# ANNIVERSARY SLATES DAYS FOR HIGH SCHOOLS

SVSC'S 20th anniversary week will offer events of interest to many people, including future college students. Area high school students will be able to test their foreign language skills and consider careers in science during special days on Tuesday and Wednesday, November 8 and 9.

Tuesday will feature the annual Science Open House where visitors will tour SVSC's science facilities and learn about the variety of scientific and technical careers available to them. Planners hope to make students aware of projected opportunities in the sciences, and career presentations will focus on specific academic curriculum and the value of a degree when a student enters the job market.

Events begin at 9:00 a.m. with an address by Dr. George Eastland, professor of chemistry, on "Cancer Treatment and Research -- Various Avenues." Eastland has conducted cancer research on campus with support from the Pardee Foundation.

Afterward, students will view career presentations by science departments and tour labs and facilities. Students interested in biology will be introduced to such techniques as DNA extraction and blood typing, as well as observing study on swamp ecology and an aquarium demonstration.

Representatives of the chemistry department will demonstrate instruments, chemical reactions, and applications of microcomputers. The math department will offer games and graphics on the Apple computer, plus a math magic show.

The nursing lab will present video tapes and simulated clinical models of nursing

skills. White light holography and cryogenics are among the physics department displays. Students interested in engineering and technology can watch the department's robot and graphics computer operate.

The eighth annual Foreign Language Day is slated for Wednesday. Activities for students and teachers of French, German, Latin, Polish and Spanish are planned on campus from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in Cardinal Gymnasium. Competition will be featured, with certificates and prizes awarded to winning entries in each event. Students will perform skits, song and dances of their own creation in any of five languages.

There will be a short address by the editorin-chief for political affairs of Sueddeutscher Rundfunk Radio in Stuttgart, Germany. Dr. Roderich Klett has a background in history and political science and has worked in German radio and television.

An essay contest also will be conducted this year. Students were asked to write a 500 word paper on the topic "Foreign Culture(s) in Michigan -- Our Living Heritage." In addition to the competitions, visitors will be able to tour a fair with booths oriented toward the various cultures represented by each language. There also will be ethnic artifacts for sale, and movies of different cultures will be shown.

## FACULTY PRESENTATIONS OPEN ANNIVERSARY

Four SVSC professors will deliver lectures as part of SVSC's 20th anniversary week. One presentation will be given each day, Monday through Thursday, November 7-10, at 12:30 p.m. in Wickes faculty lounge. The lectures are a result of fellowships each professor was awarded this summer by the National Endowment for the Humanities, allowing them sto attend seminars and symposiums in their fields of expertise.

Dr. Drew E. Hinderer, associate professor of philosophy and English, will begin the series with a presentation of "Abelard's Ethics" on Monday. "'A Fair Crack at the South': Nixon, Kissinger, and the North Vietnamese, 1970-71" is the lecture slated for Tuesday by Dr. Eric Petersen, professor of history.

On Wednesday Dr. Charles Brown, professor of music, will discuss "Matsuri Bayashiy as a Teaching Tool." Dr. Dasha Culic Nisula, adjunct professor of English, will cap the series on Thursday with "Russian Formalism and Contemporary French Criticism."

## CHINESE ARTIST VISITS SYSC

One of the premiere artists from the People's Republic of China will be on hand during SVSC's 20th Anniversary Week. Professor Xian-Rang Yong, director of the Central Institute of Fine Arts in Beijing, will exhibit his work in the SVSC Art Workshop Gallery Monday through Wednesday, November 7-9.

In addition, Yong will hold a fine arts workshop on Tuesday, November 8, at 3:00 p.m. and discuss "Oriental Oil Painting" on Wednesday at 6:00 p.m. The workshop will be conducted in the gallery and the oil painting discussion takes place in the art workshop.

Yong's work has been displayed in international exhibitions in France, Japan, Hong Kong, Yugoslavia, Romania and the Soviet Union. His initial degree from the Central Institute of Fine Arts was in oil painting, but he has become one of China's most noted woodcut artists. He is assistant master of exhibitions for the National Association of Woodcut Artists, and has published critiques on fine art.

Yong's presentations and exhibit are open to the public free of charge.

# LEADING EDUCATOR TO SPEAK

A former United States Commissioner of Education will speak here Wednesday, November 9 at 8:00 p.m. in the SVSC Theatre. Dr. Ernest L. Boyer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, will discuss "The Future of American Education and Its Teachers."

Bover has worked for school and college reform for three decades and was selected by his peers as the nation's leading educator in a 1983 survey. One of his most recent works was High School: A Report on Secondary Education in America. The study was based on his conviction that the high school is the most crucial and unifying institution for strengthening education in America.

## HIGH FIVE

The SVSC football team hung on for a 9-7 victory over Wayne State Saturday to remain unbeaten in the GLIAC with a 4-0 record.

The Cardinals scored on a 39-yard pass from Rusty Mandle to Ron Moore in the first quarter. A safety by linebacker Dave Hurst in the third quarter broke a 7-7 tie and provided the winning score for SVSC. The Cards dodged a bullet with 1:30 left in the game when Scott Peterson and Owen Bush blocked a Tartar field goal attempt from 31 yards out. SVSC is now 6-2 overall and can clinch at least a share of the GLIAC title this Saturday when the Cards travel to winless Ferris.

While the Cards' top 13 cross country runners rested, the second group of 16 traveled to Detroit for the "Emily and Pooh and Detroit, Too" five-mile run Saturday. All 16 finished in the top 24 among the 12,000 runners at the race. Troy Ouellette finished third, followed by Jeff Bristow (4th), Robert Lemuel (5th), Paul Richmond (7th), and Rueben Henderson (8th). SVSC will try for its fourth straight NAIA District 23 title in Spring Arbor this Saturday.

The Cardinal bowling squad opened the season in impressive fashion by winning the all events team title at Bloomington, Indiana last weekend. SVSC finished ahead of host Indiana University and defending national champion Vincennes in the nine-team invitational. A pair of freshmen led the charge for the Cards. Ken Fishman was the all events individual champion with a 1,945 nine-game total, while teammate Darryl Slauter finished third (1,871). Fishman also won the singles title with a 698 score, including games of 241, 258, and 199.
