EVENT PLANNED TO HONOR LOCAL POET

On Thursday, April 5, a current poet from Alabama will pay tribute to a Saginaw poet whose work has gained international recognition since his death in 1963. Professor R. T. Smith of Auburn University will speak on the work of Theodore Roethke at a lecture set for 8:00 p.m. in Doan Center. The observance is one of several events marking the twentieth anniversary of the College. It is open to the public free of charge, and a reception will follow the program.

Though his professional life was spent away from Saginaw, Roethke maintained contacts here through family and friends. His writing was influenced and often inspired by his Saginaw childhood.

Dr. Raymond Tyner, professor of English at SVSC and one of the organizers of the Roethke evening, notes that Roethke's poetry ranges from "lyrical responses to nature to some very complex studies of the human condition. Last summer was the twentieth anniversary of the death of Theodore Roethke, and we thought that as a local institution, it would be appropriate to do something to honor his memory," Tyner said. The result was publication of a commemorative issue of the Green River Review and an invitation for Professor Smith to visit SVSC to celebrate Roethke's work.

Smith is a member of the English department at Auburn and author of "Critical Introduction to the Poetry of Theodore Roethke. Following Smith's lecture, Dr. Tyner will present the Theodore Roethke Poetry Award, the Green River Review Poetry Award, a journalism award for opinion and news, and the International Poetry Review Award to student writers.

SVSC HOSTING HISTORY DAY

Area students researching "The Family and Community in History" will participate in SVSC's History Day on Saturday, April 7. The event is part of a nation-wide program to stimulate a greater interest in history, and will be held in Doan Center from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Junior high and high school students will prepare theme projects in six categories. Winners from the SVSC regional will advance to the state final in Detroit, with hopes of qualifying for the national competition in Washington, D.C.

"History Day hopefully will encourage students to look at history in something other than textbook terms," said Dr. Thomas Renna, professor of history and a regional organizer for the event. "This is a chance for them to do something outside of the classroom and try the research skills historians use."

DELTA, SVSC TO HONOR POLISH MARTYR

Janusz Korczak chose devotion to the orphaned children he befriended over personal safety. That choice cost him his life.

A well-known author, educator, physician and scholar during the 1919 to 1939 interwar period in Poland, Korczak was the founder of a national system of orphanages that still bear his name. He was martyred during the Nazi occupation of Poland when he refused to save himself, choosing instead to remain with his orphans. He was murdered along with his children in a concentration camp.

On Sunday, April 8, Delta College and SVSC will be hosting an event in memory of Korczak. Faculty and students from the departments of history, humanities, and literature of both colleges will be involved, and SVSC's Institute of Polish Studies is assisting with arrangements.

The program, to be held from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. in Delta's Fine Arts Auditorium, includes student presentations, panel discussions, readings from Korczak's writings, and a performance by guest pianist Leszek Bartkiewicz. A highlight of the afternoon will be an address by Dr. Richard Burks on "Poles and Jews as Martyr Peoples."

Dr. Burks is an emeritus professor of history at Wayne State University, where he began to teach in 1937. He specialized in the history of Eastern Europe, including the area where the Polish people are located and where, prior to the Holocaust, the Ashkenazic branch of the Jewish people were concentrated. Burk's principal work is The Dynamics of Communism in Eastern Europe. In addition to teaching at Wayne, he has 15 years of government service, including four years as policy director of Radio Free Europe in Munich.

PROFESSOR HOSTS AUTOGRAPH SESSION

Dr. Charles Brown, professor of music at SVSC and author of two books on rock and roll, will be at B. Dalton's Bookstore in Hampton Square Mall Saturday, March 31, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. to sign copies of "The Rock and Roll Story: From the Sounds of Rebellion to an American Art Form."

The book is a popular version of a college textbook published in 1983 on rock and roll. It covers the roots of rock music, influential groups, technology and electronics used in rock, and lists a discography and rock hall of fame. "The Art of Rock and Roll" was Brown's first book, and one of the first college textbooks on the subject. Its success prompted publisher Prentice-Hall to ask that Brown edit the book for sale to the general public.

DR. DICKEY ADDS NEW ASSIGNMENT

Dr. Ann K. Dickey, director of institutional research and planning, has been assigned responsibility for coordinating collegefederal government relations. The new assignment is in addition to her present duties.

In announcing her new duties, President Jack M. Ryder said, "I recognize that SVSC must assume on a more consistent basis responsibility for commenting on federal legislation that affects Michigan higher education." He hopes to increase cooperation in development of methods for broadening access to Michigan higher education and improving the quality of education which Michigan institutions are able to provide.

"My main responsibility is commenting on legislation that affects this college and higher education in general," Dr. Dickey said. "I will from time to time also ask support from legislators for our grant applications," Dickey said, but added that interaction with granting agencies will remain the responsibility of the director of sponsored programs.

She expects most of her contacts with legislators to be by mail or phone, with infrequent travel to Washington for personal contact. Dr. Dickey also will maintain communication with the Governmental Relations Office of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities.

"Members of the college community who have knowledge of concerns or issues that would need to be raised with members of Congress or federal officials are invited to discuss them with me," Dickey said.

Michelle Tanner has been named recipient of a 1984 AFSV Scholarship award. A senior marketing major, Tanner was selected by a committee of faculty and administrators who reviewed her application and scholastic record.
