently gave college president Jack M. Ryder a \$300 check with the pledge that they would continue to seek contributions until the fund is capable of providing \$1,000 a year in scholarships. Plans now call for a single \$500 award each semester.

"The scholarship's purpose is to promote excellence in the areas of biology and chemistry," said Dr. Peter Moehs, associate professor of chemistry and club faculty advisor. The scholarship will be based on academic performance and is open to students in biology and chemistry programs.

RENAISSANCE MUSIC FEATURED AT CONCERT

The SVSC music department will step into the past when it presents "Pleasures and Pastimes of the Renaissance" on Tuesday, April 19 at 7:30 p.m. in the theatre. Renaissance and medieval music from the 14th to 17th centuries will be featured by the Collegium Musicum of SVSC and the Campian Consort singers of Midland. The Collegium, which uses such ancient instruments as lute, recorder, vielle and krummhorn, will perform a variety of dance music and love tunes. Campian Consort will join the Collegium in addition to presenting several solo selections.

Dr. Eric Nisula, associate professor of music, heads the Collegium Musicum. Campian Consort is under the direction of Grover Procter, manager of the Midland Symphony Orchestra.
