# HOME COMING ACTIVITIES COVER THE WEEK

Activities to entertain alumni, students and the community are being planned to celebrate SVSC's homecoming this week.

Today there's a special showing of the film "Officer and a Gentleman" at 2:00 p.m. in lower Doan and again at 10:00 p.m. in Wickes. Admission is free.

The Clubs and Organizations Fair on Wednesday gives information about all campus groups open to students and other SVSC groups. It runs from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. in Doan Mall. Doan will also be the site of the "Mr. Legs Contest" at 9:00 p.m. that evening. Proceeds will benefit the SVSC Children's Center.

Thursday, October 6, features the premiere of "Let's Have Lunch Sometime," an original play by Saginaw's Stu Gross and Jerry Werle. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m. in the SVSC theatre for this production that looks at the adjustments to retirement. Other performances are scheduled for Friday and Saturday at 8:15 p.m., plus a Sunday matinee at 3:00 p.m. Reserved tickets are priced at \$7 for the premiere, which includes a reception afterward, and \$4 for succeeding shows. At 7:45 p.m. Friday, the Valley Film Society will present the acclaimed "My Dinner with Andre," in Wickes lecture theatre. Admission is by membership.

Athletic contests begin Saturday when the SVSC women's tennis team takes on Lake Superior State College. Action starts at 1:00 p.m. at the courts behind Cardinal Gymnasium and admission is free.

Homecoming activities culminate with the football game pitting the Cardinals against the Huskies of Michigan Technological University. Kick off is at 1:30 p.m. and tickets are \$4 for general admission and \$2 for students. Halftime ceremonies include a performance by the Cardinal marching band and crowning of the homecoming king and queen.

### CLASS NOTEBOOK

--SVSC is sponsoring a trip to Spain's principal cities from February 25 to March 3, and it's open to members of the campus community.

"It will cover more than the usual stops at tourist sites and participants will have the option of earning up to three semester hours of credit." said Dr. Ricardo Pastor, head of SVSC's modern foreign language department and trip organizer.

Cost of the tour is approximately \$990, which Pastor considers a bargain. "Compared to what an eight-day trip to some-place such as Miami would cost with meals, flight and hotel fares, this tour is an excellent value." A round-trip flight from Flint is included in the package, plus first class hotels, continental breakfast and lunch or dinner each day, transportation in Spain, English speaking tour guides and all taxes and services.

The tour begins with two days in Madrid, including visits to the Prado Museum, the Royal Palace, and drives along the main avenues. There will also be an excursion to Toledo, to observe characteristic examples of Spanish civilization.

Next stop is Cordoba, birthplace of the philosopher Seneca. Sevilla offers exploration of the Cathedra, Giralda, and the Santa Cruz quarters. Granada with its Red Citadel, Generalife gardens and Palace of Charles V is next.

The tour winds down with a full day in Torremolinos and the beaches of Costa del Sol.

The Cardinals opened the GLIAC football season with a nail-biting 14-8 victory at Hillsdale Saturday. SVSC, ranked 18th in the NAIA last week, had to rely on a strong defensive effort to knock off the number two ranked Chargers. SVSC, now 3-1, is tied for the GLIAC lead with a 1-0 mark.

The Cardinal cross country squad split a triangular meet at Bowling Green Saturday. SVSC beat Ball State 16-47, and lost to Bowling Green 19-42. Senior Ed LaBair finished second overall.

The Lady Cardinal tennis team posted its fourth shutout of the season Friday, trouncing defending GLIAC champion Wayne State 9-0. SVSC is now 5-1 in the league.

SVSC opened the GLIAC volleyball season by losing a pair of matches to Lake Superior and Michigan Tech. The Lady Cardinals are now 3-5 overall and 0-2 in the conference.
