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## WEEK OF EVENTS PLANNED FOR ANNIVERSARY

SVSC will enter its third decade in November and plans are underway to celebrate the occasion with lectures, presentations, open houses, and an art exhibit. As a special anniversary event, ground will be broken for Instructional Facility 2.

The theme for SVSC's 20th anniversary week is "Developing Mindpower for Tomorrow's Challenges," and activities begin at 12:30 p.m. in the Wickes faculty lounge on Monday, November 7, with a faculty lecture on the ethics of French philosopher Pierre Abelard. The presentation by Dr. Drew Hinderer is one of four that will be made by SVSC professors who attended summer seminars through grants from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

A science open house for high school students will be held the morning of Tuesday, November 8. At 12:30 p.m. that day a presentation by Dr. Eric Petersen on 1970-71 Vietnam peace talks is scheduled in Wickes faculty lounge. An artist from the People's Republic of China conducting a fine arts workshop will close the day's events at 3:00 p.m. in the SVSC Art Workshop Gallery. Works by Professor Xian-Rang Yong, director of the Central Institute of Fine Arts in Beijing, will be on display in the gallery from Monday through Wednesday.

A full day is slated for Wednesday, November 9. Students from area high schools will participate in Foreign Language Day activities which include an address by Dr. Roderich Klett, political affairs editor, Sueddeutscher Rundfunk radio, Stuttgart, Germany. At 12:30 p.m. in Wickes faculty lounge, Dr. Charles Brown will discuss using the music of Matsuri Bayashiy as a teaching tool. A presentation by professor Yong on Oriental oil painting is set for 6:00 p.m. in the art workshop.

Wednesday's highlight will be a speech by the Dr. Ernest Boyer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Education, at 8:00 p.m. in the SVSC theatre. Reservations are required and can be made by calling 790-4419.

Thursday, November 10, will kick off with the SVSC department of criminal justice conducting a crime prevention seminar for area businesses at 9:30 a.m. in Doan Center. The final faculty presentation will be made at 12:30 p.m. in the faculty lounge when Dr. Dasha Nisula examines the literary fields of Russian formalism and contemporary French and American Criticism.

Activities on Thursday afternoon begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Wickes lecture theatre with a lecture on hydrogen bonding by Dr. Louis A. Errede, 3M research chemist. At 6:30 p.m. the Industrial Relations Research Association has a dinner meeting and speaker in Doan Center. Mary Christian, vice president of Michigan Education Association, will speak on merit pay for teachers. Tickets are \$9 for members, \$12 for non-members. Call 790-4064 for reservations and information. Closing out the day at 7:30 p.m. in the SVSC theatre will be a presentation on special membranes in plants by Dr. Errede.

The week's events culminate on Friday, November 11, at 2:00 p.m. with the groundbreaking for IF-2 between Wickes and Pioneer Halls. A reception for the campus community and the public will be held in Doan Center following the ceremony.

"Our 20th anniversary presents a unique opportunity to review our past and redefine our future mission," said SVSC President Jack M. Ryder. "Planning for the week's events represents a campus-wide effort, and we hope the entire SVSC community will participate in an many activities as possible."

## CLASS NOTEBOOK

A popular class at SVSC has taken a page from New England history. Valley Forum will use a town meeting format for several class sessions to encourage examination and discussion of current issues affecting the community. While the class has been offered for several years at SVSC, this fall it is combining forces with the National Issues Forum to focus local attention on relevant national issues.

The National Issues Forum was established to bridge the gap between persons charged with formulating national domestic policies in the U.S. and the citizens they serve. Its goals are to provide a mechanism for citizens to inform themselves about national issues, involve themselves in public choices, and communicate with leaders.

Locally, the Saginaw chapter of the Forum sought to bring local attention to bear on problems requiring assistance from policy makers. SVSC's Valley Forum class has been selected as one means for opening public dialogue, and a series of special presentations has been planned to accomplish this.

These Valley Forum meetings, held in Wickes lecture hall on the SVSC campus from 12:30 to 2:30 p.m., are open to the public free of charge. Each will involve a presentation by a panel or individual with expertise in a specific area, followed by an open discussion period.

First of the special series will be conducted on Monday, October 31. Titled "Innovation and Organizing for Change," it will focus on the federal budget. On Monday, November 7, a panel composed of Michigan Senator James Barcia, Traxler aide Donald Hare, and Wilma Dresen from the Midland League of Women Voters will examine ways to effect change from the perspective of their status and role. SVSC President Jack M. Ryder will be the featured speaker on Monday, November 28. He will discuss the future of education in this region of the state.

Coordinating the series is Valley Forum instructor Ann Rae, associate professor of social work at SVSC. According to Rae, Valley Forum will continue the open session during winter semester. Topics to be covered then include "Jobs and Productivity" and "Nuclear Arms and National Security." For more information about the series, call Rae at ext. 4077.

## ADMINISTRATIVE DUTIES RESTRUCTURED

President Ryder has announced a change in the administrative reorganization which took place earlier this fall involving the area of responsibility assigned to the Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs.

To expedite work flow, a position of administrative assistant to the Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs has been approved. "This has been done in recognition of several factors, including the increased workload resulting from the recent reorganization," Ryder said. "In addition, the accounting functions for the SVSC Foundation will be moved to the office of the Vice President for Administration and Business Affairs. This was necessitated by the recently announced resignation of Robin Eaton, who has been secretary/bookkeeper for the Foundation, coupled with increased Foundation activities."

According to Ryder, funding for the new position will come from consolidation of three sources. "The graduate assistant position assigned to that area but not filled will be eliminated," he noted, "so that funding will now be available for the newly established position. In addition, the Foundation will provide financial support to the college general fund as payment for accounting service to be received. Remaining funding for the position will come from savings realized on the unfilled budget director's position, vacated when James Muladore assumed dual responsibilities as Controller and Budget Director."

Ryder also indicated the Foundation would be replacing Mrs. Eaton with a full-time secretary to handle increased work flow in that area.

## HIGH FIVE

The Lady Cardinal tennis team won a share of its first ever Great Lakes Conference title by tying Hillsdale College at the GLIAC tournament in Houghton. The Cards finished with 17 points, while Ferris finished third with 15. Winning titles for SVSC were Cathy Midcalf at second singles, Laura Hackman at sixth singles, and third doubles team Anne Walker and Misty VanSteenhouse. Coach Brian Gano was named "Coach of the Year." SVSC's previous highest finish was a pair of fourth places the past two years.

The SVSC football team was upended by Northern Michigan 45-6 Saturday. The Wildcats scored on their first possession and added four second quarter touchdowns en route to a 35-0 halftime lead. The Cardinal offense sputtered in the first half, but moved the ball well in the second half. Troy Shannon, who caught six passes for 144 yards, scored the only SVSC touchdown on a 31-yard pass from backup quarterback Mike Leibinger. NMU appears to be headed towards a third straight berth in the NCAA II playoffs with a 6-2 record, while the seventh-ranked Cardinals fall to 5-2.

After sweeping the top 12 places at their own invitational meet Saturday, the Cardinal cross country team appears to be ready for the NAIA District 23 meet this weekend. Seniors Mark Moleski and Ed LaBair finished one-two, as they have all year for the Cards.
