GOVERNOR BLANCHARD VISITS SVSC CAMPUS

Michigan Governor James J. Blanchard was on campus Friday for two events. In the morning he spoke to approximately 800 Michigan Youth Corps employees, supervisors and employer representatives who gathered in Cardinal Gymnasium for a graduation ceremony. He told the audience the Youth Corps program had been an outstanding success.

"Your work benefited not only you, but the people of Michigan," he said. Blanchard said the program disproved three myths -- that "young people don't want to work, there's no work to be done, and even if there were, a government-run work program would be unsuccessful. Ours was the largest and most successful jobs program in the United States," Blanchard asserted.

The Youth Corps workers, between 18 and 21 years of age, received information packets containing materials for preparing resume's and conducting a job search. Included in the group were young people responsible for many improvements made to the SVSC grounds

and facilities this summer. Following the presentation, guests were treated to a picnic sponsored by local firms who had employed MYC workers for summer projects.

In the afternoon, the Governor was back, along with heads of state departments, for a leadership conference involving some 600 people representing a cross section of local business, industry, governmental and human service agencies. After a brief formal presentation, the Governor fielded audience questions, beginning with a response to the query, "Are you planning to close SVSC?"

Blanchard replied, "I would not have signed a capital outlay bill appropriating funds for construction of a new \$28.4 million instructional facility here if I had any intention of closing SVSC."

Later, the group divided into workshop sessions led by department heads. The day was capped off with a reception at Doan Center. The SVSC meeting was the first of a series to be conducted across the state.

CLASS NOTEBOOK

SVSC's fall selection of non-credit classes range in length from one evening to 11 weeks and are designed for enrichment or to develop skills of students who may not be working toward a college degree. Registration fees vary according to duration and content of each course, and employee discounts may apply.

A **"Jazzercise"** class is already in session, but new enrollments are welcome. Classes meet Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:45 to 5:45 p.m. in lower Doan Center until December 1. Course fee is \$16 for eight classes or \$2.50 a session.

"Beginning Japanese Language & Culture" will meet every Monday, beginning September 26, in room 15 of the '68 building. Mrs. Yoko Mossner will acquaint students with the basics of Japanese language, customs and culture. Registration for the 10 week course is \$62.50.

Also beginning September 26 is a seven and a half-week class, **"Introduction to Russian Language and Culture,"** taught by Dr. Dasha Nisula. Meeting in room 15C of the '68 building from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays, the class will expose English-speaking students to the Cyrillic alphabet and to the cultural heritage of the ruling nationality in the Soviet Union. The class fee is \$75.

"Comparative Folklore" will look at myths and tales from around the world and examine them for cultural and psychological truths. The seven and a half-week class meets on Mondays and Wednesdays beginning September 26 in room 15C of the '68 building from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. Dr. Dasha Nisula instructs the course and the fee is \$75.

A basic **word processing** course will be held each Wednesday from 7:00-9:00 p.m. for six weeks at ComputerLand, 3545 Bay Road in Saginaw, beginning September 28. "Wordstar Beginning" uses one of the world's best selling word processing software packages for micro computers. No prior knowledge of word processing is necessary. The fee is \$30.

"Beginning Chinese Language & Culture" is a five-week course which will meet Mondays and Thursdays, starting September 29, and

is taught by Louise Cheng. Class meetings are 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. in room 14 of the '68 building. It is an introduction to the Chinese spoken and written language as well as significant characteristics of the Chinese culture. Class fee is \$62.50.

"Investment for Women" will familiarize women with financial instruments such as stocks, bonds, CD's and tax planning. Susan England will teach the four week course which meets on Saturdays, beginning October 8, from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. in Wickes hall room 234. Course fee is \$25.00

England will also teach **"Investments for Singles,"** which will assist people in the development of an effective investment plan. Casa del Rey of Bay City is the site for this four week class which meets on Fridays from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. starting October 28. Class fee is \$30.

"Patient Care Equipment Training" is designed to help the beginner caring for a patient in the home or anyone interested in understanding health care and equipment. The course covers care in monitoring of diabetic patients, incontinent patients, proper care and maintenance of equipment and information on pain control, ostomy pouches, skin care and odor control. The five-week class meets on Mondays and Wednesdays, beginning October 17, from 7:00 to 10:00 p.m. The course is limited to 25 people and the fee is \$75.

"Beginning Wine Tasting" meets each Wednesday starting October 19. The five-week course will meet from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in room 15 of the '68 building and will sample wines from France, Germany, Italy, Spain and California. Dr. Tom Hearron teaches the class. The cost is \$65, which includes a \$40 materials fee.

A one-day **"Study Skills Workshop"** will be held on Saturday, October 29 from 8:00 a.m. 1:00 p.m. in 238 Wickes Hall. MaryAnne Lustgraaf will assist students in identifying problems areas of study and improving study patterns and habits. The course fee is \$15 and includes a complimentary ticket to the Cardinal Football game against Wayne State.

CARDINAL RUN STILL TAKING SPONSORS

People will be running for fun, funds, SVSC and community organizations when they participate in the Cardinal Run on Saturday, October 8 at 9:00 a.m.

The annual event features bands, local celebrities, food and hundreds of walkers, joggers and runners covering Morley Track to support Cardinal athletics and many local organizations. This year's goal is to make the run the largest fund raiser in the history of SVSC athletics.

"We're shooting for a great success," said Terry Niederstadt, 1983 run chairman and president of Second National Bank of Bay City. "Besides raising money, the run's a nice family affair," noted Niederstadt.

Those participating in the run secure sponsors to pay dollar amounts per lap completed in one hour on the Cardinal's 400-meter track or a one-mile cross country course. Non-profit organizations solicit sponsors and split the profits with SVSC.

WNEM-TV 5 personality Chuck Waters will be on hand for the second consecutive year to signal the start and serve as master of ceremonies. Events of the day include performances by the Bay City and District Highland Bagpipe Band and SVSC's Marching Cardinals.

Community leaders will also assist the SVSC effort. Many legislators from the surrounding area will jog their way around the track, including mayors from each of the tri-cities, and several state senators and representatives.

Approximately \$30,000 was collected from each of the first two runs. Monies from the first run were used to purchase a large capacity washer and dryer for the equipment room. A remodeling project for Cardinal gymnasium was made possible by last year's event. In addition, each athletic team participating earns a share of the profits to be used specifically for the team's operating budget. Athletic Director Robert Becker and his Coaches Corner organization are working with the SVSC athletes, setting a goal of \$400 for each Cardinal.

Pam Binder, coordinator of annual giving at SVSC and run coordinator, says that there is still time for interested groups and in-

dividuals to participate in the Cardinal Run. "The biggest advantage for an organization is the fact that we do the billing and handle the paperwork," Binder stated. "And of course the donations by sponsors are tax deductible."

SVSC's Fighting Cardinal football squad continued their turnaround with a victory over Indiana's Franklin College Saturday.
