It's time to roll out the red carpet for parents and family members of SVSC students Saturday, October 6 at this year's Parents' and Family Day.

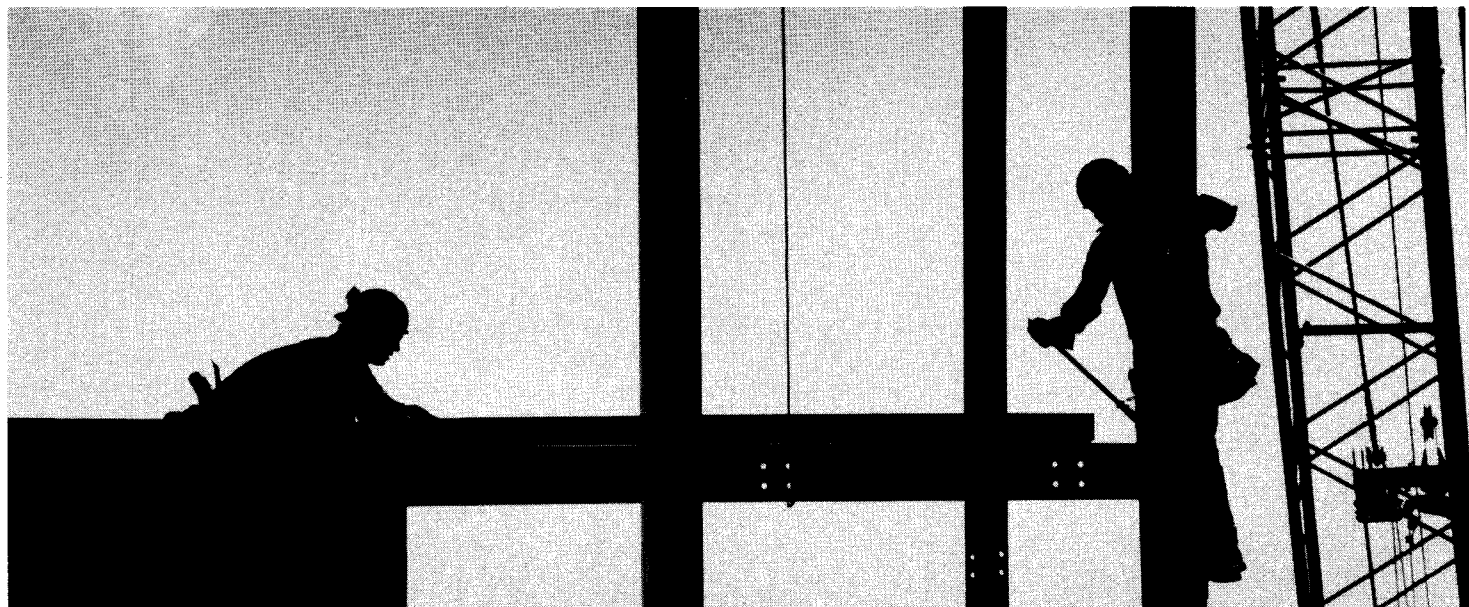
Family members will be welcomed by SVSC faculty, staff and students beginning at 9:30 a.m. in Doan Center. The campus will be open for visits to dorms, classrooms and special displays.

At 10:30 a.m. guests will be treated to a performance by Craig Karges, a mentalist and magician who uses ESP to entertain and mystify audiences. Karges will attempt to reveal spectators' thoughts, read serial numbers off dollar bills while heavily blindfolded, levitate tables, and link together finger rings borrowed from members

TOURING ART EXHIBIT MAKES STOP AT SVSC

The campus community is invited to a reception opening "Reality and Fantasy," an exhibit featuring the work of four contemporary Mexican artists. Festivities will take place 4:30 to 7:00 p.m. in the SVSC art workshop gallery on Wednesday, October 10.

The reception marks the official opening of the October 8-31 exhibit at SVSC. "Reality and Fantasy," which is touring the United States, provides a look at the talents of Mexican masters Alejandro Colunga, Mario Martin del Campo, Maximino Javier, and Francisco Zuniga.

Alejandro Colunga is known for his experimental ceramic work in association with master artisans de Tonala and Jorge Wilmont in 1979. Colunga has exhibited regularly in group exhibitions in Mexico, Brazil and the United States since 1968.

Originally from Guadalajara, Mexico, Mario Martin del Campo has had nine individual and 33 group exhibitions dating back to 1966. His credentials list collections in nearly a dozen museums, including the Museum of Modern Art in San Francisco, California, and the United States Embassy in Mexico City, Mexico.

Maximino Javier began exhibiting his work in 1975, including a three-year show in 1980 with the Smithsonian Institute Traveling Exhibition Service. His public collections have been displayed in Chicago, San Francisco and New York. "Contemporary Images: Watercolor 1983" is his most recent group exhibit at the University of Wisconsin.

Trained as a painter and sculptor, Francisco Zuniga's style has been described as "a severe construction, sturdy forms and a rough, warm poetry." According to critics, his works are easily understood, their conception is simple and they are carved in compact masses. His works include: "Monument to the Poet Ramon Lopez Velarde," a group of figures and bas-reliefs in red stone for the town of Zapotecas; and "Riches of the Sea," for the port of Veracruz.
