GROUP TO HOLD AWARENESS WEEK

"Handicappers have an inconvenience, not a disability." That is a statement from an SVSC organization sponsoring a program to increase awareness of the realities of being a handicapper.

The Ablers are sponsoring "Awareness Week" during March 13-15. They plan to promote the dignity of all people and heighten sensitivity toward handicapper issues.

"We hope to stress that everyone is unique," said Ted Nitz, SVSC counselor and advisor of the Ablers. "All of us need to learn to appreciate the uniqueness and dignity inherent in every individual, handicapped or not. Besides, all of us are handicapped in some way."

The effort to foster awareness is part of the Ablers' long-range goals, said club president Donna Kaye. "Our group strives to increase awareness, because that's the first key element in any social change. Ablers want to make educational and public conditions better for handicappers. We also work with campus groups, such as the college administration. They're aware of our concerns and goals, and have given us support."

The Ablers are a club that grew out of a campus committee promoting the welfare of handicapped students on campus. They work to provide services for the handicapped, maintain a barrier free campus, and educate the campus community on the needs of handicapped students. Handicapped and non-handicapped students, staff, faculty, and administrators are included in their membership.

A ribbon cutting ceremony begins the week's events on Tuesday, March 13 at 11:00 a.m. in Doan Center. A ramp leading into the lower level was recently rebuilt, making entry into the room easier for people using wheelchairs or Amigos. It was a project that the Ablers had brought to the attention of SVSC officials.

Following the ceremony at 11:30 a.m., Sister Trish Novicke will lead a discussion titled "Will There Be Wheelchairs In Heaven?" Novicke will cover historic church attitudes toward handicappers, currently attitudes and limits that all people face. Closing the afternoon will be "PMS: A Woman's Life Out of Control," at 2:00 p.m. in lower Doan. Mary Lloyd, R.N., of the PMS Clinic in Flushing, will examine pre-menstrual syndrome and how this disease can create a non-visible handicap.

Wednesday, March 14, features a carnival of information. Doan Center will house games and handicap awareness displays by area organizations and campus groups. Refreshments will be available throughout the 10:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. event.

Dr. Harriet Tillock, associate professor of sociology, will present "Interacting with a Handicapper" on Thursday, March 15, at 10:00 a.m. in lower Doan. Closing the program at 11:00 a.m. is Katie Goddeyne of the Bay County Women's Center, with a discussion of "Sexual Violence Towards Persons with a Handicap."

MSU PROFESSOR TO EXHIBIT AT SVSC

A Michigan State University professor will display his art at SVSC during the month of March. Abstract painter James Adley of Okemos will be featured in an exhibition from March 7-28 in the Art Workshop Gallery.

"Adley is concerned with the formal elements of art and sophisticated color," said Dr. Barron Hirsch, chairman of the SVSC art department. "His work features a delicate handling of colors."

A native of London, Adley attended the Chelsea School of Art before earning a Master of Fine Arts degree at the University of Pennsylvania in 1964. He has taught at MSU since 1965 and has held exhibitions in Chicago, New York, California and throughout Michigan.

The Lady Cardinals finished their regular **basketball** season with a perfect 26-0 record by defeating Oakland University 79-64 Saturday. Their smallest victory margin during the season was 8 points, and throughout the season they outscored opponents by an average of nearly 30 points per game. SVSC will host the opening game of district tournaments Wednesday night when they take on Northwood Institute.

Coach Bob Pratt has the men's **basketball team** moving in the right direction with seven straight victories. The Cards pulled out a 74-70 win over Oakland on Saturday and finished their regular season with a home game against Wayne State Monday. On Monday, March 5, they will host Aquinas in the first district tournament game.

The men's **indoor track team** placed third in NAIA national competition last week with 57 points. They turned in national championship performances in the mile and two-mile relays, and earned All-American honors in the two-mile run, the distance medley relay, the 440, the 880, the 600 and the 1,000 distances.
