BLANCHARD MESSAGE INCLUDES AID FOR HIGHER EDUCATION

In his annual "State of the State" message last Wednesday, Governor James J. Blanchard called for increased spending for education, including funds to upgrade physical facilities of Michigan's public colleges and universities. In line with this, his budget recommendation is expected to include a \$3 million sum to complete the renovation of Wickes Hall at SVSC. The remodeling will be the final phase of the I.F. 2 project, following occupancy of three new instructional units now under construction.

Citing the recent report of his Commission on the Future of Higher Education, Blanchard discussed his priorities for Michigan's colleges and universities. He said he had directed the Department of Management and Budget "to evaluate existing higher education programs and requests for new resources on the basis of clearly defined roles for each public college and university." The Commission report provides role definitions for community colleges, technical colleges, regional state colleges, general state universities and research universities.

Blanchard also challenged college administrators to maintain accessibility by holding down any increase in tuition to a level below the rise in the Consumer Price Index. "To help them achieve this goal, I will propose still another substantial increase in state support for higher education in the 1985-86 budget." He also proposed expanded financial aid for students, and he urged colleges to "undertake positive, aggressive action to ensure that traditionally underrepresented groups, such as women, minorities and the handicapped, have full and fair access to the benefits of higher education."

"HEALTH YOURSELF" FAIR AT SVSC

SVSC is hosting a wellness fair Tuesday and Wednesday, February 5 and 6, from 11:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. in various areas of Doan Center. The annual event, called "Health Yourself," is sponsored by SVSC Health Services and Campus Activities.

"Our main purpose is to show how much you can do for your own body," said Gloria Hansen, coordinator of Health Services. "The trend in medicine today is toward self-care." She added that the wellness fair tries to integrate all areas of personal health and is designed to encourage active participation. "We really wanted to push for involvement in things. I can't see having a health fair like a museum."

In the mall area of Doan, blood pressure, hemoglobin testing and blood typing will be done. Student nurses will present information on diet, birth control, VD, and other subjects. Booths will be operated by Bacchus, a campus organization that promotes alcohol education, and the Saginaw County Office of Substance Abuse Services. The Hair Affair of Saginaw also will be present, offering free haircuts all day on both days.

Hansen added, "We're working with the athletic department, which we're really pleased about; they have so much to offer." Instructor and Assistant Men's Basketball Coach Mark Simons will be there with an exercise bike to illustrate pulse rates during exercise and to teach people how to measure their pulse rates. Athletic Trainer Dave Bertie will be available to discuss sports medicine, including simple treatments, and when to leave injuries alone and call for a doctor.

St. Mary's Hospital will offer pulmonary function testing. The test data will be sent to St. Mary's via phone hookup, and results will come back in about two hours. The hospital also will give tips on how to quit smoking.

The Public Health Department will be on hand Tuesday to discuss diseases, particularly rubella, since its prime target group is age 18 to 28. Also on Tuesday interested persons may sign up for free immunizations for a variety of diseases, or for a basic CPR course. The immunizations will

be given and the CPR course conducted at SVSC on Wednesday.

A number of lectures will be held in the lower level of Doan Center. Steve Konowalow will present "Be All That You Can Be," and the Michigan Dairy Council will present "Nutrition in Athletics." Terese Torzewski, I.H.M., a nun who teaches yoga at the YWCA, will discuss "Christian Yoga Prayer." There will be a three-part series on stress presented by Bob Grant, a registered physical therapist at St. Luke's Hospital of Saginaw.

Among the activities to be held in the small private dining room are health information films from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Tuesday. The films are by the Heart Association, and topics include diet. From 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. that day, Sister Trish Novicke, O.P., of SVSC's Campus Ministry, will speak on student assertiveness. From 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Wednesday students from Central Michigan University's audiology program will conduct hearing testing. From 5:00 to 6:30 p.m. Ted Nitz, personal counselor at SVSC, will present "Risking and Growing."

SVSC's food services will be providing healthy snacks during the fair. They also will make available nutritional breakdowns of the foods served in the program those two days.

Hansen hopes many people will involve themselves in the fair. "Our main theme is learning about your body and what you can do to maintain your health, and form good habits to lead a more productive life. I'm excited about it."

WOMEN SOUGHT FOR JAPANESE EXCHANGE

Faculty and staff are asked to make students aware that college women interested in learning more about Japan and Tokushima, Saginaw's sister city, may apply for admission into SVSC's annual summer exchange program with Shikoku Women's University (SWU). Applications are being accepted until Thursday, February 28, for the five-week course in "Japanese Culture." Travelers will be in residence at SWU from the first week of May through the first week of June.

Approximate cost of the trip is \$2,000, which includes round-trip air fare, room and board, plus travel. Full-time SVSC students may be eligible for financial assistance up to \$500. Ten women will be chosen, and five hours of elective credit will be awarded.

Students traveling to SWU will study Japanese culture, history, and language, and will reside in the women's dormitories. Most of the instruction is in English, but some Japanese will be taught. The primary emphasis of the program is to experience the cultural and educational styles of Tokushima. For application information, call Dr. Eugene J. Hamilton at ext. 4068.

HIGH FIVE


