DRESSER NAMED TO SVSC POST

Effective June 11, 1984, Marilyn Gordon Dresser has been named administrative assistant in the Office of the President. She replaces Mrs. Opal Colvin, who retired in December.

Ms. Dresser's responsibilities include administrative and secretarial support for President Jack M. Ryder, and for Dr. Gary Davis, assistant to the president and secretary to the Board of Control. She also will advise them on time management and communication strategies. Other duties include responsibility for maintaining financial records for the office and recording minutes of Board of Control meetings.

Prior to joining SVSC, Ms. Dresser served as Director of Insurance Operations at the Retirement Funding Corporation (RFC) of Birmingham, Michigan. She previously was office manager and administrative assistant to the president of RFC.

In addition to her experience with RFC, Ms. Dresser operated a freelance art business specializing in artistic lettering. She also taught art and humanities at the high school level in Southfield, Michigan, and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree, with certification in K-12 teaching, from Wayne State University.

Ms. Dresser and her husband, Richard, reside in Essexville.

SVSC CLAIMS ALL-SPORTS TITLE

SVSC has won the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Men's All-Sports Trophy for the second time in three years. Toss in a runner-up finish last year, and the Cardinal program has set the pace for small college athletics. Over 500 schools are affiliated with the NAIA for men's sports.

Competition for the award is based on points earned in nationally sponsored events. The Cardinals compiled 158 points by scoring in five of 14 events. SVSC had second place national finishes in outdoor track and golf (40 points each), third place finishes in indoor track and football (30 points each), and a seventh place finish in cross country (18 points).

The attention the SVSC athletic program has received has been a boost to the growth of the 20-year-old institution. "The primary purpose for our existence at SVSC is to sell the school to the community, the state and the nation," said Athletic Director Bob Becker. "In doing so it brings studentathletes as well as other students to our college."

The Lady Cardinals finished eighth in this year's NAIA Women's All-Sports competition with 75 points. Three sports scored for SVSC. Women's outdoor track claimed third place and 30 points, after earning 25 points for a fourth place finish indoors. Women's basketball earned 20 points for placing fifth.

President Jack M. Ryder also expressed his appreciation for the success of the program. "We are very proud to be the recipient of these awards. Excellence in our athletic program is consistent with excellence in our academic program, both of which enhance the development of students at Saginaw Valley State College."

FIVE NEW MEMBERS JOIN PLANNING RESOURCE COUNCIL

Five members of the campus community have taken seats on the Planning Resource Council, an II member group which serves as the steering committee for the College's planning activities. Serving two-year terms beginning July 1, and ending June 30, 1986, are Dr. William Elliot, professor of business law and finance; James Finzel, director of computer services; student Linda Kammer; Dr. Crystal Lange, dean of the school of nursing and allied health sciences; and Nellie Monroe, associate professor of social work.

The new appointees will join six current PRC members in recommending to the executive committee the theme or focus of 1984-85 planning activities. Dr. Ann Dickey, director of institutional research, serves as ex-officio chairperson. Also on the PRC are Dr. Berner Gorden, associate professor of chemistry; Mary Graiver, assistant professor of nursing; Dr. Guy Lee, dean of the school of education; student Ellen Petre; and Angie Torrez, director of academic support services.

Dr. Dickey expressed thanks to campus community members who are completing terms on the PRC. They are recent graduate Julie Goebel; Dr. Drew Hinderer, associate professor of philosophy/English; Dr. James Mitchell, dean of the school of business and management; Paul Saft, registrar; and Dr. William Smith, professor of English.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT PRESIDENT STARTS INFORMATION PROJECT

Dallas Mossman, president of SVSC's student body, has undertaken a project intended to fill what he perceived as an information gap. According to Mossman, Michigan's recession has necessitated job searches that cross state boundaries. "There didn't seem to be a centralized source of information about major cities in other states, so I sent requests to 220 chambers of commerce across the nation to supply literature about their areas."

Mossman's requests apparently struck a responsive note; by mid-June he had received answers from more than 100 organizations in all parts of the country. He said the literature covered various topics of interest to people thinking of employment at these sites. "Some gave detailed information on major employers in their areas, and most included data about services and features of their communities."

Mossman is coordinating his efforts with placement activities under the direction of Gary Apsey. The literature he's received is on file in the Student Government office in Wickes Hall, and he's encouraging all interested students to check there. Saying he considers this just a beginning, Mossman indicated he intends to canvas Michigan cities, and perhaps will seek international information. He said he considers this a supplement to facts available on Michigan, rather than a competitive element.


STUDENTS SERVE AS ORIENTATION LEADERS
