# SVSC SUMMER INSTITUTE TO COMBINE MUSIC, COMPUTER SCIENCE

Is music an art or is it science? Or does it combine elements of both disciplines?

A group of gifted high school students will be exploring answers to those and other questions in an intensive two-week workshop at SVSC this summer. The institute in music and computer science is funded by a \$50,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Education.

Gerald Survant, coordinator of the conference bureau, is coordinating the "Diversity in Music and Computer Applications" institute. He will be assisted by Dr. Charles Brown, SVSC music department chairman, as music coordinator. Several SVSC instructors in music and computer science, plus several area professionals, also will be involved in the program.

"We are excited by the opportunity to be involved in this particular type of instruction," Survant said. He said SVSC is one of five schools to receive funding for a summer arts/science institute. The others are CMU, EMU, Northern Michigan University and Grand Valley State College.

The format of the institute calls for several performing groups of students with experience in high school music programs. Survant also is planning a variety of classes to augment the music concentration. Included are computer programming, word processing, computer graphics, and computer game writing. "We also are considering classes in polymer studies, computer analysis of music and pop music arrangement," Survant said.

Tours to such places as The Dow Chemical Company, Saginaw Steering Gear, Frankenmuth

and Autoworld will be used to supplement classroom activities. But the central focus will be ensemble performance groups fitted to the background and abilities of students selected for the program.

"The students will practice and perform with Saginaw's Eddy Band, and possibly the Army Alumni Band," Survant indicated. "We also will use some nationally-known musicians and directors in the institute. We expect to form a student wind ensemble, a jazz band or two, and various chamber ensembles."

Getting into the program will not be easy. The institute is limited to 100 students, and in addition to performance background in music, those selected must have a strong interest in computers. They also must be identified as "gifted."

Survant is working with Carolyn Cummings, gifted consultant for the Saginaw Intermediate School District, to identify and contact gifted students across Michigan. Because the institute is designed for the gifted, Survant plans to include organized sessions for students to talk with each other and gifted consultants about their "giftedness."

"A secondary goal of the institute is to sensitize our faculty and staff to the special attributes of gifted students. We think our people will enjoy and learn from the stimulation of being able to work with gifted young people." He said faculty and counselors for the institute will be selected carefully and asked to indicate their support for using an interdisciplinary approach to work with gifted students.

### SVSC FACULTY AND STUDENTS NOMINATED FOR AWARDS

Two SVSC students and two faculty members have been cited for outstanding performance and will be honored at an awards convocation in East Lansing.

SVSC seniors Arletta Hansen and Timothy Friebe, along with Drs. Arthur Andrewes and Gary Thompson, will be recognized at the fourth annual Awards Convocation of the Michigan Association of Governing Boards (MAGB), to be held this evening at Michigan State University. The awards are presented each year "in recognition of a treasured Michigan resource and the promise it represents for our State's future," according to MAGB chair Mildred Jeffrey.

Arletta Hansen earned a bachelor of arts degree in 1970 and will complete requirements for a second baccalaureate degree in social work at SVSC. She currently is completing a social work practicum placement at Youth Protective Services in Saginaw, where she works with troubled adolescents and their families. She has maintained a cumulative grade point average of 4.0.

During the summer of 1984, Hansen coordinated a Saginaw County Voluntary Action Center program that placed high school students in voluntary work positions to gain academic credit and practical work experience. She is listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities."

Hansen resides with her husband and three children in Frankenmuth, where she is active as a member of the Frankenmuth Women's Club and Frankenmuth Branch of the American Association of University Women. She has been a 4-H leader, and is a member of the National Association of Social Workers. Upon graduation in April, she plans to begin work toward a Master of Social Work degree.

Timothy Friebe is majoring in chemistry and has a cumulative GPA of 3.92. He is an American Chemical Society (ACS) student affiliate and an active member of the SVSC Chemistry Club and the SVSC Honor Society. In 1984 he was selected ACS Analytical Chemistry Student of the Year.

His current research project involves the synthesis and testing of carotenoids, naturally occurring substances from which vitamin A is derived. He has tutored students in math and chemistry, and coaches baseball teams for boys aged 10 to 16.

Listed in "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities," Friebe plans to study toward an advanced degree following his graduation in April. He is the son of Karen Friebe of Kawkawlin.

Dr. Arthur Andrewes, professor of chemistry, joined SVSC in 1976. He recently returned from an extended sabbatical leave at the University of Trondheim, Norway, where he continued research in carotenoid and retenoid chemistry. He held a Fulbright Senior Research Fellowship during his first year of study at Trondheim.

Recognized internationally for his work in carotenoid research, Andrewes has published more than 35 papers in major journals, and presented numerous papers and abstracts at national and international conferences. He has discovered two previously unknown classes of unusual polyenes and characterized numerous new structures.

Dr. Gary Thompson, associate professor of English, has specialized in modern and contemporary American literature. In 1982 he was the recipient of a Fulbright Fellowship to teach American literature at Marie Curie-Sklodowska University in Lublin, Poland. The grant was renewed for the 1983-84 academic year.

Since returning from Poland, Thompson has submitted for publication an interview with Polish novelist Tadeusz Konwicki and an article on Polish literature since the declaration of martial law. He currently is editing a special edition of the "Green River Review" featuring recent Polish fiction and poetry in translation.

Thompson is a member of the Modern Language Association, the National Council of Teachers of English, and the Michigan Academy. His wife, Pam, is administrative secretary to the Dean of Students at SVSC, and has been active in serveral campus organizations.

The SVSC honorees will join representatives from Michigan's 15 public colleges and universities at the March 26 banquet. Mr. William P. Vititoe, president of Michigan Bell Telephone Company, will be the keynote speaker.

#### SVSC SPONSORS TRIP TO FRANCE

SVSC is organizing a trip to France that will combine recreation with education.

Travelers will spend nine days in Paris and the Chateaux between June 29 and July 7, 1985. Cost of the tour is approximately \$1,060, including round trip air fare from Detroit, continental breakfast and dinner every day, transportation in Europe, tour guides, hotel accommodations, and service charges.

Highlights of the trip include a tour of Paris, excursions to St. Malo, Versailles and Chartres, the Loire Valley Chateaux, Mont St. Michel and Bayeux. The tour ends with an evening "bateau mouche" ride down the Seine to catch the sight of Paris by night.

Those who wish to lengthen the trip may extend their stay and return on a later flight, according to Dr. Ricardo Pastor, trip organizer. "Approximate costs for lodging, breakfast and dinner would be \$30 per day for those staying on," Pastor said.

Persons interested in earning academic credit have the option of paying tuition and enrolling in up to three credits in Humanities 255. Registrations for the trip are being accepted up to Friday, April 5, 1985.
